

SENIOR PASTOR

"Every time your name comes up in my prayers, I say, "Oh, thank you, God!" I keep hearing of the love and faith you have for the Master Jesus, which brims over to other believers. Friend, you have no idea how good your love makes me feel, doubly so when I see your hospitality to fellow believers." - Philemon 1:4-7 (The Message)

This has been a remarkable year and one that has left me consistently in a state of excitement and gratitude. Serving as your Senior Pastor and the Head of Staff affords me precious opportunities to witness what God is doing through this church. Perhaps more so than any other year, I found myself regularly thanking God with a sense of awe for what has been happening within our family of faith here at First Pres.

One of my primary responsibilities as Senior Pastor is to lead and implement the vision and mission of our church. This ever-present and on-going work can be joyous and weighty. It can spark experiences of celebration and intentionally invite moments of necessary tension. All for one purpose: To assure that we are faithfully being the community of Christ-followers God is calling us to be. This is a work I am privileged to do with our session of elders, the individuals this congregation has nominated and elected. My focus and commitment to church vision, mission, and values has become one of the of richest and most compelling areas of emphasis for me personally. As I enter my second year of doctoral studies at Fuller Theological Seminary, I am leveraging much of my time allotted for study and exploration towards these realities and have already been encouraged to see this necessary work of discernment and discovery taking place here within our church.

Advocating for and serving alongside our staff has been a rich blessing. For the first time in several years, we have had a full staff. Pastors Karol and Chris Schilling joined us at the beginning of 2023 and Kelli Owens began her work as our Director of Family Ministry in May. Getting to know these three remarkable individuals and having the chance to see their love for God and the gifts the Holy Spirit has placed within them has been incredible. Every person on our staff has been a blessing to this congregation and a personal blessing to me. I have deeply enjoyed celebrating and encouraging these great servants of God and have been overjoyed to hear how God has used them in the lives of this congregation.

Preaching remains an area of ministry where I feel the most alive in my call. I find just as much joy as I do opportunity for humility as I regularly step behind the pulpit to offer what I pray are words of hope and conviction to those who join us for worship. I cannot express how life-giving it is for me to do the work of preaching, including the work of offering individual sermons and the process of planning the year-long preaching calendar. This year has been uniquely enriching for me as I have had more regular opportunities to hear and be inspired by the sermons offered by Pastors Karol and Chris.

In addition to the several committees and teams I serve on and support, and with a full staff this year, I have been able to engage in wider circles of ministry participation within our community, presbytery, and wider denomination. This includes ecumenical engagements, like the Interfaith Thanksgiving Service, with other faith communities in the Bloomington-Normal community as well as new invitations to serve within the Presbytery of Great Rivers. Some of my work within the presbytery has already begun while other appointments are set to begin at the start of 2024. I am glad to participate in the broader, connectional church in several ways.

Every report in this document, both those containing thoughtful paragraphs and thorough spreadsheets, is an indication of the incredible passion and faithfulness of so many within our congregation. I have been fortunate to be able to be present with and advocate for many of these groups and initiatives contained within our annual report. I pray that you are filled with the same sense of excitement and anticipation that I am as I reflect upon this testament to the life, work, and witness of First Presbyterian Church of Normal in 2023.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR

As the Minister for Congregational Care and Compassion, I spent my first year enhancing the ways we provide compassionate care in our church and in our community while giving focus to improved care for the older adults at FPC.

In the past year, we have revamped our deacon ministry, educating, and training our deacons about their roles while also tasking them to connect with the members of their flock through routine check-ins. This has led FPC members to know they have someone who is there to provide care and support to them through their life journey.

Additionally, I began coordination of pastoral care support between myself, Pastor Karol, and Pastor Matt. This includes creating an on-call pastoral care calendar to handle pastoral care emergencies while also assigning routine pastoral care check-ins with our homebound members among the three of us.

This year, I also provided an eight-week grief workshop and a seminar about loss and grief. These have helped church members learn how to affirm their feelings about loss and grief while also how to seek emotional and spiritual care when they are experiencing loss. Next year, I am planning for more workshops geared to emotional and spiritual wellness for our church members.

It also has been a year of "JOY" at our church! This summer, we started a monthly lunch fellowship program called Just Older Youth (JOY) for older adults at FPC. Each month, we have been averaging about 40 older adults at each luncheon. These gatherings help older adults to connect and have fellowship with one another. We have been holding our JOY lunches primarily in the Great Hall. Starting in 2024, we hope to plan more exciting lunches, but also plan occasional field trips and excursions for older adults. I also have spent a lot of time this year connecting with leaders of different community organizations and other faith communities to explore potential ways we can partner in providing care to those in Bloomington-Normal starting next year.

I am truly appreciative of all the great ministry we have done together in 2023. And I look forward to seeing what God has in store for us in the future!

ASSOCIATE PASTOR

I am so grateful to the people of FPC, for welcoming Chris and me into our positions, and our family into your church family. It has been a whirlwind first year with many meet-and-greets, worship services, classes, visits, and meetings. Though I have gotten to know many of you at least by name, I still feel I have a long way to go. Thankfully, with patience and persistence, we can continue to meet, connect, and grow in faith together in the coming year.

Discipleship, the focus of my pastoral position, is a lifelong commitment for all Christians to both learning and teaching. I enjoy facilitating meaningful opportunities that meet the diverse needs and interests of our congregation. In my role, I work closely with the Adult Discipleship, First Steps, and Fellowship Committees to ensure we have a variety of engagement opportunities for those in our church family. I also have had occasional partnership opportunities with the Worship, Stewardship, and Mission Committees. In addition, I support the leaders of our small groups in their work of establishing and deepening connections among their participants. Over the course of the year, I was able to visit almost every small group at least once. I often participate in the Blessings Women's Ministry, especially with their leadership team, and I was even welcomed to the Men's Bible Breakfast Fellowship!

While our online platform Church Community Builder (CCB) was new to me here, as a staff member, I have found it very helpful in organizing events, sharing information, and contacting people. If you have been uncertain about how to use it, I encourage you to give it another try! One of my learnings in CCB was that as of April, 119 people were participating in one or more small groups (just over one-fourth of the congregation). That's great – and we'd love for that number to grow in the coming year.

Already one new group formed in the fall: Our First Rodeo includes six couples who became parents in the past two years (so named because we are new to the wild adventure of parenting!). Additionally, I organized a few gatherings of college students and young adults throughout the year, with some late-year momentum that could develop into a regular group in 2024.

I am pleased to be serving with my pastoral colleagues Matt and Chris, as well as the full staff, and the many dedicated members who volunteer to serve in a variety of roles and capacities. Together, we are the church, seeking to be a community that follows Jesus. Let us continue in our ongoing path of discipleship.

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Each year we give thanks for all the talented musicians in our congregation, without whom we would be the poorer, and this year is no exception. Being blessed by them is an understatement.

Resounding Joy! This is our resident quartet that brings us wonderful musical offerings periodically. Thanks to Barb Lemmon, violin; Sarah Jome, flute; Sara Garrett, cello; and Pat Warren, bassoon.

The Worship Band faithfully leads our 11am service during the program year and is also involved with our 10am summer service. Thank you to guitarists Rob Rice, Nathan Rice, Kurt Benckendorf, and Mike Casali, Bo Bobell on drums, and Julia White, song leader. Thank you also to substitutes Jacque Hansing, Ella Burrus, and Deanna Schoolcraft.

Chancel Choir leads our 8:30am worship with anthems, responses and hymns, Sept.-May. The choir continues to maintain a high level of musicianship week after week. Thank you for your faithful service and beautiful music. We welcomed new members to the choir, and on occasion, were blessed to have former RLT members join in, too.

Adult Handbells are back in full force with eight ringers, and our handbell choir played four times this year. Thank you for all your hard work and dedication.

Summer Sing – On Wednesday evenings during the summer, we had the opportunity to gather and to sing for fun: hymns, anthems, Broadway musical numbers, and more. This gives anyone who wants to sing the chance without being in choir. It also keeps our vocal instruments in good working order for the upcoming choir season. We even had a "Christmas in July" evening. On a few occasions, the weather was nice enough to sit on the patio around the fire.

In August, we had an abbreviated choir "boot camp" for any adult who wanted to re-energize the voice. We learned about good vocal health, proper breathing techniques, vowel production and consonant placement, how to prepare the musical score, and reading through the repertoire.

A brass quartet from a neighboring school helped usher in Advent and the resurgence of First Strings (thank you Barb Lemmon) began our Advent services with beautiful carols of the season. Thank you to all our vocal soloists and instrumentalists who add so much to the worship experience throughout the year, playing solos and obbligato parts on anthems.

The first time I noticed it was in May. Having come fresh from a depleting job as an insurance professional in an economically barren community, I knew what it was to white-knuckle my way through the day. And I knew what it was to bring stress home and subconsciously serve it up with dinner to my family. What I didn't know was how finding a job that suits me well, and to which I feel called, would change that. I discovered it in May. Coming home with energy in my step and passion in my tone, as thirsty to learn as I was to lead, humbled and excited – this became my (excuse the pun) new Normal. And I share that here, in an annual report, because what I didn't know before that I'm beginning to understand is the direct impact our personal mental health routines, our self-care priorities, and our alignment with a sense of meaning have on our ministry. Our ministry as a church, yes, but also our ministry within our families. I'm writing this to say thank you. Your integration of my gifts, wild ideas, mistakes, and especially my imperfect family into your community has been one of the greatest gifts of my life.

Born from deep gratitude, one of the first priorities in my time as Director of Family Ministry was to rewrite the directional language giving shape to both Children's and Student Ministries. Here's our WHY: First Presbyterian Church Student Ministry exists to support, enhance, and participate with the work of the Triune God in the lives of our young people. Specifically acknowledging the ongoing developmental process at play in the bodies, minds, and spiritual formation of middle and high school students, we creatively seek to evoke and collaborate around the questions and felt needs that are most alive for students during this leg of their journey. While this was written for and adapted to our church website specifically for our middle and high school students, its focus also applies to our Children's Ministry.

I would like to highlight and expound two parts of that WHY statement above as particularly potent in 2023. The first is the phrase "participate with the work of the Triune God." One of the things Pastor Matt and other staff members have been wonderful about is making sure I know it's okay to "make this your own". However, what I want to ensure I communicate this year is that the work of God in the lives of First Pres families didn't start with my arrival on the scene. A sensitivity to place, context, and relational backstory are as important as the confidence to begin something new. Therefore, part of the HOW I've tried to embody is the posture of yes, a leader; yes, a creative; yes, an innovator – but also that of a listener. Listening for how we can participate in a work bigger than ourselves.

The second phrase I would emphasize here is "creatively seek to evoke and collaborate around the questions and felt needs." It can be easy for Children's and Student Ministries to fall into preaching at, teaching to, and boldly instructing at the expense of relational and collaborative curiosity. Taking cues from Jesus, who told us to become like children, this phrase hints at an exploratory companionship rather than a dogmatic methodology of certitude. It speaks to the gentleness of evocative questions and the challenge of entering our own unknowns rather than hastily quenching those of the little ones with a hard and fast certainty.

These are the values and the vision for our Time With Children, Sunday School lessons, Kidz Worship, Kids of the Kingdom, Camp, and VBS programs. These WHYs provide shape for the WHATs of Youth Group events, service projects, Confirmation curriculum, fellowship celebrations, and Mission Trips. We can list these activities as connectional only as far as our spirit mirrors that of the relational complexity, imaginative empowerment, and playful vulnerability we experience in the Triune God with whom we participate. FINANCIAL POSITION

Our year-end financial position is strong. We remain debt-free and ended the year with \$692,550 in general fund cash and investments, an increase of \$129,687 from the beginning of the year.

The change in general fund cash and investments is summarized as follows:

The unrestricted operating reserve represents the amount available to pay routine operating budget expenses and amounts to about 6 1/2 months of budgeted 2024 operating expenses.

Our strong financial position allows us to respond to emerging opportunities, take unexpected expenses in stride, and withstand temporary cash flow fluctuations. It also affords the opportunity to generate some investment returns.

REVENUES AND EXPENSES

Contributions in support of our general operating budget exceeded budget by \$16,900 and exceeded the prior year's contributions by \$43,000. For the second consecutive year, total contributions grew by about 5% over the prior year.

Due to unpredictability, we didn't include any investment gains in the budget. Actual investment market gains for 2023 amounted to about \$32,000.

General expenses were about \$80,000 below budget. More than half the savings were related to salaries and benefits, mostly due to unfilled staff positions during the year. These savings aren't expected to continue in the future as we are now fully staffed. The remaining expense savings were scattered throughout all other categories.

The final bottom-line excess of revenues over expenses amounted to \$116,045 for 2023. This compares to a very small net loss in 2022, and an average net income of about \$27,000 over the last five years.

RESTRICTED ACCOUNTS

The restricted accounts represent a temporary parking spot for gifts designated for a specific purpose. During 2023, we received about \$27,000 in restricted contributions and spent about \$40,000 of restricted funds. Restricted receipts were spread throughout several accounts, with significant amounts received for memorial gifts and rummage sale proceeds. We transferred \$12,000 from the operating budget for our building and van savings accounts, \$4,000 from the operating budget for a future Habitat partial house sponsorship, and \$10,000 from the endowment account to apply to the sanctuary projector replacement project. Expenses from the restricted accounts included \$20,000 for the sanctuary projector replacement project, almost \$12,000 for distribution of rummage sale proceeds, and several smaller items. A summary of the activity in the restricted accounts is presented following the financial and budget summary.

2024 BUDGET

Session adopted a balanced budget for 2024. The projected revenue increase for 2024 over 2023 is less than our actual giving growth trends over the past few years. We don't include any investment income in the budget, although actual investment income for 2023 amounted to about \$32,000.

The expense side of the 2024 budget provides for an increase of slightly less than 3% over the 2023 budget. The budget provides for full staffing for the entire year. The only expense category with a significant increase from 2023 is Property, which includes such items as utilities, building and grounds maintenance, and technology expenses. The increase in the Property budget is primarily due to restoring technology expenses to previous levels following a one-year reduction in 2023, and to providing for some anticipated major repairs in building mechanical systems.

ENDOWMENT ACCOUNTS

In addition to the almost \$693,000 in general fund cash and investments, we had almost \$376,000 in invested endowment funds at December 31, 2023. Unrealized market gains on the endowment funds were just over \$46,000 in 2023. We deposited to the endowment accounts \$3,700 of proceeds from a bequest in 2023, and we distributed \$10,000 to general funds for the sanctuary projector project. Endowment assets are separate from the general fund assets, and the deposits and investment returns are separate from operating revenues and expenses.

ADULT DISCIPLESHIP

Adult Discipleship (AD) offered several in-person studies in 2023 and expanded offerings to provide some concurrent studies, as we had been able to do pre-Covid. We are actively seeking new committee members and have been blessed by the new ideas and energy from our Associate Pastor of Discipleship, Rev. Karol Schilling! Our current committee members include Kathy Mitchell, Dave Eaton, Todd S. Smith, Doug Schwalm, as well as Pastor Karol. We would like to thank Sheila Melzer for a brief stint on the committee and will welcome her back if her schedule changes. We also want to thank Elissa Bailey, Barb Lemmon, John Anderson, Pastor Matt, Pastor Chris, and all others who have helped out with the efforts in 2023 by leading a session or a study.

Our Spring term covered three studies, beginning with a Social Justice study led by the committee, and then we enjoyed the company of Chip Hardwick, a past minister from 2nd Pres. Bloomington, who virtually led our first study on "Crossbound", written by Chip and led by Karol. We finished the semester by offering a study on 1 John, where Elissa helped the committee facilitate.

We were excited to test out a summer series featuring an LGBTQA+ study using material from "Changing our Mind" by David Gushee, which intersected nicely with our church's new Affirmation & Inclusion statement. We anticipate continuing to offer a summer study based on the learnings of how this past year went.

Our Fall block of classes included a series of speakers jointly organized with the Mission, Peace and Justice Committee, where representatives of local missions were able to come in and speak to our congregation. The local partners were Faith in Action, Joy Care/Jobs Partnership, Mid-Central Illinois Community Action, Catalyst Ministries, Immigration Project, Boys and the Girls Club. Additionally, they included a visit from mission co-workers Bob and Kristi Rice. We then had two concurrent offerings, one on a study of Exodus, and another on Christian Mindfulness. We finished the year with a look at the Jesse Tree, led by Barb Lemmon and John Anderson).

We look forward to offering additional concurrent studies in the next year, as well as to continue to integrate themes from the sermon series and other topics, focused on our 5 main areas of Bible Study, Christian Living, Justice/Current Events, Theology, and Family/Marriage Studies.

Pastor Karol tracked attendance throughout the year, and though most weeks we average 15-20 attendees, we are pleased to report that 91 different people participated in a class at least once in 2023! We are always open to new and returning participants, even if only on occasion.

We also continue to track and discuss small groups and their needs, and we are excited about recent additional group formations. Pastor Karol has been spearheading these efforts and has additional information in her report.

BLESSINGS WOMEN'S MINISTRY

Luke 1:45: "Blessed is she who has believed that the Lord would fulfill his promises to her."

Blessings Women's Ministry has presented three video discussion formats entitled - "The Heart Of God", "Making Space," and "What Goes Around". These programs are from Live a Better Story Series. A Bible study entitled - "Speaking Wisely," that required reading scripture, questions and discussions, provided valuable lessons. Meetings were every 3-4 weeks and scheduled on Monday evenings from 6:15-7:15 at church. Attendance ranged from 12-25 women. There was no charge except for the book format.

The service projects collected items for the Baby Fold, Sheridan School in District 87, Fairview School in Unit 5, Catalyst Ministries, and Youth camp candy grams. We also socialized at Chicken Salad Chick and the Kickapoo Tearoom in Downs. All meeting times were concluded with prayer requests.

A Winter retreat was held at East Bay Camp, March 17 -18. Lori Bultemeier, Pastor at The Baby Fold was our camp speaker who spoke about the Bride of Christ in three sessions. A fee of \$50 per person was collected for 12 women.

The Women's Spring Gathering was held on Saturday, April 15. The program was entitled "The Confusing Marys of the New Testament." The presenters were Pastor Karol Schilling-Mary the mother of Jesus, Ann Lamkey-Mary Magdelene, and Irene DenBesten-Mary of Bethany. A continental breakfast was served. The service project was filling candy gram bags for our summer youth campers. Beautiful acapella voices of 38 women singing "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow" closed the joyous spring morning of fellowship.

The Annual Women's Christmas Gathering was held Saturday, December 9, 9-11:30am. KNIT-CROCHET MINISTRY

Matthew 5:16b: "...let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and praise God in heaven."

After this year's Artisan Sale, a member commented on what we do that really captured this verse. She wrote: You help to spread the light to those who need it. That fits our Knit-Crochet Ministry and we do it with joy in our hearts, as evidenced all year long, particularly in December when we start to make donations after our sale. Throughout the year we give handmade items to individuals, organizations, and our members who may need a prayer shawl or baby blanket. Once a year, our Ministry hosts a sale that allows others in the congregation who are using their art and crafting skills to join us to make items to be enjoyed by members and friends of the congregation. YWCA Stepping Stones Sexual Assault Crisis Center, an organization with the mission to help survivors and their families as they heal and build strong relationships, was selected to be our beneficiary. We made \$1,436 in generous donations. Many remaining items were also donated to YWCA for the families they serve. Alicia Whitworth, the YWCA Development Director, wrote: Thank you again for arranging for Stepping Stones to be the beneficiary! That's an incredibly generous amount that has been donated. I know that between staff and families, we have individuals in need of warm, creature comforts, and I think these will bring joy during a season that is difficult for so many.

In addition to this successful event and the many donations made to the YWCA, we made and donated four scarves to the Giving Fence, 20 hats and 20 scarves for Kemmerer Village, 15 hats for Sheridan School, 22 for Fairview School, 12 each for both hospitals' infant units. Neville House received a variety of things, including eight prayer shawls and children's items, as they have 4 young boys with moms there. More donations were made before Christmas, including afghans for nursing homes and hats, booties, and baby blankets for a local nonprofit baby shower.

While we knit or crochet on our own between gatherings, we also meet on the third Sunday of each month at 9:45am in the lower-level chapel. We welcome anyone interested to join us for an hour of knitting, crocheting, crafting, and being together. Please also let us know if you need a prayer shawl or baby blanket anytime during the year.

MEMORIAL GARDEN

The 2023 year was calm. As noted last year, much is in place, with little major activity required. Encouragement and "sweat equity" from the Landscape Committee (Sara Garrett) and Master Gardener Joni Painter resulted in planting bulbs to enhance the large mulch area just to the right of the walkway into the Garden. We give kudos to Bill Schulz (another "adjunct" Master Gardener major assistant) for executing much-needed trimming of the redbud bush. And always kudos to John Wolter for watering when needed and giving consistent attention all season-long to those weeds that otherwise would take over.

One project yet to come to fruition is signage to explain the Christian symbols embedded in the natural setting of the Garden.

- 1. The Celtic Cross in the pavement in front of the columbarium wall represents our Christian heritage.
- 2. The three trees behind that central wall represent our triune God Father, Son, and Holy Comforter.
- 3. The weeping maple to the left of the entrance to the wall represents Jesus' tears at times of great sorrow.
- 4. The boulder to the right of that entrance represents the stone rolled away from Jesus' grave.

As the committee reviewed its structure and activities, we recommended to Session that going forward, this committee function as a regular committee of Session. They agreed. (History: the campaign to create the Memorial Garden and finance the construction of the columbarium wall and foundations for two additional walls was intentionally outside the regular budget of the church.)

MISSION-PEACEMAKING-JUSTICE

Over the past year the Mission, Peacemaking and Justice Committee (MPJ) has continued to support our mission partners. Our support has included both financial and hands-on support when appropriate.

In the spring we had our second annual BloNo Go, where we spent a morning working at mission partner sites which needed work done for them. Their projects continue to include participating in the Adopt-A-Teacher Program at Sheridan School, the Hope Bags project in which many members of the church have helped fill and deliver food bags for the children at Cedar Ridge Elementary School, and the PASS after school program (Providing After School Safety) where we provide a group of elementary school children a safe space of learning, support, and fun at our church every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon. In 2024 we hope to continue our outreach in the community, both locally and globally.

PLAYMATES PRESCHOOL

Enrollment is good... we only have a couple of vacancies due to two families that have moved out of state. As always, enrollment for the new school year will begin in January. Enrollment for the 2023/24 school year will begin January 4th, and we will continue with ONLINE enrollment. This works well. Because we have great enrollment numbers, we are doing well financially. This year, we are spending more on supplies due to the economy (everything costs more!), but the preschool board has approved a tuition increase for the upcoming school year. It will align us with the other area preschool's rates.

The DCFS representative conducted our annual inspection in October (no concerns as we always pass with no problems.) It is a renewal year for our license (every three years) so the process this past year has been a little longer than the years that it is only the inspection. We do have a few things that John Anderson is working on (for the Fire Marshall's report/inspection) that the inspector wanted addressed. We have to install new electrical outlets in the classrooms and replace ceiling tiles. We also updated our fire drill log information that we keep when we conduct fire drills.

We have seven teachers currently employed this year; two teachers are full-time (Robin Schaefer and Kelli Merrill), and five are part-time teachers (Marian Schulz, Amber Meyers, Janel Morgan, Caitlin Wilcox and Karin Streily.) Marian is in her 22nd year here at Playmates. (She did take a leave of absence for two months to have her hip surgery.) Robin is on year 16 and Kelli is on year 18 of employment with us. Our new teachers, Janel Morgan and Caitlin Wilcox, have been wonderful additions to our staff.

The addition of a new bathroom door in one classroom has been very much appreciated and invaluable to the function of that room. The new security cameras are in, and the monitor installed in the classroom is in use the entire day. We are very excited for this additional security for our building. Preschool parents are always impressed with our preschool regarding security of the building (versus some other preschools.)

- The traffic flow was changed this year so that shoppers entered and exited from different doors. This change worked well.
- Outdoor yard signs were purchased this year and placed in church member's yards and around town in friend's yards. These are being retained to use for the future.
- In addition to church members, many donations were made by others in the community.
- Publicity was provided by Scott Miller on social media and on WJBC.
- We offered items for free to other charitable organizations the last hour of the sale.

This year the recipient of the proceeds was our mission partner, Center for Hope. Becky Mentzer and I delivered a check to them for \$9,869. They were extremely grateful and honored. Catalyst Ministries also received a check for \$1,000. Two organizations, Restore and Abundant Life, picked up the leftovers after the sale and were each given a check for \$250 for their time and for picking up items. The leftovers are sold in their thrift stores.

In addition to the checks provided, other benefits of the rummage sale are

- Providing goods to those in need and other charities whom we invite to shop at no charge. We are always looking for others to invite to shop at the end of the sale.
- Giving people an incentive to donate and clean out. We helped some members get unwanted items removed from their homes.
- Recycling items unwanted by some and desired by others.
- Donating leftover items to Habitat Restore and Abundant Life for their resale and thrift shop.
- Offering our church family a way to work together towards a common goal and have fun.

We had a great group of volunteers working during the donation week and during the sale. Key team members included Caitlin Wilcox and Jenny Hoffman in the children's room, Marilyn Long, who went above and beyond to organize the linens, Carmen Sampson, Rob and Becky Mentzer, Leslie Walker, Carol Morris for all the preplanning work and Ray Horney for all the donations and assistance in the garage. STEWARDSHIP

March of 2023 saw the Stewardship Committee beginning with a focus on engagement, spending the summer encouraging each member of the congregation to "Find Your Fit". A series of announcements, sermons, testimonies in worship, and committee consulting sessions were aimed at helping people understand ways they might engage in the ministries of First Pres. and take that step to try something new.

Through this campaign our stewardship committee had the chance to speak with many congregants and help them find their fit within the church, which ranged from new committee members to additional landscaping crew to interest in forming more small groups. There's never a wrong time to try something new - don't hesitate to reach out to any member of the committee to talk about opportunities to find your fit!

The committee shifted gears in July and began forming and organizing for the fall financial campaign. As usual we began with Bob Beerup sharing an excellent foundational assessment of our church's current finances and related trends. The committee again worked across each core area of ministry in the church to understand their evolving budget needs and new ministry opportunities. Along the way we also validated the proportional distribution of funds across each sector of the budget.

This year our Stewardship Campaign was centered on the theme of "Love to tell the story" and how our ministries and experiences at First Pres. Normal are telling the stories of Jesus. This theme was integrated into an updated Narrative Budget, several testimony interviews in worship, and a sermon focused on our "stories". We again had fun putting stickers on and serving delicious stewardship cookies on Commitment Sunday!

As of January 9, 2024, we have pledges amounting to 93% of our targeted pledge amount, with over 1/3 of families pledging to increase their pledge from 2023.
