The Bloomfield Bridges of Our Lives Pastor Jerry

I recently read – for forty-five minutes of increasing fascination – the story of an utterly <u>exhaustive investigation of a pointless object</u>. Writer Tyler Vigan, on his regular drive in the Twin Cities, noticed a pedestrian bridge over I-494. He had

noted it in passing (get it?) and wondered why it was there, but one time he pulled off the highway at that point and actually saw the base of the bridge. It led to a lawn (not even a sidewalk) next to a Taco Bell. So he walked across the bridge to see where it led: to a warehouse. The employees at the warehouse said that they hated the bridge, never used it, never even ate at Taco Bell, and had no idea why it was there.



Thus began Vigan's months-long search, which he catalogs exhaustively on his website at tylervigan.com. It took him to public records searches in St. Paul and Kansas City, Missouri. He did interviews in neighborhoods, studied old newspapers, read minutes of town council meetings, and generally devoted an incredible amount of time and effort to figuring out the pedestrian bridge to nowhere. (By the way, I've never met Mr. Vigan, but I love him. I am so glad to share the planet with people who ask "Yeah, but why?" and then refuse to give up until they find answers.)

Anyway, he figured it out. Back the 50s and 60s, when the Eisenhower Interstate System was being built across the country, a plan was put in to make the bypass loop around the Cities. But every stretch had to be approved by the township it went through, which meant that every town council had to weigh the advantages and disadvantages of the additional traffic and either approve, reject, or approve with conditions. Well, on this stretch just west of the MSP Airport, the planned bypass

went between Bloomington and Richfield. Bloomington at that time was only sparsely populated, but Richfield on the north was one of those communities that sprang up after World War II, filled with former Gls (and their wives and six kids) who got mortgages through the GI Bill and bought identical 1000 sq ft homes in new subdivisions. In that community was a Roman Catholic Church with a school. Largely through the stubborn advocacy of the Catholic women of Richfield, the bypass route was approved on the condition that a pedestrian bridge be built at that point to permit children from Bloomington to walk to school in Richfield. Which they did. The picture on the left was sent to Mr. Vigan after he published his story by one of the children who

used that bridge every day and who for some reason had kept this clipping.

An absolutely reasonable and useful bridge, in fact. But times changed and the neighborhood changed and demographics changed (the Catholic Church is still there, but now advertises Spanish masses), so today the bridge is about as useful as a hood ornament in a salvage yard.

So what are the Bloomfield Bridges in your life? What are the things that you acquired or information you learned or habits you developed earlier in your life for very good reasons, which now lead nowhere in particular? This doesn't mean that those things are bad; at one time they may have been as valuable and useful as a bridge that helps children get safely to school. But sometimes things change and the old structures that were built for a valid purpose end up with no more reason to exist, taking up space in our lives that could be used for something else. Do you have any of those? Maybe you could let some of them go and maybe come up with new resolutions for what you could do with that space.

I have one new resolution anyway. Next time I'm in the Cities, I gotta find that bridge.


5th Sunday Together—Your Piece of the Pie

Confirmation / Youth

A month into the new year, and our confirmation / youth classes are well under way. On Sunday mornings, we are meeting at about 10:15 am (depending on how long-winded the pastor was in worship) in the Fireside Library for 45 minute lesson. We have had four students in person and three more joining us by Zoom. In that class we are currently discussion morality and faith: Are they the same thing? Or can they be separated? What is the appropriate approach to morality for a follower of Christ? Or is there more than one?

Meanwhile, in the fast-track version of Confirmation, we had our first Cooperative Confirmation Intensive class on Saturday morning, September 16, at Hope UMC, beginning at 9:30. Two students from Lake Street, two from Hope, and one from Pleasant Valley came together to cover the entire Old Testament in three hours. Next month, on October 15, we will cover the entire New Testament, and we should have another student joining us from Jim Falls.

All these classes are open for new students at any time. Confirmation is not like a TV series where you can't miss an episode. We'll get everything in somehow. If you have a youth at home who is ready for the next steps in their faith, come join us.

Sunday Morning Book Study

The regular Sunday book discussion group, which meets after worship (10:15 - ish) in the Office Conference room is currently reading Saving God from Religion: A Ministers Search for Faith in a Skeptical Age. All are welcome, even if they haven't read any of the book. The discussions aren't always that close to the book either.

SHARING GOD'S BLESSINGS

We continue to share garden produce from the "Sharing God's Blessings" table set up in the Fellowship Hall. As tomatoes and cucumbers begin to appear in greater profusion than you can use or preserve, bring them by the church. In our church's commitment to inclusion, this is a new ministry to those members who suffer under the crippling disadvantages of not being able to keep plants alive (you know who you are).



Moreover, when the zucchini plants start to produce and, once again, you ask yourself why you planted so many, this year you don't have to resort to dropping them in unlocked cars or on doorsteps in the middle of the night. Bring them here. All vegetables are welcome.

Foundation Grant Report

This year, the Lake Street Foundation's ministry grants to the church added up to \$23,007.69. Much of this money is designated for specific ministry areas, and the rest is undesignated. So far, funds from these grants have been used for:

- Worship: New Advent Candles (\$138.04) and handbell gloves, pads, and desks (\$713.75).
- Inclusive Welcome: Final bill for the Chancel Lift (\$3,000.00), new iPad for homebound worship (\$286.98), a new ice freezer (\$142.00), and new water pitchers (\$293.57) for the kitchen.
- Spiritual Formation: A plaque designating recipients of the Olson-Maser Scholarship (\$189.95).
- Outreach: 25 backpacks with essential supplies for the homeless, through Community Table (\$1,173.00), other toiletry items for the same backpacks (\$346.22), contribution to underwrite roof repairs on the Nueva Canaan Metodista church in El Alto, Bolivia (\$2,200), grant to The Community Table for new office computers (\$6,000).
- Other expenses.
 - Book-keeping adjustments: Zero-ing out the deficit Staff Appreciation Fund (\$118.30) and completing funding on Room 202 air-con (\$509.52).
 - * Building and capital improvements: New concrete steps from parking lot to 4th street (\$3,400.00), outdoor garden expenses (\$600.00)

Total used: \$19, 571.48.

Financial Report through August, 2023

In August, after two positive months, we dropped back a little bit, ending the month about \$2,000 behind where we were in July. We are still about \$10,000 ahead of where we expected to be at this time, which is good, but that's not saying a whole lot. We tried to be very realistic in our budget projections, which in budget-ese usually translates as "pessimistic."

We still have a solid cash balance, which is what enables us to ride these ups and downs without fear, but the Finance Committee is also keeping an eye on that cash balance. It is currently over \$200,000, but it has crept down in recent months. All these things are being considered by our various teams — and particularly our Finance Committee — as we work on a budget for 2024.

But here is the good news. Our mission of "Compassionate Outreach" is not dependent on the ups and downs of our day -to-day financials. This month, for instance, your Church Council approved and sent a grant of \$6,000 to The Community Table, to help them upgrade the computers in their office. (The software that they use to run their ministry had upgraded so many times that their old computers were no longer able to support the programs.) This money came from the Lake Street Foundation Grant that came to the church earlier in the year.

CONFERENCE AND COMMUNITY

Church Conference, 2023

October 29, 11:15am

One of the regular events in every United Methodist Church is the annual Church Conference. This is a meeting - held usually in the Fall - when the various committees report to the church on the preceding year, and certain business actions are taken, such as approving clergy compensation for the coming year. All members of the church have a vote. According to our *Book of Discipline*, this meeting must be presided over by the District Superintendent or by a Full Elder who has been approved to do so by the DS.

This year, because our DS "Peace" Kim is preaching at Lake Street on October 29, we will hold our Church Conference on that day, after our pie social (see p. 4). Assuming that we won't be eating pie for longer than an hour, let's guess that the conference will begin around 11:15. It normally takes about 30-45 minutes.

Exactly where we will hold the conference is still undecided, and one factor in that decision is whether we will have any of our members joining us remotely, by Zoom. If you are interested in being a part of this annual meeting, but will not be able to join us in-person, *let Pastor Jerry know as soon as possible* so he can create a Zoom meeting and send you the link.



The End of Offering Envelopes

Many of you may have noticed this: the Sunday morning offering plate is not what it used to be. As the plates get passed down the aisles, it appears that most people are just putting in their "Connect Cards." Don't worry; people are still giving to the church. It's just that there are a lot of different options for doing so. Every month between a third and a half of the money given to the church is given online, either through the giving portal on our website or by an automatic transfer set up through the giver's bank. Many others - especially since the Covid shut-downs -- just mail a check to the church every month. Still others take advantage of IRS rules and give their entire pledge to the church out of their mandatory retirement disbursement (thus not having to pay tax on that amount).

As a result of all this, fewer and fewer are using the traditional booklets of offering envelopes that we have mailed out at the beginning of each year. But as that number drops, we have a problem. The envelope pads are already expensive (we paid \$642 last year @ about \$2.80 each), and even mailing them out using bulk rate added another \$257.00 to the cost. But we have to have at least two hundred items to qualify for the bulk rate, and we no longer have that many. To mail envelopes by regular mail would be about \$700.00. That's a lot to pay for the convenience of pre-printed envelopes.

Our Finance Committee has voted this year to discontinue the pre-printed envelope tradition. We will not be mailing out, or even ordering, envelopes for 2024. But, as noted above, there are other options. When Covid hit and we didn't have offering plates at all for over a year, we figured out new ways to give. We can do it again.
