First Lutheran Church A Letter from the President

I'd like to talk a bit about the weekly Bible study held at First Lutheran Church.

The Bible Study is held on Tuesdays at 10:00 am in First Lutheran's fellowship hall, and is hosted by Doug Boone and me. We typically have about a dozen attendees, though our record attendance is around fourteen or fifteen. Most are members of First Lutheran, though a few of the participants are from other churches, including St. Paul's Lutheran.

Our study approach is to read and discuss the Bible passages scheduled to be read during the upcoming Sunday service. Our aim is to gain a better understanding of the selected scriptures in advance of the service in the hope that the passages will be more meaningful to us while they are being read in church.

In the past I have been involved in Bible studies which concentrate on a single book of the Bible or on a particular Biblical theme, and this can be an excellent study approach. But one of the advantages of our format is that you don't need to have been at the prior study sessions to understand what is going on at the present one. We deal with a fresh set of readings every week, and the readings often come from books of the Bible which were not covered in the prior week's study. So no prior knowledge is required.

If you decide to come to the study you will usually be treated to some delicious baked goods, often courtesy of Spike Schonauer, who has revealed himself to be an impressive and creative master of the baking arts. I always look forward to seeing what new creation will be displayed on the table when I walk in. And, of course, since we're a Lutheran church there is always coffee.

If you become a regular participant, I will put you on the email list, so you have copies of the scriptures in the Bible translation we will be reading in church. And Gary Carter always brings a few extras in case you didn't have time to print them out before the study. Feel free to also bring whatever translation of the Bible you happen to have as we like to share the different takes our Bibles have on the same verses.

So if you have an interest in gaining a deeper understanding of God's word, I encourage you to attend one of our sessions to see if it's something that might be right for you. Our study is conducted in a very friendly, easy-going atmosphere and involves a wide-ranging discussion of our thoughts and feelings regarding the scriptures and how they relate to our modern times and personal experience. And typically, there's a fair amount of joking around. In short, we have a pretty good time. I Hope to see you there.

and his accompanying *Letter to Pope Leo X*. As controversy concerning his writings grew, Luther was instructed to write a reconciliation-minded letter to Pope Leo X (1475–1521). To this letter he appended a nonpolemical tract describing the heart of his beliefs, *The Freedom of a Christian*. Luther's Latin version added an introduction and a lengthy appendix not found in the German edition. The two editions arose out of the different audiences for them: the one addressed to theologians, clerics, and church leaders (for whom Latin was the common language), and one addressed to the German-speaking public, which included the nobility, townsfolk, many from the clergy, and others who could read (or have Luther's writings read to them). This volume is excerpted from The Annotated Luther series, *Volume 1*.
