Dear disciples of Jesus:

Life is full of ups and downs. Faith is not only joy and abundant life, it is also struggle, challenge and contradiction. Daily every Christian is gifted with the blessings of eternal life, and challenged with illness, pain, loss and the unpredictability of the world, the weather, markets and politics.

You can see that Jesus was right when he said: If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. (Matthew 16,24)

First Lutheran Church A Letter from the President

We had our first heat wave of the summer in Orland during the second week of July when we had a string of days well in excess of 100 degrees. We had plenty of days in the 90's in the weeks prior, but that doesn't qualify as a heat wave in Orland. I, however, was in Monterey during that week where the daily highs ranged from 65 to 70 degrees. I have to say that I feel a little guilty about being on the coast when my fellow Orlanders were enduring the heat, but not guilty enough to regret it.

We had a great Pentecost Sunday at First Lutheran on June 8th. Most of the congregants were dressed in some kind of Pentecost Red which added to the "Spirit" of the occasion. Not only was that Sunday a celebration of the dramatic arrival of the Holy Spirit two thousand years ago, but it was also a day to celebrate the confirmation of five dedicated young people who attended Pastor Jose Luis' confirmation classes during the past school year. Bible verses which had been selected by the confirmands for their special meaning to them were read to the congregation. And each student was given an opportunity to say a little something about his or her Christian faith. All in all it was a wonderful celebration which was followed by cake and refreshments in the fellowship hall.

After a very strong month in April which I reported in the last edition of the Lutheran Light, May and June were a bit lackluster financially. First Lutheran's net income/loss for the month of May was a loss of \$4,304.30. June was a little better than break-even at \$349.03 in net income. Church attendance tends to be a down a bit during the summer months due to people's vacation and travel schedules, so a drop-off in giving is normally expected. We are hoping things will pick up once we get into the fall.

On July 31st First Lutheran volunteers will be providing dinner to the student musicians attending the annual Orland High School Band Camp. I believe that providing a lunch or dinner for the students at the camp has been an annual tradition at First Lutheran ever since some of the high school students attending our church were in the Orland High band decades ago. Thanks to those volunteers who have chosen to help us continue the tradition.

I hope you all have a wonderful rest of your summer, and I look forward to writing to you again in the October/November edition of the Lutheran Light.
