Making Things Right

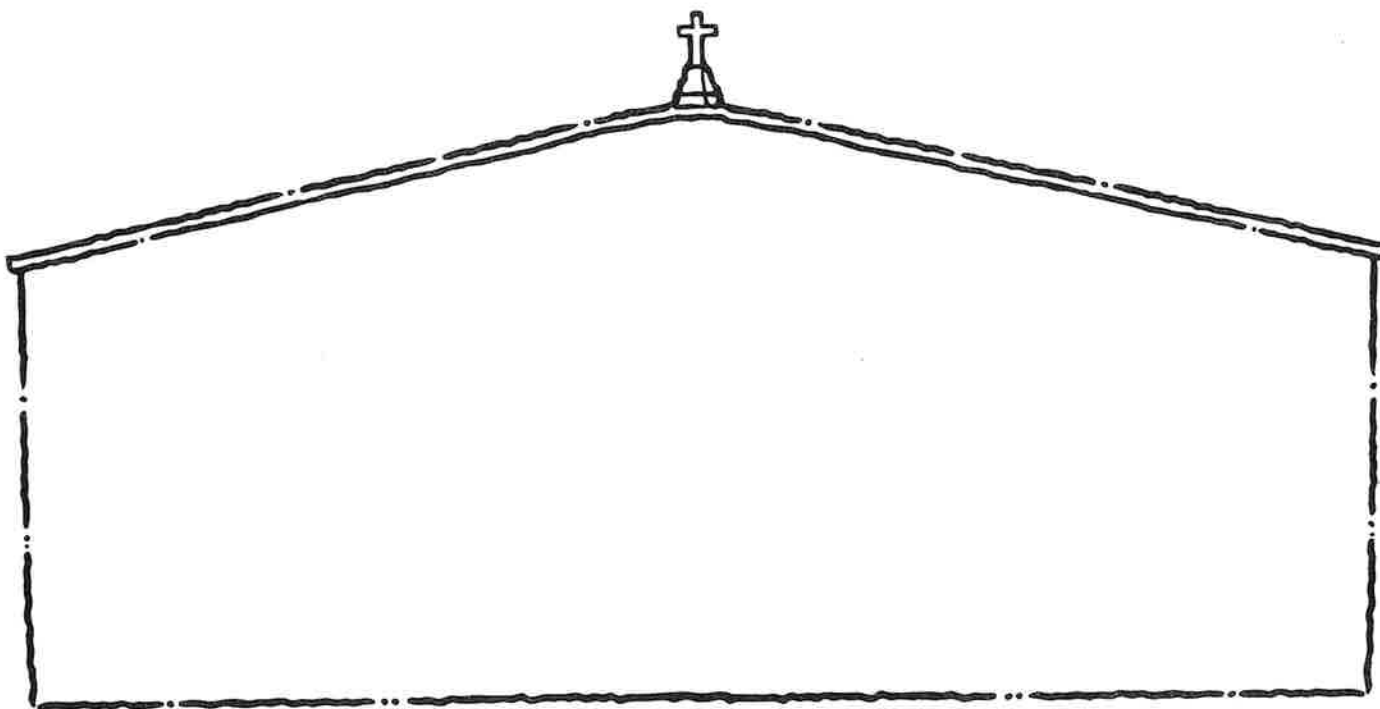
