Use this time of celebration and reflection as a time of spiritual renewal.

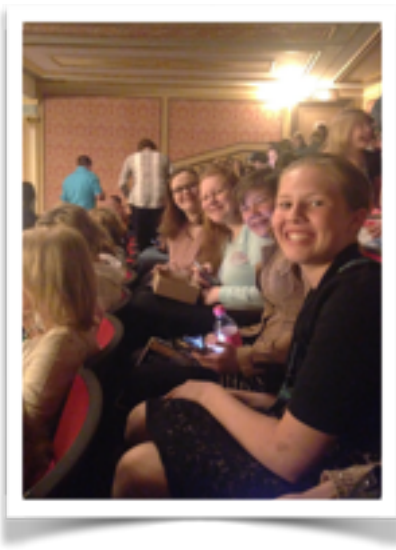

Youth Summer Mission Recap:

Triennium: Ever wonder what it would be like to worship with 5000 high schoolers from all across the country? This July, three of our high schoolers joined 23 other youth from our Presbytery at Presbyterian Youth Triennium, a joint conference of the PCUSA and the Cumberland Presbyterian church at Purdue University. They explored the theme "Go!" - discerning what it means to go think, work, serve, play, learn, love, and live as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Asheville Youth Mission: During the first week of August, middle schoolers served as a part of Asheville Youth Mission in Asheville, North Carolina. They learned about food insecurity, homelessness, and veterans' issues and had the chance to respond to their learning through action in the community!





Youth Ministry

This fall we're living into our new structure for Youth Ministry. We believe that this will help us better serve the needs of our youth. 4th and 5th Graders will have their own group - Club 425! They'll meet for Sunday School together, as well as a meeting on Sunday evenings once a month. Grades 6-8 will meet as our Middle School Youth Group on Thursday nights once a month and Grades 9-12 will meet as our High School Youth Group on Sunday nights once a month. Middle and High School groups will combine periodically for service projects and other meetings.

Club 425: Are you a 4th or a 5th grader who enjoys spending time with friends, exploring the important things of life and faith, and generally having a good time? Check out Club 425! We'll be meeting on the **first Thursday** of each month from 6:30-7:30.

Middle School Youth Group: Calling all 6th-8th graders! Every **third Thursday** we'll be meeting from 6:30-7:30. We'll have fun as we grow in friendship and encourage each other as we explore our faith together!

High School Youth Group: Save the date! We'll meet on the **last Sunday of the month** from 5:30-7:30. We'll share a meal and we'll shape this time together to be something that serves your needs! Come on September 25 from 5:30-7:30 and make your voice heard!

Confirmation: This year 14 youth in grades 7-9 and their mentors will be exploring discipleship and the Christian faith. We're meeting each month after worship for lunch and learning together. We're also exploring faith through service opportunities and enrichment activities each month. This promises to be a great year! Support our confirmation class by remembering them in your prayers and welcoming them at worship!

Sunday School, Beginning October 2: Youth will have a weekly opportunity to engage in Scripture and big questions of faith, and grow in relationships with God and with church friends through exciting and creative ways. Club 425 will journey through the Bible chronologically, while Middle and High School Sunday School follows the lectionary texts, giving youth a chance to examine the sermon text in depth.

Youth Summer Mission Recap: Bridges to Bateys

From June 18-26 a group of 17 high school students from Fairmount and the Heights Youth Club served as part of Fairmount's partnership with Batey 105, near La Romana in the Dominican Republic. During our week there we worked on construction for a new church building in the Batey. We did everything from emptying an endless chain of buckets into the foundation to pouring cement to solidify the walls. We also had the opportunity to interview many residents of the Batey, strengthening our connection with the community.





Making the Space to Talk @ Race

"It really boils down to this: that all life is interrelated. We are all caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied into a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly." ~ Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

In the past, both the Church of the Covenant and Fairmount have done important work in the arenas of racial integration and reconciliation. As with our country, however, the work the church needs to do is ongoing and urgent. We believe the next phase of this work involves making space for honest and open conversations about how the socially constructed concept of race, and the privilege and power it gives to some, continues to dehumanize all of us, despite any progress we've made.

Four years ago at dinner, one of our children commented on an image of President Obama on the cover of a magazine. "You know what? I would have voted for the other guy." "Why?" we asked. "Because he looks like me." This exchange took place while discerning Derek's call to Fairmount, and our child's comment confirmed what our hearts were telling us: it was time to live in a community committed to racial integration and diversity. Three and a half years later, after a summer of racial tension and confusion, we are discerning another move. This one, however, does not require packing up boxes; instead, it requires making space in our minds and hearts for something new.

We are both discerning a call to engage professionally and spiritually in what we believe to be a core issue of our time: the concept of race. We are living in a city and nation, where despite commitments to integration and reconciliation, skin color is still connected to power, privilege, and potential. Even on the international scene race plays a role in the rise of terrorism and the plight of refugees. In every corner of the political and social landscape people are talking about race, power, and white privilege, which means that we must also be talking about these issues in church. Throughout its history the church has provided moral leadership in times of tension and uncertainty, and we believe this is one of those times.

We don't envision this exploration to be easy; it will require courage and vulnerability to explore our biases and our stories, but over the next year or so, we will host a series of conversations about race at both Covenant and Fairmount. Why do this together? Because neither church is unique in its struggle to faithfully address this issue. We are not in this alone, and we have something to gain by embarking on this challenging work together. We don't know where these conversations will lead us or how long they will last, but we do hope they are a step towards transformation. At each gathering, we will create a safe space to discuss what we've learned — from books, articles, videos, and our own experiences. We will also commit to daily practices that will challenge us and report back on how these practices deepen our understanding of the role race plays in our lives.

If you feel called to take part in these conversations, let one of us know. It is important that participants make a commitment, since building the necessary trust requires consistent participation. We will most likely meet on Sunday evenings for approximately 90 minutes, every 6-8 weeks, beginning in late 2016 or early 2017. To inform and frame our exploration, both of our congregations are sending staff and church members to the *DISGRACE* conference at Montreat in October. Trends in the Church

Let's Innovate Before We Have To

Walmart continues to be the largest company in the world. Love them or hate them, they are not merely amazing innovators; they innovate before they have to. Sam Walton started Walmart in 1962 but through the years, he was a master of innovation. In the 1990s, Walmart went into rural areas while Kmart, for example, stayed in the suburbs. It took Kmart 15 years to plant stores in rural areas.

As I was walking in the Chicago Loop last week, I noticed that Walmart has adapted once again. Among the sweeping skyscrapers, a Walmart Neighborhood Market stood out on a busy corner. Also, within the city are a Walmart Express and even a Walmart Superstore. Urban Walmart stores have been around for several years now. By 2020, Walmart projects that there will be so many stores in the District of Columbia that 64% of the population will live within 2 miles of a Walmart.

So what can we learn as spiritual communities? Most of our congregations have not brought innovation to our church kitchens much less to our worship practices, our mission priorities or our organizational structures. Why is that?

We tend to confuse "traditions" with "customs." We don't want to mess with "tradition" which (we think) means that we don't want to change the way we do the Christmas pageant. Actually, Advent is a church tradition. The Christmas pageant is a church custom. We can change customs to our hearts' content. (Advent, on the other hand, will always be the four Sundays before Christmas and the days in between.)

We fear making mistakes. If our congregation shames people who make mistakes, we will never try anything new. Failure is immeasurably educational, though, and we need to do it more often.

We institutionalize customs. We have a great chili dinner one year and somebody says, "we should do this every year." Before you know it, we've had a chili dinner for 17 years and nobody likes it much anymore but "we have to do it. It's what we do on the last weekend in October."

We innovate as a last ditch effort. (And then it's too late.) We could have easily restructured our educational program or our leadership model years ago when we had the capacity to make effective change. But – for whatever reason – we didn't do it. Maybe we were complacent or we didn't want to offend somebody in power or we didn't see change coming. But we missed our window and now our educational program or our leadership pool are so depleted that we can't recover.

Last weekend, I visited a congregation of lively members who were clearly happy to be together, happy to work together, happy to serve. One member joyfully said, "we never know what's going to happen around here!" Exactly. Innovation is part of their culture.

And innovation is not important for innovation's sake. It's important because the world is changing, our contexts are changing, our populations are changing. Waiting to change the way we are the church doesn't serve the God who has called us.

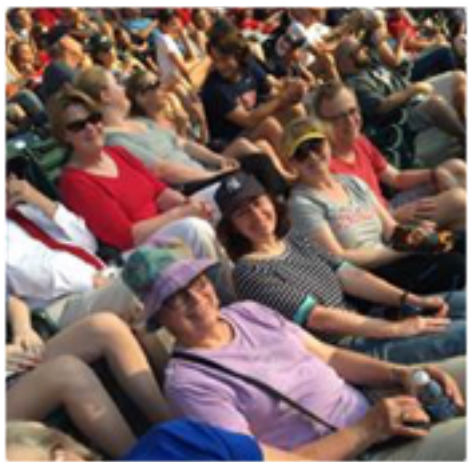
Session Update

It's been a busy summer for your Session. Here are a few highlights:

1. Under the guidance of the Refugee Task Force, the Session continues to discern how God is calling Fairmount to respond to the international refugee crisis. The task force organized an educational offering over the summer and has begun to connect with other organizations in the region who are already engaged in refugee work.
2. The Session took a pause in all the planning for Centennial Celebrations to have a conversation about "what's next" for our congregation after we turn 100. Some of the themes discussed were a renewed focus on growth, a creative use of the mission money from the centennial, and a decision on our refugee response.
3. Throughout the summer the Session heard updates from the Manse Task Force as they progressed towards selling the former manse. Half of any proceeds from the sale will be directed towards mission, with the remainder being directed towards capital improvements.
4. Finally, with the number of families with children in worship on the increase (in the past year alone seven babies were born into the Fairmount family), the Faith Formation Council began a conversation about making our worship space more accessible for families with young children with all their gear. After prayerful discernment the Session acted on a motion from the Faith Formation Council to remove selected pews in the sanctuary to create additional space for families and those with accessibility issues. As volunteers work to adapt our worship space to make it more welcoming, the Session invites your feedback as they discern the right size and scope of accessible spaces. Modifications will also be made in each location to allow the pews to be reinserted. As we seek to be an adaptive and inclusive congregation, the Session believes that slight modifications to our worship space will help families with young children and those with accessibility issues feel even more welcome.

Visitation

Occasionally, we need folks to pick up people who want to attend worship but no longer drive. If you have flexibility on Sunday morning, maybe this is a ministry where you could help.

Note writing


You may have seen the table with the green checkered table cloth in Andersen Hall on the second Sunday of the month. The table has on it note cards which you can sign or write your own message. These cards are sent to those whom we have missed, are sick, or have good news to share. The folks who receive these notes have told staff members how much it means to get a personalized message from someone from the church. You don't have to know the person to sign a card and wish them well. The church mails the cards. All we need is your willingness to take a few moments to come to the table.

Flower delivery

We continue to look for folks who are willing to deliver flowers to our sick or home bound or someone celebrating a significant birthday! We ask that you take them to the designated person within 24 hours so the flowers still look fresh. If we don't have deliverers, then the flowers do not get a "second life" with a new place of honor in someone's home. This is a great ministry to do as a family.
