

Thy Will Be Done




He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Micah 6:8

Then Mary said, "Here I am, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

Luke 1:38



When we pray "thy will be done" what are we praying for? If we seriously pray, "thy will be done on earth as in heaven," we are praying not for answers that increase our riches, our honor, or our fame. We are praying for answers that recognize God blesses the poor and the meek. We will pray for a decision that may not offer an easy out or an easy answer, but one that reflects an acceptance and comfort level with what is to come, as difficult as it might be. When we pray, "your will be done on earth as in heaven," we pray in the spirit of Mary the Mother of Jesus. There are many ways she could have responded but Mary did not pray for Joseph or her parents or her town to understand. She did not pray to be spared.

What does God want from us? And how will we know?

Christians believe that prayer is the answer. Not that God will write the answers across the sky, but rather when we consciously go to God to ask for God's will, we will sense when it is right. We will "know" deep within our beings that we are following the guidance we have asked God for. Mary's prayer in response to the angel's announcement and Jesus' prayer in Gethsemane are good models for us to follow. Too often we attempt to give God advice about what we would like to happen. Honestly praying for God's will and doing our best to be open to following what God wants for us is a challenge. When we have sincerely asked God for guidance and made a decision that follows God's will and does no harm, we can be fairly certain we are doing God's will. Prayer is the key.

Let us pray.

Lord, remember us in your kingdom with love and help us to live the words you have taught us to pray—

In the peace and joy of the Lord which is our strength,

ALL SAINTS SUNDAY, November 2 Remembrance of All the Saints

In Holy Baptism, God makes saints out of sinners. In Holy Communion, God forgives the sins of all the saints. In worship, today we give thanks for all the saints "who from their labors rest." In the same breath, we petition our God for the strength to hear and to heed the admonitions of Jesus in the gospel for this day. 
CHRIST THE KING SUNDAY, November 23

Fighting the Good Fight, Keeping the Faith A Bible study on 1 and 2 Timothy & Titus Thursdays at 2:30 PM on Zoom October 2, 9, 16, 23, 30, November 6

What is the place of human leadership in the church and in the world? Since Christians are quite serious in believing that God creates and guides, heals and saves, corrects and blesses, calls

and judges, human leadership takes second place. It must not elbow its way to the front, it must not bossily take over. Ego-centered, ego-prominent leadership opposes the priority of God's leadership. According to Pastor Eugene Peterson, author of the biblical translation, *The Message*, the best leadership in spiritual communities formed in the name of Jesus does not call attention to itself, yet does not sacrifice anything in the way of conviction, and firmness. In the letters to two young associates—Timothy in Ephesus and Titus in Crete—we see Paul encouraging and guiding the development of just such leadership. What he had learned so thoroughly himself, he was now passing on and showing them, in turn, how to develop a similar leadership in local congregations. Paul teaches all of us how to fight the good fight and keep the faith, especially during difficult times.

CHRISTMAS AT SEA—

During October and November WELCA will again be collecting items for the gift bags distributed to Seafarers on Christmas Eve. Thanks to your generosity we were able to provide more than 20 bags last year to this ELCA supported ministry!

We at Holy Trinity have been participating in the Christmas at Sea program sponsored by Seafarers International for a number of years. At times it becomes like a comfortable old shirt and we forget why and for whom we are doing this.



The ministry was founded in NYC in 1873 by the Swedish Lutheran Church and remains the only Lutheran response to the needs of seafarers. Programs for immigrants, including housing, are also a part of their mission. Most of the seafarers work on container ships. They come from low wage countries and may be ineligible for shore leave because they lack visas. Seafarers International chaplains go on board the ships. They offer spiritual care, social advocacy, simple acts of kindness such as shopping, phone access to call home, and most of all a listening ear. Christmas at Sea is one of their most important programs. It's a nice outreach to the stranger, mindful that it is not only for Christians. We welcome the stranger and show them we care. Ninety percent of what we consume comes from container ships on the backs of people with low wages who go unrecognized for the sacrifices they make.

I recently read a piece by a Christmas at Sea volunteer at a church in Pennsylvania. It highlighted how, as is so often the case, we can receive even more than we give. Imagine this scenario: You're out shopping for groceries and items for your satchel. You head to Walmart or Target. You head over to the clothing department to find a sweatshirt. You find one in your favorite color, \$14.99 on sale, for a shopping win. You wonder if it is the favorite color of the person who will open it on Christmas. You find a thermal hat and imagine a person smiling as they put it on, knowing it will keep them warm. Now you're in the candy section. You can smell the chocolate and find your way to your favorite kind because you want whoever gets their hands on this bag to know how amazing that chocolate really is. At home you write a personal note on a card, wishing your seafarer warmth and peace. Maybe you share that the candy is your favorite and hope he likes it. Know that your words will lift the heart of someone needing to feel cared for and not alone. Truly it is in giving that we receive!

We will be collecting items in the lobby until Sunday, November 16. Feel free to contribute all of the items for a full satchel or just a few. WELCA will assemble the bags for delivery in time for Christmas.

Each bag contains the following:

- 1 Sweatshirt (hooded or unhooded) MEDIUM
- 3 Pairs of socks (thermal or gym)
- 1 Tee shirt MEDIÚM
- 1 Knit winter cap
- 1 Can of nuts or large chocolate bar
- A Christmas Card with a personal note

Remember that sharing the Joy of Christmas, even in small ways, not only changes those we touch, but it changes us as well. Christmas Blessings!


