Small Group Discussion Guide

Series: The Sacred Journey

Message Title: Victory in Hand

Passage: Exodus 17:8-16

Opening Question

• What kinds of things do you most often pray for? What kinds of things do you find yourself praying against?

Read the Passage: Exodus 17:8–16

1. Observation – What Does the Text Say?

- Who are the main characters in this passage, and what roles do they play?
- What do you notice about the timing word "tomorrow" (v.9)? Why might this be significant?
- What physical objects and actions are highlighted (staff, lifted hands, stone, altar)?
- How does the battle shift depending on Moses' posture?

2. Interpretation – What Does It Mean?

- What does the staff of God represent throughout Exodus?
- Why do you think Moses' raised hands mattered in the battle? What are the possible explanations?
- What does this passage teach us about God's role versus Israel's role in victory?
- Why did Moses build an altar and call it "The Lord is my Banner"?

3. Discussion – What Does This Teach Us Today?

- What do "Amalekites" (enemies of God) look like in our world today?
- How do we discern the difference between God's battles and our personal agendas?
- How have you seen prayer change the outcome of difficult situations—in history, in the church, or in your own life?
- Why do we need others, like Aaron and Hur, to come alongside us in prayer and encouragement?

4. Application – How Should We Respond?

- What battles in our culture or community should we be intentionally praying against (e.g., injustice, addiction, human trafficking)?
- What battles in your own life require sustained prayer and support from others?
- Who in your circle could you be an "Aaron" or "Hur" for this week?
- How can your group practically hold one another's arms up in prayer in the weeks ahead?

Closing Reflection

In prayer, we join with God in fighting His enemies. Victory is not in our strength, but in His banner over us.
