Discussion Questions:

- Can you think of a time when you were convinced you were right—until new information or an experience completely changed your perspective? What was that like?

Read Acts 10:1–8

- Cornelius was described as “devout and God-fearing,” yet he still didn’t know Jesus. What does this teach us about the difference between being religious and having a relationship with God?
- How does Cornelius’s example challenge our assumptions about who is “close” to God or “ready” for the gospel?

Read Acts 10:9–23

- Have you ever felt God challenging your assumptions or prejudices? What was your first reaction?
- What do you think it means for us today to “not call anything impure that God has made clean”?

Read Acts 10:24–33

- Peter entered a Gentile’s home—something Jewish custom forbade. What risks did Peter take in obeying God here?
- How can obedience to God sometimes put us in uncomfortable or unfamiliar places?

Read Acts 10:34–43

- Peter summarizes the gospel in these verses. What parts of his message stand out most to you?
- How does understanding the gospel as for all people reshape the way we think about evangelism and outreach?

Read Acts 10:44–48

- The Holy Spirit came upon the Gentiles before they were baptized. Why is this moment significant in church history?
- What does this passage reveal about how God works beyond human boundaries or expectations?
- How can we cultivate humility and openness to God’s correction—especially when He challenges long-held beliefs?
