

# **Clothed in Humility**

(I Peter 5:1-11)

I wonder what it would have been like to be a shepherd of one of the congregations that Peter was addressing. He found it necessary to write things such as, "do not be surprised at the fiery ordeal . . .", "If you suffer . . . have no fear of them.", and ". . . keep your conscience clear, so when you are abused . . ." He reminded them that they were to not be like they were before but to put away malice and guile and insincerity." He had the temerity to address women and slaves as human beings that could make their own decisions.

The congregations were having to navigate an environment that was hostile to their way of thinking and the effects that it had on their lives. As he concludes his letter to a church under duress, he places an extra load in the form of encouragement on those who were elders. I expect that a proud or overbearing elder would not last long in such an environment. What would it be like to tend a flock of believers in such a world. How does one keep Jesus as Lord and still "honor the emperor"? How does a man manage a household now that his servants have been given instruction that went above his head? How does a man learn to be gentle with his wife so that his prayers are not hindered (this would have been shocking to most).

Those who served as elders did not do so because society expected it of them. They did not do so because it gave them social or financial advantage. They did not serve to tell others what to do but rather to act in such a way as to be imitated by the flock. All of this was counter cultural.

Peter reminds the elders of two things: First, there is a Chief Shepherd to whom they will answer. Second, they are to serve with humility. The "younger men" (although I suspect he is addressing everyone) are encouraged to be subject to the elders. They, too, are to clothe themselves with humility. Again, all these cut against the culture of that day . . . and this one.

The reason, "God opposes the proud, but gives grace to the humble." This reminder is followed by a series of short encouraging imperatives that help us to survive spiritually in a hostile environment. Perhaps we need to think a little bit about what a hostile environment looks like. It is not just persecution, which I am certain happened to some. It can also exist in a world where everything is going well. King Ahab, in the Old Testament, reigned over a time of richness and prosperity. It caused the prophets to cater to the king and turn their back on God. God's prophet, Elijah, ended up running for his life even after demonstrating God's power.

It is easy for us to think that our prosperity is a result of our hard work. I have learned in my life that there are people who work much harder than I ever have and will never be prosperous in the way that I understand it. Humility keeps that thought near to the surface and reminds me that there is nothing that has happened to a human being that could not happen to me.

Peter's encouraging closing to his letter gives us the strength and the how of resisting the devil. Knowing that the One in us is greater than the one in the world is powerful if we will but acknowledge that our will(power) alone is not enough. When a group of people with a purpose clothe themselves in humility it becomes possible to change things for the better.
