The naming of the months on our calendar is a downright confusing thing. Since we mark the beginning of the year in January, November is the 11th month on our calendar. But the name itself means the ninth month (in fact, September means the 7th month, October means the 8th month, and December means the 10th month!). The reason for all of this is a bit long and complicated: the ancient Romans added two months to the calendar, which shifted everything, in addition to the fact that we have not always marked the beginning of the New Year in January (for much of history, it was in March, which would make November month number nine).

In the old Anglo-Saxon calendar, used by the "Old English", this time of the year was called "Blodmonath," which mean "Blood Month," or "Month of Sacrifice." It seems that it was called this because it was the month when livestock were slaughtered, and before the coming of Christianity dedicated to their pagan gods. But even some of this is a guess, simply because it was only after the evangelization of the Anglo-Saxons that any of their history was written down.

At any rate, November was considered the month when winter began in earnest, with some even marking the beginning of winter in October (which makes sense if you know anything about weather in the British Isles). This is why Christmas was considered to fall in "Midwinter" (since we date winter by the solstice, our "official" winter does not begin until December 21 or 22, even though in the northern climes snow has already fallen).

For us in the USA, November is associated with Thanksgiving, which also marks the beginning of the "Christmas" shopping season. In fact, President Roosevelt actually moved Thanksgiving Day from the last Thursday to the fourth Thursday in November, so that there would be, in some years, more days in the "Christmas Season" (defined by the economy, that is).

Thanksgiving is one of those interesting holidays that is credited to the Pilgrims, though the Pilgrims did not believe in any holidays determined by the calendar (especially Christmas and Easter). The Pilgrims would call a feast day or a fast day in response to a community's experience of blessing (like a good harvest, or the coming of peace after a war) or experience of tragedy (like an illness or war). The Pilgrims would not have approved of an annual Thanksgiving Day, any more than they approved of Christmas or Easter. A subject for another day!

But here we are! November is upon us. Let us approach our national day of Thanksgiving with thankful hearts. Let us also be aware that November will bring us the first Sunday of Advent on its final Sunday. Enjoy the cooler air (as I do), the guieter roads in our community, and the turning of the year to winter.



<u>Pack a Traditional Shoebox</u>: Place your packed shoeboxes on the pew in front of Sherry's office no later than: Sunday, November 16

Pick up shoeboxes and pack them with fun toys, hygiene items (NO toothpaste and NO soap) and school supplies. Shoeboxes available for pick up: Sunday, Oct 26 in the Narthex and the Fellowship Hall.



Donate \$10.00 per box to cover shipping and other project costs (training for local churches and Gospel materials). For easiest processing, you can give online or give by check using the envelope/brochure found inside your box.

- If writing a check, please write your check to 'Samaritan's Purse' and write a note on the memo line that the donation is for 'Operation Christmas Child'. Please remember to attach a label to your shoebox and mark if the shoebox is for a boy or girl and the age group.
- If packing a traditional shoebox, please sign the sheet located in the Narthex or the Fellowship Hall with your name, email address and the number of shoeboxes you are packing (sign-up sheet will be available on October 26th). If you are unable to attend services and would like to participate in packing a traditional shoebox, the shoeboxes will be located on the bench in front of Sherry's office along with the sign-up sheet.

Build a Shoebox Online

Building a shoebox online starts now by using the OIEPC goal page. This option allows you to pick and choose certain essentials (school supplies), a 'Wow' toy (doll, stuffed animal or soccer ball with pump), small toys (necklace, jump rope, harmonica, frisbee and yoyo) and accessories (flashlight, calculator, socks, shirt, flip flops, watch, etc.). The cost for building a shoebox online is \$30 total. There is no additional charge for shipping.
