In many ways, it was unfortunate that our particular branch of the Christian Church got tagged with the name "Presbyterian." It stemmed from the fact that the Reformation in the British Isles got embroiled in conflict over how the Protestant Church should be governed. The Church of England (the mother church of the Anglican tradition) chose governance by bishops, so that in many places outside of England this tradition known as the "Episcopal" Church" (*episcopos* being the New Testament Greek word for "bishop"). The Church of Scotland, on the other hand, (the mother church of those who came to be called Presbyterian) chose to model their governance on that of the "Reformed" tradition, with power being shared in the hands of "Elders" (*presbyteros* being the New Testament Greek word for "elder"). I am happy with the Presbyterian form of government, I must say. But what a shame that we got named for it!

Outside of the English-speaking world, churches of our tradition are not generally referred to as "Presbyterian." Instead, they use the word "Reformed." This came not as a description of their form of government, but a word used to describe their (and our) theology. In doctrine, we claim to be "reformed according to the Word of God." The implication was that the Reformation was about reforming the holy catholic church. Thus, to be "Reformed" was short-form for claiming to be a "Reformed Christian" or even a "Reformed Catholic." It was not until nineteenth century that many Reformed Protestants decided that the word "Catholic" was a bad word, and quit using it altogether. Honestly, this was a sad development. The word is all over the writings and confessions of the Reformation, as the Churches of the Reformation claimed to be a proper reform of the Catholic Church itself, and not so much a split from it.

So what does it mean to be "Reformed" then? This month we will begin a once-a-month study of a book recently published by three very able and faithful Reformed theologians, *Generously Reformed: Theology Rooted Deep and Wide*. Deeper in this newsletter there is more detail about this book and our study.

But in our highly charged age, the word "Reformed" sometimes becomes something like an empty glass that one pours whatever he wants into it. It is used by churches and denominations theologically more liberal than we are. It is also used by churches that are theologically reactionary and restrictive. Some groups that use the term are cult-like, even.

This study will give us a good grounding for reflecting on what it means to be Reformed. To be Reformed is not just being "Presbyterian". It is to be a part of a worldwide family, a Tradition that spans the world and is international. It also means that we are rooted in a faith that cannot be reduced down to a few slogans (TULIP, or the "Solas", for example). There is real content to the Reformed Tradition. At its best, the Reformed Tradition is a great way to navigate between and avoid the dangers of theological progressivism as well as theological fundamentalism, both of which are real threats to the Church today.

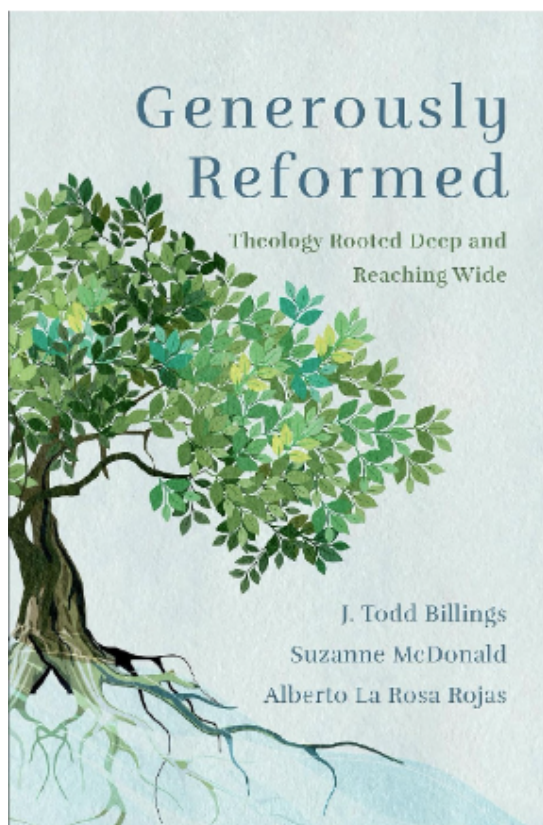

This book was written by three very good Reformed theologians from very different places, yet who share in a love of Christ, his Church, and the Reformed Tradition. The writers are Todd Billings, Suzanne McDonald, and Alberto La Rosa Rojas (some of you may remember Todd Billings from his excellent book, *The End of the Christian Life*, which some of us studied together several years ago). This study will meet on the third Sunday of the month at 5p.m. and will run for 8 months.

Generously Reformed is a good read, but a book that needs to be read slowly and probed (thus we will meet once a month). If you are interested or otherwise have any questions, please contact Dr. Taylor. If you would like for him to order the book for you, please let him know in good time. OIEPC Columbarium Project

OIEPC is exploring the possibility of building a **columbarium on our church grounds** as a meaningful and lasting ministry to our congregation. A columbarium provides a sacred, peaceful place for the interment of cremated remains, allowing members to rest on the grounds of the church they loved and served. As we begin discerning whether this is a ministry our congregation wishes to pursue, we are inviting everyone to share their thoughts and level of interest.

A short **survey will be included in the church bulletin on Sunday, September 20**, along with practical background information about what a columbarium is, how it is used, and what such a project typically involves. We encourage all members to complete the survey and join us for a **follow-up discussion during Fellowship Hour that same day**. Your input will help guide the next steps in this important conversation.

Secure Niches with Keyed Locks

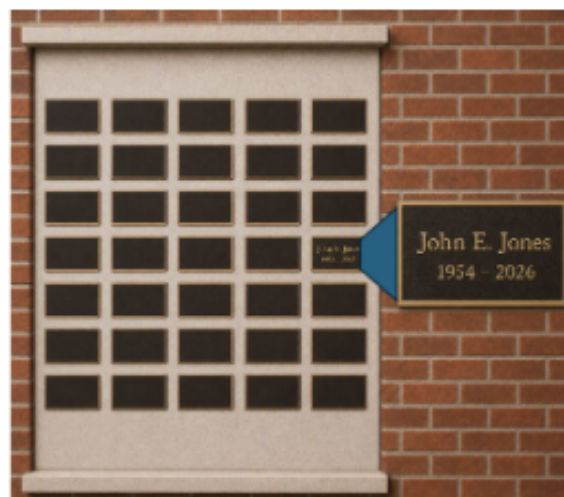
