My sister and I have a great deal of brothers and sisters and friends and family in Christ. Our brothers and sisters in Christ are our neighbors, our friends, strangers, acquaintances, extended family, and all members of God's glorious kingdom. Just like biological, adopted, and foster siblings, there are times when we do not agree or see eye-to-eye with our brothers and sisters in Christ. But they still remain. And always will. Because God designed it that way. God designed for us to walk our earthly pilgrimage and eternal life with all the members of God's kin-dom. Hand in hand, heart in heart, Together.

That also means God's design is for us to love. L-O-V-E. LOVE. To love all. To love each other. Not only a few. Not only those who vote the same way as us. Not only those who speak the same language as us. Not only those who believe the same way as us. Christ's design was that we simply and emphatically LOVE each other.

While we should reach out to others in friendship and interest simply for their own sake and not only in order to evangelize them, we do need to meet them with Christ in our hearts and in the hope that they, too, will meet Him who is the Giver of life."



Update on "Points" from Fresh Foods

We have learned that Fresh Foods is ending the "points" that you all have been so kind to donate for Grace Ministries. We have until October 15th to spend our accumulated points. We are sad, as your points saved us between \$50 and \$100 each week. If a new program is in the works, we will let you know. A final and great big THANKS for all of you who turned your hard-earned points over to us. Very much appreciated.

Catholic Community Food Pantry gifts

The local Catholic Community Food Pantry has been extremely generous in sharing their bounty with us. Lately, we have been receiving several large trays of bread items from them each week, such as buns, bagels, and loaves. We have been more than happy to distribute them to our customers. We have plenty of freezer space available to keep it in great shape when needed.

Food Banks for the Heartland

We were finally able to get about 1500 lbs from the Food Bank in Omaha in September. Items included granola, canned potatoes, peanut butter, catfish, canned fruit and veg, and pasta. The Food Bank is not a government entity. They do receive USDA commodities, but rely heavily on donations from manufacturers and retailers. The Food Bank is also affiliated with the charity 'Feeding America'.

Hand Writing on the Wall

In the past, Grace ministries received their entire inventory from the Food Bank for the Heartland and from donations from individuals and businesses. Food Drivers were plentiful. Donated money was used for rent, utilities, paper bags, cleaning supplies, clerical supplies, and the occasional purchases of margarine and sometimes meat. The rest of the money was saved carefully for a rainy day, thankfully, because we are in the middle of a several-years-long rainstorm!

Since the Covid Pandemic, the entire process has changed due to food shortages, rising costs of producing food, and out of control inflation that started in the Pandemic. We are currently having to purchase %-34 of our food at retail prices. We are doing the best we can to stay afloat, but as you know, we cannot last forever. Please keep Grace Ministries and its volunteers and leaders in your prayers.
