Leaving A Legacy

Psalm 71:17-18

QUICK REVIEW

Looking back at your notes from this week's teaching, was there anything you heard for the first time or something that caught your attention, challenged, or confused you?

MY STORY

Psalm 71 gives us a picture of someone who has walked with God over a lifetime and now has a deep desire to pass that faith on to the next generation. His focus isn't just on finishing life—but on leaving a legacy that points others to God.

Who has had a significant spiritual influence on your life? What did they pass on to you that made a difference?

As we grow older, we are constantly forming habits and shaping what we will leave behind—whether we realize it or not. Every choice we make today is quietly building the legacy we will pass on tomorrow.

If someone followed your life closely, what would they learn about God from watching you?

DIGGING DEEPER

Read Psalm 71:17–18

The psalmist reflects on God's faithfulness and expresses a desire to declare His power to the next generation.

Why is it important to intentionally pass on our faith rather than assume it will happen naturally?

Read Psalm 71:1–5

The psalmist describes God as his refuge, rock, and hope.

How does developing a deep, personal knowledge of God shape the kind of legacy we leave?

Read Psalm 71:20

“Though You have made me see troubles, many and bitter, You will restore my life again...”

How does remembering what God has brought you through strengthen your trust in Him today?

Read Psalm 71:14 and Hebrews 13:8

Biblical hope is rooted in the unchanging nature of God.

What is the difference between worldly hope and biblical hope? Why does that matter?

Read Psalm 71:15–18

The psalmist commits to continually declaring God's works.

What are some practical ways you can share your faith and experiences with the next generation?

Read Matthew 28:19–20

Jesus calls us to “go” and make disciples.

What does it look like to move from simply learning about God to actively investing in others spiritually?
