# "A RE You Ready to Pumble?"

#### Thursday, June 25 Read Genesis 32:1-32

Note the juxtaposition of Jacob's attempt to control the situation by bribing his brother and his utter brokenness at God's hands. What does this story tell us about God?
What does it say about humanity in general and what might it say about your own experience with God?
Where are you currently wrestling? Why?
Friday, June 26 Read 2 Timothy 3:14-4:5
The walk of faith is a ceaselessly active one requiring us to study, search, practice, teach and often struggle. Truly we are "Israel" (see Genesis 32:28). Yet we are always tempted to wander off and find the easy pathto have "itching ears." Where do you find yourself most plagued by this problem?
How are you being faithful and persistent in living a life that proclaims where your faith truly is?
Saturday, June 27 Read Psalm 119:97-104
Reflect on the psalmist's passion to know God better through God's Word. How much (or how little!) does this reflect your own passion to grow in your relationship, knowledge and ministry? Why or why not?
Discuss this with God in prayer today.
