A Universal Language Pastor Jerry

In Genesis 11, we read the story of the Tower of Babel, in which all nations on earth share a common language and set out to build for themselves a great tower that reaches to the skies. God, seeing that once again humanity is setting out to make themselves like gods, frustrates their plans by confusing their tongues. People begin speaking different languages and soon sort themselves into separate language groups, each one suspicious of every other one. Being thus divided, their grand plan to rival the gods falls apart.

There is no doubt that the proliferation of human languages has been a source of division, but I have to admit I'm not sure God had to go to such extremes. For my part, I have complete confidence in human beings' ability to misunderstand each other even in the same language. For instance, our current American political tribes all speak English, but are still able to engage in long political arguments without either side understanding what the other is saying. This is partly because such words and phrases as "woke" and "Christian Nationalism" bear almost opposite meanings to the different sides, but it's mostly because neither side can be bothered to listen. And it isn't just political groups. There are communication gaps between men and women, between different generations, between urban and rural residents, between ethnic groups, and between income levels. Even within the shared parameters of the English tongue, we appear to be speaking a Babel's worth of different languages.

But I think there is a language that everyone speaks and everyone listens to. There is one way that we can use our shared speech that everyone immediately pays attention to and appreciates: storytelling. Maybe you've noticed this. A politician gives a stump speech, or a preacher gives a sermon, and both are likely to be filled with stock phrases and obscure arguments. As a result, in both cases the mind wanders after about, say, 45 seconds. But let that politician or preacher start telling a story, and suddenly everyone is listening. Moreover, this human attunement to stories starts almost immediately and never goes away. Two-year-olds are as drawn to stories as ninety-year-olds. Surly teenagers who have long since learned to tune out parental lectures still hear stories. Alzheimer's patients who no longer respond to questions still sit up and focus on you when you tell a story. Storytelling is as close as anything I can think of to a universal language.

There are surely many reasons for this. Let me just mention two. First, storytelling is how human beings find meaning within the random experiences of our lives. Think about it. Our days are filled with stimuli from thousands of different directions all the time, but when we come home and tell our spouse about something that happened at work, we are unconsciously (1) deciding which event that took place is worth telling and (2) which details of our day are a part of that event and which ones are not. Every told story is a carefully curated account of experience related to convey a point. Human beings are hard-wired to look for meaning; stories are our primary vehicle for that search.

A second reason we key in on stories is that good stories do not dictate their meaning to listeners but rather invite them to find the meaning themselves. Yes, it's true that some stories are purely didactic, obviously designed to teach one lesson and only one. These are boring stories. Mark Twain called them "Sunday School book stories," and no one ever reads them on purpose. No, good stories invite us to join them in their meaning-making.

This is why so much of our Bible consists of stories (and why such a relatively small amount consists of essays and sermons). The Bible, like God, is not interested in teaching us exactly what to believe so much as engaging us in our own search for faith. This is why the heart of our faith, the gospel of Jesus Christ, is not a list of rules but a story. And this is also why we have four very different versions of that story in our scripture – versions that sometimes even contradict each other. Because every storyteller shades their story with a slightly different meaning, inviting a slightly different quest from each hearer.

And this is why we are spending basically the whole summer simply telling one of those gospel versions – not telling you what it *means*, but just telling you the story and inviting you along with Luke into a search for what the life and death of Jesus Christ can mean for you. Stories don't dictate truth, but they do open promising doors to those who are seeking it. Come seek it this summer as we hear Luke's good news.

Lake Street Welcoming Ministry Flashback, by Pastor Jerry

According to "This Just In: A History of Broadcasting in the Chippewa Valley" (VolumeOne, 28 March 1922), by Luc Anthony, the first radio station in the area began in Osseo, but moved to Eau Claire in 1926. It broadcast from the Gillette Rubber Company with the call letters WTAQ (which stood for "Where Tires Are Quality"). It's interesting to speculate on the impact of this new media on the town. No one would have had a radio before there was a radio station, obviously, so in order to survive, the new station would have first had to persuade everyone to buy radios. only then could they persuade advertisers to buy ads. They couldn't make it forever on rubber company funding. So there must have been quite a push to encourage people to invest in this newfangled gadget.

And how should a church respond to a new form of communication being introduced to their community? Buy ads? Consider starting a radio worship broadcast? Or do something bizarre like writing the newspaper claiming to be better than a radio station already? I don't know. Let's go with door number three.



RESOURCES FOR MINISTRY

Financial Report through May, 2023

Through the long months of the Covid-19 lockdowns / partial re-openings / hurried lockdowns again one of the things we all wondered was "when will things get back to normal?" by which we meant, "back to the way things were before 2020." Well, we aren't there yet and in some ways will never be, but many things have begun to return to the familiar patterns.

One of those is our church financial situation, unfortunately. Before the pandemic, we were tracking a gradual, but steady, decline in giving and adjusting our budgets accordingly, but once the pandemic began, you upended all our projections by giving more than we had imagined. From 2020 through 2022, we consistently operated in the black, outperforming budget every year.

That was an incredible, generous statement of your support for the church in a time of crisis, and we are grateful. But now that the crisis mode is subsiding, our finances are back in more familiar territory. As of the end of May, we are \$30K in the red - very close to our budget projections, but short of our hopes. Thank you to you all for your continued faithful giving. Keep it up.

But there is good news. Much of our deficit this year comes from heavy spending on the building by our Trustees. This year, they front-loaded their projects, and most of their planned projects are complete. There will be less spending from that end. But even more than that, our cash reserves remain strong, and none of our ministry projects will have to be put on hold, because of the grant money that we have available for mission and outreach and service.

Compared to some Annual Conferences in years past, this was a quiet and peaceful meeting. While this may have been mostly because the UMC is about to make its theological divisions permanent by breaking apart, thus making further argument pointless, it was nevertheless a welcome change. President Javier Viera of Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary led a powerful Bible Study during the mornings, and as always there was some great singing and worship.

The primary business of this year's AC was to make official the disaffiliation of 43 churches, who are leaving the UMC because of disagreement with the growing acceptance of LGBTQ+ ordination and same-sex marriage in United States Methodism. These congregations represent about 11% of the churches of the Wisconsin Conference, and a similar percentage of membership. They range from large churches, like the 1000-member Ashbury UMC in Madison, to tiny churches with membership in the single digits. The disaffiliations approved, we all prayed for each other as we agreed to go separate ways.

This will affect budgets and ministries going forward, but we won't know exactly how much for a while yet. Still, though, we are preparing. After 2024, the Wisconsin Conference will enter a relationship with the Northern Illinois conference — maintaining our distinct identities, but sharing one bishop and many resources. We will also drop down to only four District Superintendents (we currently have five districts), and are planning other cost-saving measures. Our 2024 conference budget is over half a million dollars less than this year's.

We also elected members to the 2024 General Conference, and heard from those who had attended the 2022 Jurisdictional Conference (a meeting of northern Midwestern Methodist conferences). That Jurisdictional Conference passed several resolutions to be presented at that 2024 meeting, primarily focused on increasing openness to LGBTQ+ individuals.

On the final day, the conference held the ritual of reading out this year's new clergy appointments. Each District Superintendent read aloud the name of the appointment, and Bishop Jung read the name of the person being appointed to that position. As Park Hunter, DS for the Northeast District, completed his list, he added, "We have had one more change of appointment in this district." Bishop Jung looked surprised. He didn't have any more names on *his* list. Park read in a solemn voice: "The Green Bay Packers." Bishop Jung (after some prompting) announced, "Jordan Love." So there you have it. Someone to thank or blame this fall: the Bishop and Cabinet.
