Welcome back! This month will prove to be very interesting – especially to firsttime readers.

Ezekiel and Daniel are two of the most intriguing and apocalyptical of the prophecies of the Old Testament. And while I have placed Daniel first, these two authors were virtual contemporaries but speaking the word of God in differing gentile and pagan nations.

"Apocalyptic" is a word that can be defined as "a writing from God employing symbolic language to tell of a divine intervention soon to take place." The troublesome word "soon", however, continues to haunt the church. How soon or when in history are these prophecies pointing, and what is their meaning? If you are using the *New Geneva Study Bible* follow the notes closely as you read to grow in your appreciation for the great debates.

When we return again to history, we begin 1 Chronicles. This covers much the same ground as Samuel/Kings but whereas the latter books were written during the beginning of the exile, Chronicles was written toward the end. It is framed with a sense of calling the people to repentance before God and of the hope of God's blessings soon to be upon them again.

You will notice that I have you reading the first 9 chapters of 1 Chronicles in one day. That is because it is all genealogy. While there is a reason and meaning to these chapters, don't get bogged down in them. Read them quickly and get the overall picture.
