# A NOTE FROM PASTOR DUANE

Rather than my usual article this month, I wanted this article written by Ellen Boyd to go on the front page. Ellen gives her perspective of how participating in the Thanksgiving meal this year affected her. This is one of two articles Ellen shared with us. The other is inside the newsletter. I pray we all can have an attitude of helping others in 2026 and beyond.

My red coat looks different to me after Thanksgiving Day. After delivering Thanksgiving food to the truck stops, Butch and I were on the way back to the church when we found the homeless camp someone had mentioned. We picked up more food and went back and parked as close as we could to the woods where we saw the tents. I would like to say that I jumped out of the car, filled with the spirit and then skipped merrily into the woods. But I had never been to a homeless encampment before. I had given food to a single homeless person on the street. I had given plates to a homeless couple sitting beside Dollar General last year. But this was different – before the homeless were in my world. This Thanksgiving I was going to go into their world. But we called out to them and got permission to drop the food. We felt good about bringing it to them. Then we went home to our home.

But I couldn't stop thinking about them. Early that Thanksgiving morning I had been fretted trying to get the food done and thinking that I really needed to finish painting the kitchen. And I was fretted trying to clean up, well because we are not the neatest people. All that morning I had spent my time worrying about how my food or table looked. All that morning I had spent my time worrying about how my house looked. But after meeting homeless people with no food, no table and no home, I couldn't stop thinking about them.

I am going to try to care more, do more. Now don't get me wrong, I am still going to want to do things to my house and clean up better if you are coming there. But I also need to do a better job at looking at the true need around me.

Oh, and about my red coat. A couple of weeks ago, I bought a red coat. Now, I didn't NEED another coat and especially the extravagance of a RED coat. But it was on sale and I had a coupon. But on Thanksgiving I looked at the old brown coat that the homeless woman at the camp was wearing. Her coat kept her from the constant cold she was living in. Her coat could possibly keep her alive. My coat just made me happy.

Don't get me wrong, I am keeping my red coat and will definitely wear it at Christmas. It will keep me warm but also when I look in the mirror it will be a reminder to care. I found out that someone I know is trying to collect 1000 coats for the homeless and needy here in the Danville area. He is over the 700 mark now. I am going to buy a couple of coats to donate. Actually looking for a warm RED one!

Thank you, Ellen, for sharing your experience with us. When we realize there are those near us who are homeless, it makes us realize how blessed we are. As we realize the needs around us, the next step is to find ways to meet those needs. I pray each of you have a happy, blessed, and productive new year as we minister to those around us.

# THANKSGIVING MORNING AT THE TRUCK STOP

As usual, we were running around our house trying to get everything ready to get to the church on time. We were taking turkeys and had signed up to help fix the to-go boxes. And then we were going to deliver the meals to the truck stops in the area, just as we have done for a couple of years now. I can't say that it is easy to approach trucks and ask the driver if he would like a Thanksgiving meal. Some won't talk to you, some speak a different language. When approaching one driver, he angrily said "What do you want?" But after explaining what our church was doing, he calmed down and took the food. As we walked back to the car, he yelled to us "This is the best thing that happened to me today!" Now, he wasn't going to starve - he could have gotten snacks at the Pilot store. It wasn't just the food; it was the food made by people from a church that wanted to feed strangers. A church that cared.

There are other stories, like the bus driver transporting an empty bus. He had just talked to his wife and told her he couldn't find anywhere open to eat any Thanksgiving food. They had just hung up when we knocked on his window and gave him a plate. As we left he was calling his wife to tell her angels had brought Thanksgiving food. Can't say we were angels, but we didn't mind being their delivery service.

Another driver this year refused the meal because he was 30 minutes from home. But he asked that our church keep doing this outreach. He said he was a long-distance truck driver for 17 years and was always away on Thanksgiving. He said a plate like that would have meant so much. A simple plate, a simple meal. When you think about is though, food or a meal is mentioned with importance in the Bible. Food gives daily life, Jesus gives eternal life. And on Thanksgiving Day the members of Ringgold Church gave friends and strangers the food of the body and the food of the soul together in a Styrofoam box. ~Ellen Boyd



- Baby Bottle Boomerang donations to Transition Pregnancy Center from Mother's Day to Father's Day \$1,303.21.

### SPECIAL EVENTS & PROJECTS:

- "Lunch Bunch" started in February 2024 for all the widows and widowers in the RBC church family and is still going strong. This ongoing church ministry takes place the second Thursday of each month at 11:00.
- "Friends @ Home" is a NEW OUTREACH MINISTRY partnered by the WMU and Deacons' Ministry which began in February 2025. Dinner meals are prepared by different women each month and delivered by Deacons to the homes of those that we do not see on a regular basis depending on varying circumstances.
- The WMU provided the monthly birthday cake in March for the residents having birthdays at Southern Virginia Mental Health Institute.
- The WMU provided the monthly birthday cake in May for WW Moore Detention Center.
- Coffee, sugar & creamer, paper products, plastic utensils, cleaning products, laundry detergent, fabric softener sheets and bottled water were donated churchwide and given to House of Hope (local homeless shelter).
- WMU volunteers participated in a "Bear Dressing Day" at the Claire Parker Foundation on February 26 to help prepare the Care Box Bears donated to partner hospitals.
- The Eva Walton Circle and the Morning Mission Group provided lunch for students and leaders on June 23 & 24 at the Impact Virginia worksite in Ringgold.
- School supplies were donated to KES, DRMS and DRHS in August.
- Donated items for the SIT Ministry were delivered to the school nurses at KES, DRMS and DRHS upon request during the school year. The items needed were for emergency situations at the schools.
- The WMU sponsored a spaghetti dinner on March 23 to support the youth mission camp in the summer.
- RBC was in charge of the Dan River Food Distribution in January, April, July and October at the Kentuck Ministry Center with an average of twenty (20) volunteers each month to pack the boxes and distribute them to the clients.
- Ringgold Baptist Church WMU hosted the Annual Pittsylvania Baptist Association WMU meeting on April 29 at 4:00 PM.
- RBC responded to God's Storehouse emergency need for canned food in April.
- Needed items requested by the Danville Pittsylvania County Cancer Association were collected and delivered during August.
- A bountiful supply of peanut butter and boxed cereal was donated to God's Storehouse in October to help with global hunger.
- Backpack Ministry began the 14<sup>th</sup> year of providing weekend meals for children identified by Kentuck Elementary and Dan River Middle Schools. Thirty volunteers help throughout the school year to pack the bags on a weekly basis.
- The Eva Walton Circle and Morning Mission Group do monthly mission projects in addition to the churchwide mission projects that have
