#### FROM DAVID'S DESK...

Last Monday, April 8<sup>th</sup> was one of those days for which words can only point, but never fully describe the experience. Our trip to Waco served two purposes—to finalize my father's estate disbursement, and to watch the solar eclipse, with Waco being in the path of totality.

We met early in the workday with my father's banker, as the bank would be closing for the eclipse. What might have been an otherwise business-like appointment became a rich moment of gratitude and connections. Ramon (my father's beloved and trusted bank officer) told some wonderful stories of his conversations with my father. After several stories, I started to express my gratitude for the kindness and care he and the bank in Waco had given assisting in my father's financial affairs. However, as I started to say thank you, a deep well of tears sprang up and I could only bow my head for a moment. Ramon was wonderful—he didn't say a word, he simply sat quietly. I admitted I had not anticipated that well of emotion, but it no doubt was rooted in Ramon's care for my father, and the influence my father had made on Ramon. After that moment of welled up emotion, we put together that Ramon and our middle daughter had been at the same high school at the same time, that they knew each other, and that another bank officer who joined in the conversation had lived one street over from where we lived in Waco and one of his brothers had played on our son's Little League baseball team. The connections ran deep and long, and while in one sense what we were doing was closing a significant chapter in our lives in Waco, we were reminded that there are always connections that remain, relationships that endure, lights that still reflect into the future. In the midst of taking care of 'personal business,' we were reminded of the communal reality of our living, which makes sense because my father banked at Community Bank and Trust.

A couple of hours later, Pam and I parked our car in a very large parking lot to witness the total eclipse. We were two of no more than 20 people who chose that spot on the top of a hill for viewing. The forecast was not promising, and the clouds would come and go. About 5 minutes before totality, a very large cloud obscured the sun, and we were afraid we would miss seeing the main event. However, just before totality began the cloud moved, and for more than 4 minutes we were part of a cosmic event (I know we are part of a cosmic event every moment, but we were mindful of this reality in a unique way). With totality, the birds 'hushed their singing,' the parking lot lights came on, the temperature dropped a bit, and Venus and Jupiter became visible. Most remarkably, with the sun totally obscured by the moon, we could view

the sun's corona and a couple of orange flares on the lower right side of the sun. While it was never completely dark (there was light along the horizon as the moon passed in front of the sun), the colors of an eclipse—both in the sky and on the land—differ from the shades of sunrise and sunset.

I would not say that experiencing the solar eclipse was a life-changing moment for me; however, I was profoundly aware of being part of something deeply personal in the morning and magnificently cosmic in the early afternoon. There was much to consider—life, death, the heavens in their courses, the presence of God through all of it—and for the second time that day, when I started to say something to Pam, a deep well of tears emerged and the silence of unspoken awe seemed most appropriate.

Perhaps if one observation can be made of both experiences last Monday it is this. Even when the sun was completely covered by the moon, light in the form of the sun's corona shone magnificently. Not even the complete covering of the source of light prevented the light from shining, albeit in a way I had never seen before. Once I could talk again, I simply shared with Pam what the writer of the gospel of John once wrote—"the light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it." I think that truth applied to both the morning and the afternoon, and its truth carries us all through the night.

#### STYROFOAM RECYCLING

In 2019, a coalition of local churches called "Churches Caring for Creation," decided to work together to develop a program with the goal of safely recycling #6 plastic (Styrofoam). First Christian joined the group. We collected Styrofoam at the church and when a load was collected someone drove it to Ada where there was a collection station. During the pandemic the Ada station closed.

University Lutheran Church at 914 Elm has a "Styro-Station" where foam can be dropped off. Access is from their church parking lot located on College, behind the church. Hours are Monday–Friday from 9 a.m.–5 p.m. A drop box is available outside the door if the church is closed.

Styrofoam items are marked with a number 6 in a triangle and PS underneath. It will snap in two when bent. If it bends or has no 6 on it, it is not Styrofoam. All Styrofoam must be very clean to be recycled and all paper and tape must be removed. All food must be removed before recycling. Washing in soapy water will remove any grease and food stains are OK. Keep egg cartons whole as they are given to a family with a poultry farm.
