A Thought Experiment Pastor Jerry

I think sometimes about the purpose of the church. (Don't judge me. It's an occupational hazard. By some estimates, as much as 20% of professional clergy have persistent thoughts about the purpose of the church.) In those thoughts, I have over the years come up with various ways to describe that purpose, but in the end I usually come back to one of the first formulations I ever came up with: the purpose of the church is to represent Christ to the world.

Notice that I said "represent" and not "proclaim." Proclaiming Christ is not a bad thing, and some very fine people have done so, like Paul and St. Patrick and probably some others, But proclaiming by itself isn't enough. You can proclaim something that you don't actually care about, like when politicians talk about fiscal responsibility. To represent Christ means more than just "talks about Christ": it means that when people look at you, they clearly see Christ, and that's harder to counterfeit.

So here's my question: what are the distinguishing features of a church that truly represents Christ to others? Let's tackle this question as a thought experiment, looking for things that specifically and uniquely illustrate Christ. And let's begin with the things that people might suggest are the purpose of the church.

- Growing. This is, hands down, the number one goal of the American church.
 We all want to add members to our congregations. But is growth an indicator
 of Christ? Sometimes, maybe, but not always. The most rapidly growing
 churches today are prosperity gospel churches, and it's very difficult to
 discern Christ there. So, no.
- Right doctrine. Obviously, there will be differences of opinion on what constitutes "right" here, but there are churches from every theological perspective that are almost exclusively focused on maintaining pure doctrine. So does purity of doctrine represent Christ? In a word, no. It is ridiculously easy to imagine a church that is ideologically unimpeachable but that also looks nothing at all like Christ. (In fact and maybe this is just me it's hard to imagine a primarily ideological church that reminds people of Christ at all.)
- Acts of mercy and justice. This is more promising. A church that demonstrates mercy and justice to others is at least more Christ-like than one that demonstrates indifference and prejudice. But do acts of mercy and justice always indicate Christ? There are a lot of non-Christian, or even completely secular, groups that show at least as much mercy and justice as the church. Besides, as everyone who has ever volunteered at a soup kitchen or food pantry knows, it's way too easy to make acts of mercy all about ourselves instead of Christ. Acts of compassion can point toward Christ, but they don't always.

So what's left? Is there any visible sign that clearly and unequivocally makes everyone who sees it think of Christ? Only one, and it's what Jesus told us from the beginning: "By this shall all know that you are my followers: that you love (Continued on page 3)

each other as I have loved you" (John 13:35). It's love that is expressed in humility and respect, as Paul said, "Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others" (Philippians 2:3-4). These are the things that, when observed, make people think at once of Christ. I can't think of anything else that works as well.

If this is right, then that leads to some striking possibilities. For instance, the little country church with only a dozen or so members who all love each other and treat their neighbors with simple love and acceptance might be more pleasing to God than the fastest-growing megachurch in the world. The quiet senior citizen who serves on no committee but who makes it a point to befriend every new face in church on Sunday may be the most important representative of Christ in a congregation. People who volunteer in the nursery to make sure that babies and toddlers know that they are loved at church might be serving Christ far more significantly than preachers and writers of newsletter articles.

It is not wrong for a church to grow (though it might be wrong for a church to make growth its primary goal). It is not wrong to care about sound doctrine; I do it sometimes myself. It is certainly not wrong to do acts of mercy and justice. All those things can be good. But by themselves, none of those things are enough. They are only good when they are external reflections of something else, something deeper: humble love. That's when we look like Christ. That's the purpose of the church.

Worship Updates

Summer Choir. As summer arrives, our regular choirs and ensembles go on hiatus. It's hard to maintain a regular music program when on any given day in the summer, a third of the congregation is on vacation or "up nort" or "at the lake." But we do have enough people to gather sometimes to prepare a song to sing. So we're going to. Several Sundays this summer (beginning with June 11) a summer ensemble will gather at 8:30 in room 202 to put together something to sing in worship. This will be an informal time, and **all** singers are invited, whether you're part of a choir or not.

Children in Worship. This Summer - like last Summer - our preschool workers are unavailable. That means that we will have no one in the nursery area during worship. We are making a few adaptations (such as moving a box of children's toys into the library, where the worship service is livestreamed so that families can retreat there if necessary), but the likelihood is that we will have more small children noises during church. Give thanks for every squeak and giggle rustle and make sure that parents know that their children are welcome.

A COMMUNITY OF INCLUSIVE WELCOME

We embrace all of God's children as persons of sacred worth regardless of race, gender, ethnicity, socio-economic status, national origin, culture, tradition, physical or mental ability, sexual orientation, gender identity, or any other difference real or perceived, and welcome all people into the life of this congregation.

During the COVID shut-downs many of our church's ministry teams stopped meeting, then went to meeting primarily online. Most are now back, meeting at least partly in person, but after three years of operating mostly out of sight, it is time to remind the larger church of who these teams are and what they do. We will be reintroducing our teams during the Fall, but in the meantime we also want to use this newsletter forum to lay some groundwork. One of the teams that works toward our congregation's stated goal of **Inclusive Welcome** is ATIT (that's the Accessibility Through Inclusion Team).

ATIT

We operate on these tenets:

- 1. God invites ALL people to worship, to fellowship, to learn, and to serve,
- 2. Every person is regarded as indispensable and we would be incomplete without each and every one.
- 3. The architectural, attitudinal, programmatic, and other barriers that may push people away from our congregation are not insurmountable, but they will not disappear without intentional efforts.

Here are a few of the things we've done over the past few years follow.

- 1. Sponsored an Addiction and Recovery Series (October, 2022): a four part series of workshops that examined the causes of addiction, the roles of family and friends, the local resources for recovery, and the role of faith communities.
- 2. Added chairs with arms in FH: we noted that some folks were struggling to get into and out of the chairs in fellowship hall so we purchased a few sturdier chairs with arms.
- Other minor changes: added full length mirrors in the entry bathrooms, published an article on the
 negative effects of fragrances on some people, applied contrast tape to steps throughout the
 church for greater safety for the visually impaired.

In addition all our members participate in IM Church every third Sunday of the month and plan the annual Disability Awareness Day in the Fall.

ATIT has been so diligent in following these principles that after an "Accessibility Audit" by our conference, Lake Street was awarded the "Gold Award for Accessibility" from the Wisconsin Conference United Methodist Church.

Luke's Good News

Summer is a little more laid back in Wisconsin, and that includes its church experience. We've been doing some heavy-lifting lately, tackling some difficult questions that the church has struggled with (and still does). This summer, let's tell stories.

Throughout the summer (when he's not on vacation) Pastor Jerry is going to pick up the Bible Story Project he began two years ago—telling the entire story of the Bible in chronological order—and we have finally arrived at the New Testament. This summer we're going to hear the stories of Jesus.

Specifically, we're going to hear how *Luke* tells the good news. Some people wonder why our Bible keeps four different gospels. Why not pick one and go with it? Or try to put them all together as a single document? The reason is because each one of the gospel writers tells the story differently, speaking to a different audience, facing different issues. Each gospel has a different approach, and all of them have something different to teach us. Muddling them all together in one narrative would take away the distinctive qualities of each.

So this summer we're going to hear the story of Jesus through Luke's eyes. Luke was a Gentile—probably the only Gentile author in the Bible—who had travelled with Paul. He has a heart for the lost sheep, the outcast, the abandoned, and the neglected. He did not, so far as we know, ever meet Jesus himself, but he says in his prologue that he has interviewed those who knew him well (perhaps even his mother). Luke built his gospel around the narrative framework of the Gospel of Mark, but he clearly had some sources of his own. He is the only writer who includes some of the most powerful of Jesus' parables for instance.

A challenge for this summer: as Pastor Jerry tells the stories during worship, read along with him. We will begin our story journey on June 18, the Sunday after Annual Conference.

In traditional iconography, Luke is represented by a bull.



2023 Olson-Maser Scholarship Awarded: Grace Morris

The Olson-Maser Scholarship is a new program begun last year by Al Olson, in honor of Normal Olson and Bev Maser and their lives of service to others. It was funded partly by Al and partly by gifts from others, many in this congregation.

The scholarship is to go once a year to someone who is preparing for a career in one of the following helping professions: nursing, education, social work, or ministry. Selection is made less on the basis of grades or achievement than on evidence of commitment to service, as shown by the candidate's own statements and volunteer experience in church or community.

The scholarship committee (Kathy Anderson, Craig Heabler, and Jackie Kruse) met at the end of April and have chosen Grace Morris to be this year's recipient. Grace is beginning a Master's in Religion this fall at Indiana University, with an emphasis in medieval Church History, preparing for a career as a religion professor. During her time here in Eau Claire, she was active as a liturgist, sang in the choir, and for two years was the lead Confirmation teacher.

RESOURCES FOR MINISTRY

Financial Report through April, 2023

As you can see in the chart below, we are remaining close to our budget expectations. This is not exciting, in that we had projected a deficit at this point of the year, and sure enough, we have it. Our giving is slightly lower than we had expected, but our expenses have been even lower than that. Let's look at both sides of the budget separately.

Giving. We had projected a very good month in April, because of Easter, but for the second year in a row, we were wrong. April was an average giving month in both 2022 and 2023. Now, last year, that deficit was more than made up by higher than expected giving in June, July, and August. It would appear that many traditional patterns in the church are changing.

Expenses. Our Trustees have had a busy first few months of the year, working on painting and plumbing and heating issues, so they have spent more than their YTD budget, but our personnel expenses have been lower than expected, with some open positions.

Summary. As many other parts of church life have returned to normal since the disruptions of the pandemic, so has our budget. In 2020, your giving rose to meet the crisis of COVID shutdowns, exceeding our budget at a time when we weren't even meeting. Now things are returning to normal. We are not in trouble, though. Our cash reserves remain high, and our funds for ministry through Foundation Grants guarantee our ability to experiment and move ahead in new directions.

Foundation Grant Report

This year, the Lake Street Foundation's ministry grants to the church added up to \$23,007.69. Much of this money is designated for specific ministry areas, and the rest is undesignated. So far, funds from these grants have been used to:

- Worship: New Advent Candles (\$138.04) and handbell gloves, pads, and desks (\$779.75).
- Inclusive Welcom: Final bill for the Chancel Lift (\$3,000.00), new iPad for homebound worship (\$286.98)
- Book-keeping adjustments. Zero-ing out the deficit Staff Appreciation Fund (\$118.30) and completing funding on Room 202 air-con (\$509.52).
- Outreach: backpacks with essential supplies for the homeless, through Community Table (\$1,173.00)

Total used: \$6,005.59.
