

Happy Sacks: Helping Children in Our Community

A growing number of school children in our community rely on free and reduced priced meals at school for their main daily meals. However, there may not be enough food to go around over the weekend. The goal of the **Happy Sacks** mission outreach program is to provide healthy snacks for school children over the weekend. We pack approximately **150 Happy Sacks each week**, which are then delivered to the schools on Friday, and given out by the school counselors to the appropriate children.

For the 2024-25 school year, we packed and delivered **4,943 Happy Sacks**. Since the program began in the Fall of 2012, we have delivered **40,044 Happy Sacks** to children in our community. The need continues to grow as does the cost of filling the bags. The **Happy Sacks** program is not a part of the church's regular budget, so we depend on your donations.


Simply Something:

"The History and Archaeology of the Bible" Class for Adults Begins Tuesday, August 12th, and Wednesday August 13th




The North Georgia Conference of The United Methodist Church's 2025 Annual Conference Report

REPORT ON ANNUAL CONFERENCE 2025

The 2025 North Georgia Annual Conference met June 12-14 at The Classic Center in Athens, Georgia, with Bishop Robin Dease presiding. Approximately 1,800 United Methodists gathered for the session under the theme "Come, Follow Me" based on Matthew 4:19-20.

Together we worshiped, shared meals, deliberated, sang, and prayed. We adopted a budget, celebrated retirements, remembered the saints who have gone before us, and commissioned and ordained clergy. We heard from college and university presidents and received the Annual Conference special offering celebrating 100 years of camp ministry at Glisson!

Highlights: Among the highlights and actions of the session, we:

- Received the first full One Georgia Task Force Report and offered a blessing to the committee to continue the study of potential unification (visit www.georgiaumc.org regularly for updates and information.)
- Were blessed by the leadership and participation of 70 voting youth delegates.
- Adopted a 2026 budget of \$10,493.931. (A 5% reduction from 2025.)
- Celebrated that last year, North Georgia Conference churches paid 92.8% of apportionments—the highest collection rate in recent years.
- Adopted two resolutions, the "Joint Resolution on Immigration" and the "Resolution on Full Inclusion and Justice for People with Disabilities." The final text of the resolutions will be posted at www.ngumc.org/ac2025.
- Made a change to our Standing Rules to add an LGBTQ Advocacy Representative to the Conference Connectional Ministries board.
- Celebrated the 5th anniversary of the Barnes Evaluation and Administration Team. Since its inception, BEAT has awarded more than \$5 million toward innovative missions and ministry in our Conference. In 2024, the spending policy allowed \$1,527,474 to be awarded, which funded 32 BEAT grants. Learn more at www.ngumc.org/beatdashboard.
- Approved a motion from the floor to establish a task force to study and report back on clergy salary inequities.
- Adopted the conference nominations report. The 24-page document includes more than 750 names. These volunteers now make up our 2025-2026 Conference boards, committees, and commissions.
- Voted on four proposed constitutional amendments.
- Heard from our United Methodist college and university presidents from across Georgia.
- Were led in daily devotions by leaders from our campus ministries.
- Celebrated 100 years of Glisson Camp and Retreat Ministry.

Worship: The 2025 North Georgia Annual Conference was anchored by four powerful worship services that reflected the heart and mission of The United Methodist Church.

Opening Worship

Bishop Robin Dease preached on Psalm 78:1-4, reflecting on the importance of passing faith to the next generation. She reminded us that our Christian identity is communal, not individualistic, and that the world is watching how we live out our call. God calls us to be humble shepherds and faithful sojourners.

The United Methodist Church is a place of welcome, justice, and action—where lay and clergy alike are transformed and empowered to lead, said Bishop Dease. In other words, "The United Methodist Church is the place to be!"

Service of Licensing, Commissioning, and Ordination: Thursday evening the North Georgia Annual Conference licensed 7 new local pastors, commissioned 5 provisional members, ordained 1 full connection deacon, ordained 6 full connection elders, and recognized a transfer of orders from deacon to elder. And the extraordinary Clark Atlanta University Philharmonic Society brought the annual conference to our feet. Each ordinand was given a handmade stole crafted by North Georgia United Methodists as a symbol of our connection.

Rev. Dr. Jimmy Asbell Jr, pastor of Vineville UMC in the South Georgia Annual Conference, preached on I Corinthians 13:1-13, "And the Greatest of These is Love." With warm humor and deep truths, he spoke directly to the ordinands, provisional members, and licensees.

He shared about what he calls a "ministerial trust fund," where relationships are built on deposits of presence, care, and follow-through — visiting the sick, remembering milestones, sending that text. "Churches will start you with a credit," he said, "but what happens after that is up to you." That trust, he emphasized, is only as powerful as the love that fuels it.

Service of Remembrance: At our Memorial Service, the Annual Conference remembered the saints of the church who have gone before us. Preacher for the service, Rev. Greg Porterfield of Wesley UMC in Evans, offered a moving reflection on the perishable and the imperishable, and the hope and promise of resurrection.

Drawing from 1 Corinthians 15:50-54, he reflected that death is a universal human experience, "no one is exempt." He reminded the gathered body that funerals—far from merely rituals of grief—are sacramental spaces where love, faith, and memory bind us to one another and to God. Rev. Porterfield closed with the affirmation that we will share God's name until all our names are called in heaven.

Rev. Dr. Alice Rogers, director of the Center for Clergy Excellence, and Kim Powell, Conference lay leader, called the names of the clergy, clergy spouses, and laity remembered this year.

Retirement: Those ministers who are retiring were recognized. Our own Rev. Beth Shugart was among them. **Closing Service of Word & Table**: The 159th session of the North Georgia Annual Conference closed with worship and Holy Communion. Glisson Camp and Retreat Center staff and alumni led our worship music, singing camp songs and hymns. Russell Davis, director of our North Georgia Camp and Retreat Ministries, was the preacher.

In his sermon, he reflected on Holocaust rescuers who courageously acted to save others. It was hard to find any connection among these heroes. They spanned ages, genders, races, faith groups, and more. But a post-World War II researcher did find a common thread—compassion.

When people act from empathy and servant-hearted love, they aren't just following Christ, but embodying the character of Christ. Our work as the church isn't only to teach about following Jesus, but to equip one another with the character of Jesus. "It has to be built into everything that we do," he said. "Especially in our ministry with children and youth."

After the sermon, each District Superintendent read the names of the clergy in their district receiving a new appointment, and each district lay leader offered a prayer. In closing, Bishop Dease officially fixed the July 1, 2025, appointments. The service concluded with a blessing sung every week of camp at Glisson for more than 50 years, "My Friend."

Key Reports

What a Welcome: The host district welcomed the North Georgia Conference back to Athens with fanfare. Co-District Lay Leader Tom Jackson, the voice of the UGA Redcoat Marching Band, kept us glued to our seats to hear from University of Georgia President Jere Morehead, Superintendent Beth Sanders, and led the conference in a cheer! (That spells fun!)

One Georgia Task Force Report: The One Georgia Task Force presented a thorough report, following months of prayerful conversation and collaboration, on the potential for unification of the North and South Georgia Annual Conferences. The members of the annual conference affirmed the continued exploration of a possible unification in the future. Stay connected to the work of the task force and more than 20 working groups by visiting the information site www.georgiaumc.org.

Address of the Conference Lay Leader: In her address to the annual conference, Conference Lay Leader Kim Powell celebrated the faithful, passionate witness of laity across North Georgia and emphasized the urgency of using our time well to do all the good we can. Kim expressed gratitude for the hospitality and encouragement she received in her first year, highlighted collaborative efforts with the South Georgia Conference including Lent and Advent devotionals, and lifted up church lay leaders who embody Christ's love. With deep joy and hope, she called the Conference to keep seizing opportunities to make disciples of Jesus Christ, bound together in peace and love as one body.

Thriving Leadership Initiative: A transformative new opportunity is on the horizon for Georgia United Methodists ready to reimagine what vibrant, thriving ministry can look like. The Thriving Leadership Initiative is launching with a mission to develop and deploy effective United Methodist lay and clergy leaders who can strengthen ministry in existing settings or be deployed to launch new, healthy, and self-sustainable ministries across Georgia. Learn more at www.ngumc.org/thriving.

UMC General Board of Higher Education and Ministry: Meg Lassiat, Executive Director of Ministry, for the United Methodist General Board of Higher Education and Ministry shared how GBHEM and UMC Global Ministries are partnering to align leadership, mission, and education in response to the global needs of the UMC. She highlighted GBHEM's focus on developing transformational leaders through equitable clergy education and supporting students through scholarships and initiatives like the Black College Fund.

Disaster Response: Local churches were invited to get involved in disaster response ministry through ERT training, assembling UMCOR kits, volunteering, and mission trips to Augusta, where more than 80 recovery sites have already been identified. As the North Georgia Conference continues long-term recovery work from Hurricane Helene, Rev. Scott Parrish reminded us that "we are UMCOR," He shared with us that no community in Georgia is beyond the reach of disaster.

Glisson Camp & Retreat Center: The whole annual conference is joining in the celebration of Glisson's 100th Anniversary. For a century, Camp Glisson has been a place of Faith Forming Fun. Conference clergy can tell you where they were in Glisson's chapel when they heard their call to ministry. Campers learn that worship has no walls, and that we can hear God speak anywhere, if we'll slow down enough to listen.

Church Closures: In a solemn moment, the annual conference approved the closure of 16 churches. Rev. Dr. Rodrigo Cruz, assistant to the bishop, offered a prayer for the clergy and laity that have served faithfully through the years at these churches. "God, we come to you in prayer, with heavy hearts. But we also stand before you, acknowledging that you are in the resurrection business. Your gospel continues to work in and through us," he said.

A member of one of the closing churches spoke from the floor, sharing that resurrection is already happening, as some of these closures are the result of mergers that have brought new life, energy, and excitement to congregations.
