STRENGTHENING OUR ROOTS

2025 has undoubtedly been an eventful year as our parish considers how best to use a large monetary bequest from one of our beloved parishioners and moves forward with a planned church partnership with a Mar Thoma congregation, all of which represent the potential for generational growth within our church family. I was reminded of the concept of exponential growth in my hobby as a sometime vegetable gardener. I planted tomatoes, cucumbers, and squash alongside some herbs and flowers in my garden last spring, then patiently watered, fertilized, and pruned throughout most of the summer. My tomatoes and squash were lackluster performers this year, but the cucumbers have exploded as summer turned into fall. I'm practically falling over them every time I go out into my backyard. That reminds me, does anyone need cucumbers?

What happened? Indeed, there were a few significant events over the summer months. I had to remove some trees in my backyard, which changed the pattern of sunlight and shade on my garden beds. A few significant storms dropped heavy rain in a few short hours. But for the most part, my patient and habitual tending —daily watering, weekly feeding, occasional pruning, carefully training vines to climb a trellis —those regular small nudges eventually produced a

bountiful harvest. I find it helpful to think about pledging a regular financial contribution in much the same way. Your regular gift may not seem earth-shattering, but it is the small, regular things, as insignificant as they may seem, that accumulate into exponential growth over time.

In the 13th chapter of Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells the story of a man who planted a fig tree and was disappointed when it did not bear fruit. His patient and wise gardener advises him to let it be for another year while he digs manure around its roots to fertilize and strengthen them. This smelly, repetitive task is essential to future growth and productivity. It is a lot like the daily work of the parish: unglamorous, sometimes even unpleasant, but vital, and only possible because of your faithful commitment of time, talent, and treasure.
