The Elephant in the Room (Guest Editorial)

Recently our church has experienced a challenge common to most groups from the beginning of the world. It appears that nearly everyone is aware of a situation that needs to be confronted, but almost no one is willing to talk about it. Believing that this is more common than we would like to admit, I offer the paragraphs below in hopes of opening an avenue of discussion.

It does not help that our church's problem comes during a period in our nation's history when dissension and disagreement are addressed with acrimony and argument instead of with dialogue and discussion. Whether in the political or financial or doctrinal arenas, groups on opposite sides of any issue seem unable to engage in reasoned and intelligent conversation to attempt to draw others to their point of view. Instead, what we hear are accusations and misdirections that focus on personality and perceptions rather than on facts and causes and solutions.

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In our church, the primary issue (at this time) seems to be dwindling attendance. Conversations that I have participated in have revealed three or four potential causes for the "disappearance" of fellow worshippers from weekly services. It reminds me of the old joke about four blindfolded men trying to identify an elephant, each reaching a different conclusion depending on whether they touched the trunk or tusk or leg or tail. Their limited perspectives prevented accurate identification of the elephant in the room.

Let's begin with the intrusion of politics... perhaps the most poisonous of church problems. Nearly everyone believes that they have the right to support the liberal or conservative position of their choice. I find no argument with that belief. As Americans we are guaranteed that right... and as Christians we are obligated to respect that right. When an individual or a group, are honest in expressing their position it is our responsibility and our privilege to continue loving and working with our fellow Christians of all persuasions. Only in this way can we have discussions that may change their (or our own) minds. We cannot and should not expect that everyone will agree with our convictions as a basis for serving alongside each other.

C.S. Lewis once concluded a review of the various Christian denominations with an observation that they agreed on

from choosing to focus on minor differences and using those as a reason to break fellowship. (What a shame!)

Programming or activities... a pair of issues that will never go away! The challenge is to offer the correct number of scheduled (not too many – not too few) and well-run events; and to ensure that we provide the appropriate support services (child care, etc.) to maximize participation.

We would find it difficult to complain of dwindling attendance if we were not providing things to attend! Coordination between the various age groups is critical as we consider "when" to schedule these opportunities to allow as many family members as possible to have something to do while at church together.

Church staffing problems cover a wide range of areas. Managing expectations for appearance and demeanor and attendance and performance must always take account of personality traits and skill sets and allow freedom to serve within a flexible framework. When a staff member isn't meeting "perceived expectations", the best solutions include open discussions and patience to allow time for changes to occur. Under our current bylaws and practices, it requires a 90% "yes" vote from the congregation following a unanimous recommendation from the search committee to hire a new staff member. Until and unless that policy is changed (if it should be), perhaps we need to find ways to work with and pray for our staff more effectively.

Finally let me close with the issue of communication. Yes, something even as simple as a schedule of events for the week so that everyone can know "when to be where". But it also includes actual personal conversations ... a deliberate and intentional exchange of ideas and viewpoints. These sometimes can (and should) be one-on-one chats over a cup of coffee. But we cannot exclude group discussions. For these conversations to succeed, we must commit to refrain from finger-pointing and name-calling.

I was recently introduced to a concept that bears repeating here. We all believe what we believe; and we believe that what we believe is true...because if we believed it wasn't true, we would believe something else. Challenging ourselves to consider changing what we believe is crucial to engaging in meaningful conversations with people who hold different beliefs. Simply finding a comfortable set of beliefs shared by "my" group is not a valid confirmation that those beliefs are true.

So please, join me in NOT IGNORING the elephant in the room. If we do, we face danger on one end from tusks able to poke holes and on the other end you may find a smelly pile ... both ends capable of ruining your day.
