A WORD FROM PASTOR DUANE

I am not sure who wrote the following story, but if we get too busy for God, it could be any of us.

The Master called my name one day because he needed someone to go: I said "Lord, in my spare time, between school, spending time with my husband, working from 8 to 6, and trying to coordinate a program for my community to help our children do better, I will help you look".

"See, I know I can't go right now cause I have so much to do." He said, "Well, where shall I find such a person? I thought I saw your name on my list of available people." "Well, Lord, that was the prayer that I prayed last year, but since then, things have changed." He said, "like what?" "Well, I'm working on my Ph.D., and I'm needed by so many people and my husband is always wanting something done, and on top of that my community EXPECTS me to help and give to them so..." "Well, seeing that you're busy, I'll let you go, but we will talk again, if YOU have some time."

I went on through the days, and the weeks, and the months completing my task as always. One evening, while studying for my comp exams, I received a call from the hospital concerning my husband. He had been in a terrible accident and was in critical condition. I dropped everything and ran to the Hospital where I found my husband hanging on for dear life. I immediately began to pray "Lord, don't take him now, I can't bear it" but my prayer echoed off the wall and returned into my own ear. That next morning, I left the hospital tired and weary, and walked in the door of my classroom just in time to begin my comps. As the professors began asking me questions, I opened my mouth to speak but nothing came out. In my mind, I began praying, praying hard, but my prayer echoed again, and I found myself upset at the Lord because he was nowhere to be found. I could not explain to them what was happening.

After leaving from my exams, I called in to work because I was so distraught at all that was going on. I explained to my supervisor what had happened, and she demanded that I take some time off. After visiting my husband in the hospital that evening, I went home and fell into a sunken state crying and despairing. Just then I heard someone calling my name. "Lord, is that YOU?" "Well, yes, it is. Do YOU have some time? I wanted to see if I could just talk....." Instead of waiting to hear his questions, I lashed out in anger and resentment. "How is it that when I needed you today, YOU couldn't be found and last night I cried and cried but all I heard was echoes from the walls? My husband is dying, I'm flunking out of school, I may not have a job and you can just sit and say YOU want to talk". The Lord interrupted me in my foolish speaking. "My child, I was busy, out looking for someone to go and tell others about me when you cried. By the time I came to answer you had moved on to something else. So, I decided to let your husband rest, and keep you home for a few days that way MAYBE you would get in touch with me, if YOU had some time. For you see, before your husband, the community or your job needs you, I NEED YOU. And if all these things take you away from me, I have to almost take them away from YOU, in order to get a moment." I calmed down and began to cry, for I remembered my prayer of wanting to go and do for the Lord.

He said "I just wanted to recheck with you to see if you knew of ANYONE that I could send to be a witness for me and tell others about me...anyone at all....?" With tears in my eyes and feeling so unworthy I said "Lord, send me, I'll go."

While I know the Lord doesn't need anything, He wants to use us to be His hands, feet, and mouth. This story illustrates how we sometimes let ourselves get too busy to be of service to God. There are many needs in our community, but whom will the Lord send and who will go? Will you? Are you willing to say, "Lord, send me, I'll go?" And when He calls, will you be willing to set everything else aside and go?

DEACON MOMENT



WHEN YOU MEET WITH GOD, HE WILL OCCASIONALLY BREAK THROUGH THE FAMILIAR AND REVEAL A SURPRISING PLAN FOR YOU

Christians often talk about "walking with God" - so much so that these words can easily become cliché. But our walk with God isn't something we should take for granted. It takes effort, commitment, and intentionality. I have found three truths that remain essential in our walk with God.

First, walking with God involves wrestling with him for clarification. Getting clarity takes time. Finding it is often done alone, as you discern what is essential and what is incidental.

Do you still wrestle with God? The Lord invites us to converse with him. "Come now, let's settle this", he says. "Let's work this out. Let's reason this out". This wrestling isn't a fight but an intense conversation. The aim is to find clarity about God's plan.

Second, walking with God means listening for specific changes of direction. I can say from experience that when I spend time with the Lord, I get fresh and creative thoughts. I get new ideas and fresh direction. He even stirs up my emotions.

When you regularly spend time with the Lord, you will discover things in your life that need to be fine-tuned – or even radically changed.

Third, walking with God means being quiet so that God can speak. Many of us feel the incessant urge to stay busy, to keep active, to accomplish more, and to get things done. It is all about staying productive. Of course, there's certainly nothing wrong with getting things done. But the danger is when a super-active lifestyle is the norm. I have had to force myself to realize the importance of balancing times of work with times of refreshment. Both are productive. Both are essential.

If you don't spend time being quiet with God, you can't hear what He has to say. You won't know how He wants to change your life. You won't discern His promises. Your assurance about tomorrow will seem weak. A guilty conscience will plague you. You and God won't seem like friends. Instead, it will feel like He is some alien force, and you will feel strange around Him. Abraham is called "the friend of God" partly because he spent time with God.

What happens when we walk with God?

First, the discipline of silence increases our sensitivity. When I am always moving fast, always making a noise, always being active, I become insensitive. But when I am quiet, the veneer is peeled away. I become more sensitive to God.

Secondly, the reassurance of His will decreases our anxiety. When I spend time with God, my anxiety is washed away.

Third, the submission of obedience proves our humility. When I do what God says, I prove to Him I am willing to submit to His will. I listen to Him and obey. This interaction solidifies our relationship and brings us into closer communion.


