Palmetto Baptist Church is tentatively set to reopen our Sunday morning worship services on July 5th.

In the U.S., coronavirus cases have declined over the past month; every state has eased most COVID-19 restrictions; and churches are being allowed to reassemble. One might wonder why PBC is waiting so long before reopening

The short answer is we believe the health and well-being of our church family are paramount and, therefore, we are taking every precaution to protect our PBC family, especially the most vulnerable among our members, our senior citizens and children. If we err, we prefer to err on the side of extreme caution. While it is true that the number of coronavirus cases is slowly declining, that number is still high, and the death rate, though also declining, is still the equivalent of a 9/11 disaster every four days. In Georgia, restrictions blunted the increase of virus cases and deaths, but then Georgia was the first to lift restrictions even though most infectious disease experts warned that such easing of restrictions was premature and would likely lead to a second wave of cases and deaths. We hope such dire predictions will prove to be untrue, but it is too soon to know for sure. Therefore, we have chosen not to gamble on the health of our church family.

Some churches reopened in mid-April, others in early to mid-May. We certainly respect the rights of other churches to reopen whenever they see fit. But we prefer not being the guinea pig church. A majority of churches we contacted are opening no earlier than late June and most of them were not opening until July. Some churches in our area have not yet set a time to reopen, but they do not foresee opening until the fall. We talked to one church that will not reopen until 2021!

Complicating the issue is the fact that some churches have reopened early only to find that people who were positive for the virus unknowingly infected other attendees at the worship services. I know of at least three different churches that opened early only to find out that some of their attendees tested positive for the coronavirus after having been exposed to it during the church services. A few of those infected died.

Week to week cases of COVID-19 in Georgia clicked up 26% for the week ending Sunday, May 24th. Whether the increase from nearly 4,170 confirmed cases during the week of May 11 to 5,260 the week of May 18 represents a new wave in the spread of the coronavirus remains unclear. But even if the increase is due only to people having more access to testing, the fact remains that there is still an increase in the number of cases since Georgia eased shelter in place restrictions. Georgia ranks among 20 states in the nation with increases. While the number of people currently hospitalized statewide dropped during the two weeks ending May 24th, deaths rose from 201 to 221 during that same period. Additionally, new COVID-19 hot-spots are emerging in rural Georgia.

These stats confirm the decision of our church leaders to delay reopening our worship services until we have a better idea of where things are headed. When we do open, we will take every conceivable measure to ensure the safety of all our attendees.

One year from now, no church will regret opening later rather than sooner. The only churches with regrets, if there are any, will be those churches that opened earlier and as a result, congregants became sick and/or died. Personally, I do not want to be one of those churches. The last thing we want for PBC is to be known as another Albany.

Please know that none of these decisions have been made flippantly, nor have they been made with ulterior motives. These decisions also have not been made by any one person. They were made only after surveying our congregation, observing what other churches are doing, and consulting with our church staff and leaders. Our church staff and leadership thank you all for your patience, understanding, and prayers.

I look forward to seeing you all July 5th!
