
An Oasis of a Group for Children and Adults

What is a Parish?

In the Lochee Ward we have four councillors. If we have a council matter, we can visit them at their surgeries. For our children the local schools have catchment areas. We also have our local GPs, dentists, police and community centres; we could go on. We used to have a local bank, but now that is lost. Local services are a comfort, a place

where we are known, where we are remembered, within walking distance. A place of familiarity, and a place that desires to serve, to support, to understand the local people. To build the local community in a way that call centres half way across the world never could.

The parish system for churches works on the same principle. A local church for the local people. Our church, a place where we are known, a place where we are remembered. A place for spiritual guidance and care. A place to get help with direction and purpose, with anxiety, with loss. For these struggles we often associate with mental health. A place of support in times of sickness or the death of a loved one. A place for a word of encouragement and prayer. But also, a place of celebration, for marriage and births.

If you live within the parish area of Lochee centre (see map) you can consider Lochee Baptist Chapel to be one of your local churches and our pastors are ready and available to serve the spiritual needs of family and friends.
