THOUGHTS FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR

Do you want to be made well? This is the question at the heart of my sermon on Sunday, May 1, when we gather for our Annual Congregational Meeting, and it is a question that Jesus still asks individuals and congregations today: Do you want to be made well? Of course, this question implies that we are not well, that there are parts of our individual and corporate lives that are not yet as they should be. And we know this. We know we aren't all we could be, but the directness of Jesus' question gets to the real issue: **What are we going to do about it?**

Fifteen years of ordained ministry have convinced me that healing is possible; individuals, families, and churches can be transformed. People can change. Situations can improve. Institutions can grow. I've seen it time and time again. God is in the business of changing lives.

So, how do we do it? How do we put ourselves on a path to spiritual growth and transformation? How do we live out an affirmative answer to the question: Do you want to be made well? Well, as individuals, we have to be honest about our shortcomings; we have to make space in our daily routines for God; and we have to be willing to try new things, get out of our comfort zones, and listen to other people. As a church, we have to ask the hard questions about the church's purpose; we have to be willing to challenge long-held assumptions, try new things, and follow the Spirit's lead; and we have to take a critical look at who is not around our tables and then ask why.

Jesus is asking us, "Do you want to be made well?" And nearly three years of ministry at Fairmount have convinced me that the answer is "Yes!" You do want to be made well; this is why you commit time and energy to the ministry and missions of the church. You want to be made well, you want to grow, you want to be made whole, but as we embark on this journey of transformation, we have to remember that any attempt at spiritual growth that does not involve an active relationship with Jesus - in the myriad of forms that the relationship can take - will lead to frustration, because there will come a point in our journey when we will run out of energy, courage, and hope. There will be times when we feel stuck, lost, and alone, and it is in those moments when we will need the grace and love of God to move us forward in faith.

The man to whom Jesus posed this question did not answer it directly; instead he explained all the reasons he had not been able to climb into the healing waters of the pool he had been seated by for thirty-eight years. But that didn't stop Jesus from showing him a way forward. "Stand up." Jesus said. "Stand up, pick up your mat, and walk (John 5:8)." And at once, John tells us, the man was made well.

In the commands of Jesus, he found the healing he had been longing for.

Jesus came that we might have life and have it abundantly, so as we move into our second century and celebrate all that God has done in and through this congregation over the past one hundred years, let us also recommit to following Jesus into the future. I am not certain what the future holds for Fairmount, but I know that if we seek to do what Jesus teaches us to do (love, forgive, hope, and give) we will have all the resources, courage, creativity and leadership we need to grow into the community the world needs us, and God wants us, to be.

"Following Christ" are the first two words of our vision statement for a reason - everything we hope to do and be as a community of faith finds its grounding in the one who promises to be with us, and for us, and in us, in all things. Change is possible. Hope is real. The future of Fairmount is bright, because the one who calls us and commands us, is the one who has the power to make us well.

A NOTE FROM SESSION

2015 was a busy year for the Session (the governing body of the church). Here are some highlights of their work:

- Completed a thorough building and ground assessment that clarified the priorities for building improvement.
- Approved the use of Thompson Funds for construction of the new office space, the enhancement of the balcony railing in Andersen Hall, and a new sound system for the sanctuary.
- Sent member Lorin Smith to the Dominican Republic over the summer.
- Hired Sarah Kok as our new full-time Director of Youth and Young Adults.
- Adopted a new logo for the church that tied into FPC's past and future.
- Following his annual review, worked with Pastor Derek to set goals for his ministry in 2015.
- Drafted a 2016 budget that balanced growth with good stewardship.
- Hired Susan Holderness to serve as Parish Associate for Pastoral Care.
- Approved and scheduled a Critical Cultural Competency Workshop that was presented by Crossroads Anti-Racism Organizing and Training.
- Approved spending the remaining \$35,000 in the Capital Improvement Fund to repair, clean, and secure the sanctuary stained-glass windows.
- Set the parameters and goals for the 100th Anniversary Celebration.
- Voted unanimously to permit the marriage of same-sex couples at the church.
- Voted unanimously to proceed with the steps necessary to sell the former manse and to create a Task Force to facilitate the reapportionment and sale of the property in a way that benefits the vision and values of the church.

At their January Retreat the Session identified the following goals as their top priorities for 2016:

1. Communicate and implement a plan for the building and grounds that supports the church's vision, with a focus on determining the use of newly available time and financial resources following disposition of the manse.
2. Communicate with the congregation regarding the new governance structure and its implications, with a focus on developing both a strategy and system to engage and recruit individuals to participate in the mission and ministries of the church, in ways that both match their gifts/interests and challenge them to grow.
3. Oversee and execute the 100th Anniversary activities and integrate with vision and other goals.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

Eric Dillenbeck's Sabbatical

From June 5th until September 6th Associate Pastor Eric Dillenbeck will be on sabbatical, defined as an opportunity "for pastors to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily parish life and to engage in a period of renewal and reflection."

*"In returning and rest you shall be saved;
in quietness and in trust shall be your salvation." (Isaiah 30:15)*

I am going to spend this sabbatical time exploring spiritual gifts. To do this I will be learning and trying out new things to help me reconnect with and reclaim the spiritual gifts that have nurtured my life, so that they can lead to renewal of enthusiasm and creativity in my ministry.

Part of my study time will be spent exploring different spiritual gift inventories that we will be able to use together in the life of this congregation. The use of a spiritual gifts inventory will help each member evaluate his/her own spiritual gifts so that we can more easily discover and renew the pathways of service and commitment that call forth the most joy and life in us. Because of the many different opportunities presented to us this fall with the 100th Anniversary celebrations, our congregational exploration of spiritual gifts will be scheduled for the winter months.

I am very excited about this time of discovery and rest and am very grateful to have this opportunity. I will spend most of my sabbatical time here in Ohio with some travel built into the month of August. The hope and the promise for this time is to start anew and be renewed, bringing this energy and understanding to my ministry going forward. May this time of renewal and creativity in my life also be that for our entire community at Fairmount. When we are reunited in September we will share insights and give thanks to God for this time of renewal as we move together into our centennial celebrations.

Having received my master's degree in organ and sacred music, and then setting out in music ministry, 40 years ago, the theme of this sabbatical will be refreshment, rest, inspiration, and gathering of steam for the coming years. My return in the fall will also mark fifteen years of being your Minister of Music and Organist.

There are certainly musical components of the sabbatical. I am joining relatives in Charleston, SC, in early June to attend the Spoleto Festival of classical music, theater and dance. The biggest offering of their season is Gershwin's *Porgy and Bess*. Amid the countless musical offerings, I did happen to note many organ recitals at the city's churches. I would not miss seeing Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest*, as the main character is Algernon Moncrieff.

Of a similar nature is my week at the Chautauqua Institution in late July. Many of you know the tranquility and beauty of the place, plus the intellectual stimulation. The day always starts with worship at the Amphitheater and ends with a cultural event. I will attend during Week Five, when the National Geographic Society joins in considering "People and Environment." The day is filled with lectures and conversations. I see that the Rev. Dr. Otis Moss, III, senior pastor of Trinity U.C.C. in Chicago, is the preacher for the week. Over six days you can bet that I will pick up ideas for worship, as well as choral and organ literature.

The highlight of the summer will certainly be an 11-day Italian tour that includes Rome, Florence, Venice, Bologna, Pisa, and Assisi. There is an emphasis on sacred sites, and this is one of the few tours that spend a day in Assisi. It would be impossible to return from this trip without being inspired!



2015 Budget Highlights

- Total Expenses exceeded Total Revenue by \$12,953 despite nearly doubling the Serve Council budget (81% expansion) and setting a Tithes and Offerings budget that was \$65,000 more than received the previous year. (Line 17)
- Non-pledge Plate Offerings (Sunday morning collections) were up 40%, indicating an increase in worship participation.
- Other Income underperformed because Gifts from Trust and Estates were down by nearly 50% as compared to previous years. (Line 4)
- Total Properties Draw from endowment was significantly lower than budgeted because several of the major 2015 projects (Transparency Project, Office Move, Railings in Andersen Hall) carried over into 2016. (Line 7)
- Administration Expenses at 90% due in part to energy savings. (Line 12)

2016 Highlights

- Total Operating Draw from Endowment increased by 16% due to stronger fund performance and applying 5%, 5-year average rule to Mary Marm Wilson Operating Draw. (Line 6)
- Added income line for Parish Associate for Pastoral Care position that is being paid for from special fund. (Line 8)
- Total Revenue increase due to larger draw from Thompson Fund (sanctuary sound system) and stronger performance from funds. (Line 10)
- Administration Expense increased due to adding Parish Associate and moving Music Assistant expense from Faith Formation to Administration. (Line 13)
- Care Council reduced by moving a few budget lines to Session Expense. (Line 16)
- Serve Budget remains unchanged, any increase in giving to be directed towards mission to reach goal of 10% of budget allocated towards mission. (Line 17)
- Session Expenses lower due to adjustment of our annual denominational support to governing bodies of the church. (Line 18)
- Total Expenses reduced (-\$11,000) when you take into consideration the \$125,000 additional draw from Thompson Fund to replace sanctuary sound system. (Line 19)

Summary: This budget represents a faithful and hopeful outlook for 2016 and beyond. Due to a strong stewardship response from the congregation for 2016, costs savings, increased performance of our funds, and the use of special funds to augment ministry and mission, 2016 looks to be a realistic and exciting year as we continue to live into Session's vision for our congregation. The challenge before us is to maintain our costs, while increasing giving for the purpose of reaching Session's goal of 10% of our budget being dedicated to mission (Serve Council Budget.)

SERVE COUNCIL REPORT

SERVE Council Report

In 2015 the Serve Council wrestled with the implications of the mission spectrum we have created to invite one another to consider the ways we serve in and through Fairmount. The spectrum honors that each of us is in some way contributing to Fairmount’s mission footprint and invites us to consider deeper personal engagement with those whom Christ called us to serve. We desire our ministry to be marked by mutuality, solidarity, and servanthood in the name of Jesus Christ who is the Light of the World. With this in mind we believe:

- God sends us into the world to experience where God is already present and engaged.
- God’s mission is always done in partnership with God and one another.
- We must cross barriers and boundaries of different kinds as we engage in mission.

These values showed up in Fairmount’s mission statement in the line “Serve Together” and seek to inform the ministries that grow out of the Serve Council.

2015 Ministry Recap:

Greater Cleveland Congregations (GCC) - Members involved in GCC’s Gun Violence Reduction Team; Pastor Eric chaired that group. Fairmount took steps to grow our own GCC Core Team with two members attending GCC Training and starting to meet regularly.



Bridges to Bateys:

In February we led our first adult mission trip to the Dominican Republic. 15 FPC members worked together to build a latrine and lay the groundwork for twice-weekly English classes that were offered this year.

Scratch:

A cooking ministry that brought together church members and kids from the Heights Youth Club from March through May for weekly cooking classes. Led by two Fairmount youth, Will and Jimmy Brant, along with other Fairmount volunteers, we taught the children the basics of cooking, creating, failing and starting again, all essential life skills.

Habitat For Humanity:

With \$4000 from the Daane Family Fund, Fairmount participated in the 2015 Apostles Build. Together with 20 other Cleveland-area congregations and the homeowners, we rehabilitated two houses that are now providing safe and stable homes for two wonderful families.

North Church:

November once again brought us to North Church to worship and serve with our brothers and sisters who attend our Partner Church on Superior Ave.


Heights Youth Club :

Members from this community continued to serve hot meals to those in need at Calvary and Bethany. We also continued our strong support for the Cleveland Hunger Walk.


Fairmount’s Mission Spectrum



SERVE COUNCIL FINANCIAL REPORT

2015 saw Fairmount take important steps to build on the Session's commitment to increase our mission giving to 10% of the operating budget. The Serve Council's budget grew to a total of \$56,550.00, which almost doubled the mission budget from 2014. This represented 4.5% of the church's budget. This was an important first step, and together this community will be able to take the strides necessary to hit that 10% mark in the next few years.

FAITH FORMATION COUNCIL REPORT

The Faith Formation Council is concerned with supporting growth of faith in all its different forms, for children, youth, and adults. We live in a rapidly changing world posing many new questions and problems that require new responses from us as Christians. Here are some highlights from this year:

Adult Education Hour Sunday Mornings

Adults and youth experienced the life story and problems of a courageous, articulate, and warm transgender person. The engaging presentation made an obvious case for greater acceptance of GLBTs by society and church as contributing members and persons deserving respect, just as everyone else.

We also had a combined adult and youth class around the images of God led by Pastor Eric, where we were challenged to think about how we identify God and how we may be transformed by how other people and cultures identify God.

The major theme of the winter was the Belhar Confession. This confession is currently under consideration for ratification by the Presbyterian Church (USA) and adoption into our Book of Confessions. The discussions were skillfully led by dedicated members of our congregation, supported by essential contributions from Amy Kim Kyremes-Parks, the Director of Spiritual Formation. The Belhar Confession was adopted by the Dutch Reformed Mission Church in South Africa in 1986, based on the realization that the ideology/theology of Apartheid was contrary to the vision of God and Jesus for a just church and human society. The name Belhar is derived from the suburb of Cape Town, South Africa, where the confession was originally written. What are the main new points of the Belhar Confession and why is it relevant for us in America in 2016? The Belhar Confession emphasizes the unity of the community of believers who have been reconciled with God and with one another and that this unity must become visible in the Church. Hence, it rejects any doctrine absolutizing either natural diversity or separation of people that breaks the unity of the church.

Furthermore, it believes that the church is called by God to be a peacemaker and an advocate of justice and true peace among people. In this manner, the Belhar Confession provides a major ideological foundation for a peaceful termination of conflicts and a peaceful way forward, as it was in South Africa for apartheid with a path of Truth and Reconciliation. These beliefs are as relevant for us as we, too, are called to be peacemakers, striving for God's justice in our society, remaining in unity through Christ by appreciating differing viewpoints, practicing love, respect, and unity despite those differences, and seeking understanding and common ground.

Youth and Young Adult Ministry

We are thankful to have the addition of Sarah Kok as our new Director. Sarah has brought a new life to ministry at Fairmount and we are grateful! Youth Ministry Sunday School has grown this year with some wonderful conversations around the lectionary passage for the day.

Young Adults continue to meet monthly for Theology on Tap where they discuss issues of life and faith all while enjoying a meal and building community. They have also taken time to serve together with Habitat for Humanity and help with the Heights Youth Club. Monthly brunches after worship are also starting back up.

Youth activities have included monthly meal serving at Bethany Church, great Bible study and conversations around issues of faith, new people joining us, and deeper community being built across the program. Many of our youth will participate in summer opportunities: serving in the Dominican Republic, attending the Presbyterian Youth Triennium, and serving in Asheville, NC, through the Asheville Youth Mission.

Children's Ministries

Children's Ministries meets Sunday mornings for Godly Play Sunday School for pre-3rd grade children while 4-6th grade meets for Connect. All children are interacting with the scriptures in unique ways.

This year WE (worship enrichment) time was created for children pre-3rd grade to sing, pray and hear the scripture during the message, prayer and offering time of the 11:00 worship service. We believe having all of us start and end worship together as a church family is powerful and a wonderful way to make space for all of us. If you have not read through the Guide for Worship that is now in each pew, please take time to read through it. There are wonderful suggestions and information for all.



CARE COUNCIL REPORT

Also, the CCCs staff a table after worship on the first Sunday of the month with cards so that our members may write to folks on our prayer chain or anyone they have noticed has not been in church. We want our parishioners to know we are thinking of them and praying for them. Thanks to Mary Giffin for organizing and adding to this ministry.

Our members continue to deliver flowers after each Sunday worship. We frequently hear how much folks appreciate this ministry of being remembered during an illness, loss, or important birthday. Thanks to Carol Adrine for overseeing this ministry. Also, prayer shawls are knitted by a number of our members. Pastors and home visitors are encouraged to take one to someone they think would enjoy being wrapped in the love of God.



With the help of Tuni Chilcote and Deborah Erwin, we hope to start again home visitation by parishioners. These will be visits to those among us who can no longer attend worship with us, or have few family or visitors surrounding them. If you know folks who would enjoy receiving visits, please let us know.

We are also starting up a program to deliver meals to those who are home with a new baby or after a hospital stay. Vicki Mentreck will use the “meal train” web site. All it takes is a click to find out when a meal is needed, what has been delivered, and how to get to the person’s house. Just sign up for a day to take food. Simple!

Finally, January, 2016, we hosted a brunch for our pregnant folks and families with young children. This was a first step to listen to their needs and see how the church community can help.

With the new structure our Deacons are organizing these ministries but need your participation. There is a wide range of time commitments. Hopefully, you will find at least one place where you can be the feet or hands of Christ.

CARE COUNCIL REPORT

Worship Volunteers Ministry Team

For the past year Marnee Anderson and Steph Washlock have worked with the Deacons and Elders to serve communion on the first Sunday of the month in the Sanctuary and weekly in the Chapel. This is new for the Deacons; in the past Elders (current and those in the Elders' Association) have comprised the Communion Service Teams. In the summer of 2015 we began a ministry of at-home communion and gluten-free bread for Communion Service. The at-home Communion was well accepted by those who received it and is now in the planning stages to be offered more routinely to our members who can't make it to Fairmount on a regular basis. Pam MacWilliams is heading up this outreach. The gluten-free bread for all was met with mixed reviews and it has been decided to return to having gluten-free bread available only for those who need/prefer it. For the coming year Marnee and Steph will be working to get others involved in the Communion process.

Fellowship Ministry Team

In 2015 the Deacons continued our strong tradition of providing opportunities for the congregation to grow together through fellowship. We organized three big events this year:

- The Honor Dinner in May, which celebrates our members who are 80 years of age and older.



- Another successful Strawberry Festival in June that provided free entertainment and fellowship to members and visitors alike. The event brought in over \$2000 in donations to the Heights Youth Club.

- Our Annual Celebrate Sunday Potluck in September to help us kickoff our program year in style. In addition to these glorious events we also supported many other smaller events like the Christmas Party and other gatherings where food was involved.



ENDOWMENT REPORT

2015 Year-end Annual Report of the Endowment Committee

The Endowment Committee consists of Trustees who are responsible for the management of the financial assets in the general operating, property and specialized endowment funds of Fairmount Church. Asset allocations are maintained within the ranges approved by Session; the asset mix as of December 31, 2015, was 67.6% equities, 28.5% fixed income and 3.9% multi-class and cash alternatives. Fairmount's investment funds are advised by Compass Group of Wells Fargo Advisors. The Endowment Committee is responsible for ensuring that gifts and withdrawals are accounted for properly, and that withdrawals are in keeping with donor and policy guidelines. The committee works closely with the Compass Group in making decisions about investment funds.


