

Was Jesus Really Born in a Barn?

Well, a group of Bible translators was finally brave enough to offer up an alternative to the "traditional" translation of "inn" in the story of the birth of Jesus in Luke 2. Traditionally, English translations of the Bible have read something like this: "And she [Mary] brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn" [Luke 2:7, KJV]. In recent years, some modern Bible translations have begun to insert a footnote about the word that has been translated as "inn". Since 2016, the English Standard Version has included a footnote on the word inn which says, "or guest room", as "guest room" is actually a better translation of the Greek word kataluma than the traditional inn. Since ancient times, the Greek word kataluma has been mistranslated as "inn." In the wake of this, whole traditions emerged about cruel innkeepers and inhospitable Bethlehemites turning away a desperate woman about



to go into labor. For years now, scholars have known of this discrepancy in translation. However, the translators were still not brave enough to replace "inn" with "guest room" in the actual text.

In 2019, a British Roman Catholic translation, the Revised New Jerusalem Bible, finally replaced the word "inn" with the word "living-space." So, what does all this mean? What is the picture here?

Most Palestinian Jewish homes in the first century A.D. consisted of a single room. One would enter into the house, where by the door there would be a lower area, a place for animals to be brought into the house at night (since most families had very little in the way of livestock—perhaps a goat or a cow or a donkey). The main room of the house would be slightly elevated from the area where the animals would sleep, often by a few steps. So, there would be "mangers" for the animals in the front part of the room, from which they could eat or drink during the night. However, if a family was a little more prosperous, they would build an additional room on the house, a room called a *kataluma* in Greek.

A *kataluma* would be an additional room in the house, suitable for the needs of a larger family, often used as a guest room when family or friends or the occasional visitor showed up. In the case of a woman in the family having to give birth, the woman would certainly be tended to in the *kataluma*, to give a bit more privacy for her and for the women assisting her in child-birth. So, the point that Luke is making is that given all the extra people visiting Bethlehem due to the census, this guest room was full (probably of other relatives of Joseph who had made the same trip). Thus, Mary gave birth to Jesus in the main room of the house. A manger in the front of the room was used as a makeshift crib.

What this means is that Jesus was not "born in a barn." He was not born in a stable. Jesus was born in the main room of a simple home in Bethlehem, likely the home of a relative of Joseph, a house full to overflowing with relatives and guests. His birth would have been greeted with welcome and joy by Joseph's extended family, as well as neighbors. Ancient Jewish custom would have demanded nothing less than this.

Don't worry! I'm not going to alter the Christmas carols we will sing again this year! Perhaps a lesson for us, however, is that just as Jesus would have been happily greeted and received by his extended family, so let us greet and receive him as he comes to us—as we celebrate his birth, as we welcome him into our hearts, and as we prepare for his coming again in glory.





Our goal is to pack or build online approximately 100 or more shoeboxes by 12/31/25.


Build a Shoebox Online

Seven members of OIEPC traveled to Lima, Peru this month on the first-ever vision trip sponsored by Paths of Hope. Paths of Hope (POH) is a ministry that began right here on Oak Island in 2017, growing out of the heart and calling of church member, Susan Smith. After its initial organization and the securing of its 501-(c)(3) status, the board of directors held a launch event at the Southport Community Center in 2019. Many of you participated in that original gathering and have remained interested and involved in the ongoing work of POH.

At the same time, many of you have joined our church since 2019. As a member of both the missions committee and the POH board, I wanted to take a moment to spotlight this ministry that OIEPC faithfully supports.

By partnering with the local church, Paths of Hope can walk alongside youth who are aging out of children's homes through a mentoring relationship, teaching valuable life skills, and assisting with educational opportunities. We exist to help these young people discover the calling God has on their lives and pursue the path on which He is guiding them.

Having led many mission trips in the past, including two OIEPC trips to Peru, I knew it would be so meaningful to experience our ministry firsthand. But reality exceeded my expectations. The trip gave participants a chance to dive deeply into understanding our mentoring ministry with teens from children's homes, while also enjoying a taste of Peruvian culture and its amazing food. The biggest benefit, though, was the deepening of friendships within our group—something that naturally grows through shared experiences and spaces! I think that we would all agree that there is something powerful about seeing ministry in person, meeting the people behind the mission, and seeing the impact of God's work.

Please join us for a Peruvian lunch after church on December 7.

We will enjoy some traditional dishes and hear a more in-depth report from the group who traveled to Lima.

(Did you know that Peruvian cuisine is considered one of the best in the world?) Our team is excited to prepare lunch for you, and we hope you'll come and share in the experience!
