The Once and Future Victory Pastor Jerry



On June 6, 1944, the Allied forces of World War Two sent troops onto the beaches of Normandy – D -Day – and over the next days and weeks successfully established an Allied presence on continental Europe. Before that invasion, Allied forces had been based in Britain, separated from

the Axis forces by the English Channel; now they were on the road to Berlin. Many will say that D-Day is when the Allies won the war. Once that landing was successful, the die was cast. Germany and the Axis had no hope of ultimate victory. They were defeated.

It just didn't feel like it. It was another eleven months before V-E Day (Victory in Europe), and during those eleven months occurred some of the fiercest fighting of the war. Tens of thousands of troops died during that time. The Axis armies didn't act as if they were "defeated," and battles during that time like the Battle of the Bulge certainly didn't make anyone feel as if the war was won. Maybe those who say that D-Day won the war are right, but if so, then there can apparently be a time lag between "victory" and "end of hostilities."

We've seen a similar phenomenon this year in the war against Covid-19. You could say that as soon as scientists developed not one but three safe and effective vaccines against this virus, the battle was won. And I think in some ways it was. From the moment that the vaccinations began to be administered, there were only two possible outcomes. The quick option was that enough people would get vaccinated that the disease, unable to get a foothold, would starve. The second option – that not enough people would get vaccinated, but eventually enough of the unvaccinated would get the disease and either develop natural immunity or die – was less desirable and considerably slower, but it would end at the same place. Now we are about to have safe and effective FDA-approved treatments for Covid-19. The corner has been turned. Covid-19's days as a deadly scourge are numbered. It is defeated.

It just doesn't feel like it. Worldwide, there are still half a million new cases every single day, and over six thousand new deaths. Hospitals around the world are still stretched to their capacity, and to those who are fighting the disease themselves, or facing it day by day in their work as health care providers, or grieving someone who has died, this is *not* what "victory" is supposed to feel like. We live in that lag time between "victory" and the end of the suffering.

We Christians live in one of those times, too, and Advent is the season when we remember it. When Jesus Christ became human, lived the life of "CHRIST FOLLOWERS LIVING GOD'S LOVE"

love and compassion that we were designed to live but had never actually tried, then died a human death and rose from the dead, then the battle against sin and death was over. The victory was won. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians, "Death, where is your victory?" and in Romans, "In all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Through Christ, we have defeated sin and death.

It just doesn't feel like it. Sin is still very much present in our lives. Our daily struggles against selfishness and pride and selfindulgence and callous disregard of others are still very real. It doesn't *feel* as if sin has been defeated. We live in a lag time between the victory that Christ brought and the time when that victory will take full effect, when heaven and earth will be renewed. The season of Advent – which literally means "Coming" – expresses this interim feeling time well. In this time we celebrate Christ's coming. And in this time we long for Christ's coming. Christ has come! Come, Lord Jesus! Amen.

Meaningful Christmas: ECASD Homeless Program

Lake Street has a history of supporting organizations financially at Christmas time through "Meaningful Christmas". This year the Mission Team has chosen the Eau Claire Area School District's Homeless Program. The Eau Claire Area School District (ECASD) has recognized that student homelessness is an issue that hinders a student's success in school and has developed a program to address the issue. In the 2020-2021 school year 241 students were classified as homeless. On average, 250-300 ECASD students become homeless within each school year. The Homeless Program provides support for a student's education while they are experiencing homelessness. It works to connect families to community resources. The program provides items ranging from school supplies to tennis shoes for gym class, and all the necessities to attend school ready to learn, including hygiene items, connections to health care needs, and transportation to and from school. With this support student attendance and parent engagement increases. If you would like to support student homelessness please indicate "Meaningful Christmas" on your donation. In addition to monetary support, the homeless program needs; socks: men's and women's sizes and underwear: 4T to 14 youth sizes (boys and girls). There will be a collection box in the narthex for the socks and underwear. Financial Report through October

Your giving remained strong in October, and we made up the deficit of September. If you look at the summary on the opposite page (We had so many Memorial Gifts this month that there wasn't room for the chart on this page), you'll see that on the year so far we are \$30,000 in the black. Remember, though, that this is deceptive. The PPP grant that we received during the pandemic shutdown did not show up on our books until this year. Without that one-time grant, we would be about \$3,000 in the red.

That's still *very* good. We were expected to be more than \$10,000 in the red at this point in the year, and most years we are, until December. Your continued faithfulness in giving has given us extraordinary stability during this extraordinarily unstable time in history. Thank you.

Memorials Committee

Now, just a word on another financial side of our church: the Memorials Committee. As noted above, we had an unusual number of gifts in October that were given in recognition or memory of loved ones. Some are designated for a specific fund, and others are not. Over the past two years, as we have been reminded how important our Radio Ministry is to many of our congregation, that has been a particularly frequent designation.

The Memorial Committee (Kirsten Gierhart, Janelle Earl, Carolyn Kinville, and Bev Goertz) receive these gifts and manage the disbursement of funds. So far this year, they have made grants of almost \$8,000 to support the ministries of the church. Over \$5,000 of that this year went to support our music ministry, especially to paying a video editor to put together the Online Ensemble hymns that were a part of our weekly worship services before we resumed meeting in person. Other funds were granted to furnish the Kid's Corner in the sanctuary. Every month, you see a report on this page of the gifts that have been given this way, but we don't often extend our thanks to those who work quietly behind the scenes to support the work of our church in this way. Thank you, Memorials.

Board of Ordained Ministry Chooses Well

At its November meeting, the Wisconsin Conference Board of Ordained Ministry voted unanimously to approve Rev. Chris Van Beek as a Provisional Elder, which is the last step before ordination itself. Chris will be commissioned at the June 10-13, 2022, Annual Conference in Green Bay, and that service will also be livestreamed (probably on Sunday the 12th, if the schedule follows the usual pattern). Those of you who have compromising stories about Chris's childhood in this church, it's too late now.
