

### MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT

We have a structure that is consistent among all United Methodist congregations. This structure is spelled out in our Book of Discipline. The Book of Discipline is our guide for how our denomination and churches are structured. It goes from high level structure down to the job description of a pastor. There are a small number of committee chairs that are required per the Book of Discipline and include: Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), Trustees, Administrative Council and Finance. In addition, our church features a few additional committees that we will focus on later in the year.

### ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

The Administrative Council in a United Methodist Church is the key leadership body that oversees the administration and ministry of the congregation. It acts as the executive board of the church, guiding and furthering the overall mission and ministry. ### Making Disciples of Jesus Christ Through Serving Others

In 1995 members of the "basement adult church school class" voiced concern for those in our community needing food. That group began developing a plan for a Greene Street food pantry to be staffed and supplied by Greene Street parishioners. A room design was prepared and presented to the Administrative Council and subsequently, built by congregational volunteers in the northeast corner of Wilson Hall. Volunteers were requested and in a period of a few months the Greene Street Food Pantry was opened on Saturday mornings to any and all needing food assistance.

It soon became apparent Piqua's needs were greater than our small room in the basement could accommodate. In 2020 the food pantry ministry was moved to Westminster Presbyterian Church (WPC) at the corner of Ash and Caldwell. We pay rent but have more room for food storage including shelving for dry goods, refrigeration and freezer space freezing can be managed. The alley adjacent to the church provides an easier and safer delivery process for both those serving and being served. The pantry is now open on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10 AM to 11 AM and it is not unusual to serve 20 to 30 families per day—sometimes surpassing 100 individuals.

While undergirding our church's mission, providing food for those in need is now taking more volunteers to meet the growing needs of our community. While housing our pantry in the WPC provides needed space, other organizations are partnering with us on a continuing basis. These include the Kroger Retail Rescue, Shared Harvest, Isaiah Industries, and Agape Distribution. These organizations provide food items, cardboard boxes for distribution and sometimes drivers for food pickup and volunteers for food distribution. Still additional food items must be purchased by the church.

Occasionally other organizations or individuals provide incidental support through donations of various types. For example, the Piqua Compassion Network refers clients in need of food, provides used clothing, baby diapers and wipes, baby formula and personal hygiene products that PCN receives but does not typically distribute. Individuals sometimes purchase food for the pantry and some designate their giving specifically to that outreach program.

### **HOW MIGHT YOU HELP:**

Volunteer to help with food pantry chores, including food distribution to those requesting food.

Donate food items.

Register for the Kroger grocery tape program, Community Rewards, where a percentage of your Kroger purchase is donated by Kroger to Greene Street.



### CREATION TIPS

### Making a Switch

Plastic bags, made from fossil fuels, end up as waste in landfills and oceans. Wildlife often mistake them for food and eventually humans are harmed through the food chain. Switch to reusable tote bags—plastic-free and made from eco-friendly materials.

The US uses 6.5 million tons of paper towels annually, each ton requiring 17 trees and 20,000 gallons of water to produce. Decomposing towels in landfills emit methane. Switch to old fabric (especially flannel) to make absorbent washable alternatives or buy rolls of paper towels made of bamboo.

The average American family uses 500 plastic snack bags each year, which are made from non-degradable polyethylene and may contain BPA. Switch to reusable silicone options to reduce waste and help keep plastics out of food and the environment.

The loofah and pouf are often confused. Poufs are colorful plastic-mesh scrunchies for the shower that contribute to landfill and ocean pollution and release microfibers into water. Loofahs come from the luffa plant. They are sustainable and can be composted. Switch to eco-friendly loofahs.

Upcycle old T-shirts into shopping bags or dog toys to donate to animal shelters. One church's sewing club switched to including preteens and teens. Adults teach them sewing skills; they also learn from their younger members ideas of what can be made and made better for the environment.

### FOOD PANTRY ANSWERS

It's been a busy summer at the pantry, and the need in Piqua remains great — many of our neighbors are struggling with hunger. But through it all, we've seen God's faithfulness and the power of prayer at work.

One woman recently shared with us that she has found salvation — what a beautiful answer to prayer! Another man was able to find a job after we prayed with him. Praise Jesus! We also celebrated with a woman who had been battling breast cancer — she is now cancerfree and was so excited to share the good news.

We're also grateful for those who come to the pantry and find ways to give back. One of our regular visitors is now volunteering with us and says he finds real joy in serving others. Another friend blessed us by sharing her fresh-picked asparagus — it didn't last long on the shelves! One woman asked for prayer as she tries to be more obedient and to trust God's timing — a prayer many of us can relate to.

We were also blessed by a generous donation from Winans: leftover Easter chocolates that we were able to include in each box. It was a sweet surprise that brought smiles to many faces.

Sometimes I feel like I have a bit of "motormouth" as I chat with our visitors and try to encourage them — but in those conversations, I hear many stories and carry many burdens in my heart. Please keep our pantry friends in your prayers, that their physical and spiritual needs may be met. And if you have a garden with extra produce, we would be so grateful for your donations. Many of our visitors would truly enjoy a fresh tomato, zucchini, or onion.

### WORDSOWER AFRICA UPDATE

"For this is what the Lord has commanded us: 'I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth." Acts 13:47

The last words of Christ, in Matthew, Mark and Luke, was the command for His Church to take the gospel into all the earth, to every nation, tribe, and language. The following statistics concerning the disobedience of Christ's Church to go to the unreached tribes devastates me!

97% of all missionaries go to reached tribes that already have the Bible and churches For every \$100 donated to Christian causes only about 10 cents is used for reaching unreached tribes

There is only 1 missionary for every 405,500 Muslims

There are 54,056 Christians in America for every 1 unreached tribe

We have the command to go; we have all the workforce and money required to accomplish the task. The only thing missing is obedience. There are 7,000 unreached tribes. We have 7 indigenous missionary teams, in 4 countries, who have been sent from our main base, with the assignment to reach over 20 unreached tribes

The testimonies of our disciples remind me of the early church disciples who went in fearless obedience. After reading these testimonies you will wonder why these have been unreached for 2,000 years. See how quickly these unreached tribes have responded after hearing the gospel of Christ. Where has His Church been for the last 2,000 years! It is your prayers, participation and united sacrifice that provide for our indigenous missionary teams, so that they are able to go into these unreached tribal villages and towns. Thank you!!!

### Medicare Open Enrollment Checklist

### Plan ahead for a successful and positive open enrollment period.

- Know your coverage. Know your current coverage; benefits, out of pocket costs, etc.
- Review your Annual Notice of Change (ANOC). Plans will share critical plan details prior to open enrollment. Review this document carefully each year.
- Review plan options for the upcoming year on Medicare.gov. Know <u>all</u> possible costs, benefits, and limitation on usage in plans.
- Know the dates. If you need or want to change your plan for the next year, enrollment <u>must</u> be completed by 12/7.
- You are not alone. OSHIIP is here to help you in this process with in-person education and counselling, virtual counselling, webinars, and our hotline 800-686-1578.

### **Open Enrollment**

Each year from Oct. 15 through Dec. 7
you can update or switch your Medicare
drug plan and/or your Medicare
Advantage plan. Your new coverage will
begin Jan. 1 of the next year.


