Thank God for Corinth

When Rebecca and I lived in Kentucky, our state education system was, um, not great. In national educational rankings, Kentucky generally came in at fortyeighth or forty-ninth out of fifty, and when those rankings came out each year, the usual comment was "Thank God for Mississippi."

(By the way, that wouldn't work anymore. Mississippi has improved in the national school rankings by

nearly every measure - literacy, test scores, graduation percentages. It has apparently done this by a combination of traditional conservative solutions, like back -to-the-basics teaching of things like phonics, and traditional liberal solutions, like dedicated social workers working with families to find ways to keep kids in school.)

Anyway, there's a church equivalent to "Thank God for Mississippi." When church feels quarrelsome, frustrating, troubled, and generally not a great reflection of Jesus Christ, at least we can say, "Thank God for Corinth." That's right. Most of the problems that we struggle with in the church today were already problems for one of the first churches ever started, the one in the Greek city of Corinth. Paul began this church during his second missionary journey, and within five or ten years he must have been wondering what he'd been thinking, because anything that could go wrong went wrong in Corinth.

Paul ended up writing multiple letters to the Corinthian church – two of which are in our New Testament. Now, of course, Paul wrote letters to a lot of churches, but the ones he wrote to Corinth feel a little different. In most of his letters. Paul would begin with warm greetings, then move right into a teaching time, explaining theologically who Christ was and why we worship him. Only after that would he move to dealing with practical matters. But the first Corinthian letter is basically all practical stuff. Paul didn't write these letters primarily to help people grow in faith; he wrote them to put out fires. Here is the basic outline of the letter 1 Corinthians: "So here's what I hear you're doing now . . . what are you thinking? And I also hear that you're . . . what's wrong with you people?" And so on.

It's weird that this book is even in the Bible. I mean, if the goal for putting the New Testament together was to convince people to become followers of Christ, then 1 Corinthians definitely should have been left out. The book is not a character witness for Christians. But if the purpose of the Bible is to give comfort and guidance to real people, with all the least-desirable traits of humanity, in their stumbling efforts to follow God, then it's a pretty good book.

At any rate, in this era, where the church's reputation in the larger world is not, shall we say, stellar, it's a book that holds out some comfort and guidance for us. Over the next several weeks of sermons, I'm going to be looking at Paul's advice for the church in Corinth on such matters as divisions within the church, conflicting moral systems, internal power struggles and matters like that. Just in case things like that should ever be relevant again.

On the one hand, it might be sort of depressing to find out that the problems besetting us have been around from the beginning and still haven't been solved. But for me, it's mostly encouraging. 1 Corinthians says: Yeah, this stuff has been around from the beginning. Here's some advice for how to deal with it next time it shows up, which it will. But God didn't give up on the church in Corinth, and God hasn't given up on us. This month, let's remember that and say together, "Thank God for Corinth."


Coffee Fellowships This Fall

We will begin on September 10, with the Communications Team, after which the Trustees will introduce themselves on Sept. 17 (and help with the Pancake Breakfast.)


Pancake Breakfasts Return: September 17

Exciting News

Last spring the Mission team learned that the United Methodist Wisconsin Conference was partnering with the Evangelical Methodist Church in Bolivia and seeking Wisconsin Methodist Churches to partner and form relationships with Methodist Churches in Bolivia. Lake Street's Mission team has been looking for a way to expand our outreach beyond our Eau Claire community and after some discussion we decided that we wanted to learn more about the Nueva Canaan church in El Alto. Bolivia. What we learned was that the Nueva Canaan church was founded on December 2, 1970. approximately 150 members, plus 30 youth and 50 children. El Alto Bolivia is one of the fastest growing cities in the Western Hemisphere with a population about the size of Milwaukee. The median income is \$2/day. In August we were able to set up a Zoom meeting, using an interpreter, with the leaders of Nueva Canaan, and the Bishop of Bolivia. We learned about their desire to form a relationship with Lake Street so that we can learn about each other and form a strong Christian connection with each other. We also learned that the roof of the church leaks and that the rainy season will be starting in September. They have members who can provide the labor but do not have the funds to purchase materials to prepare the roof. The Mission team, at our August meeting voted to utilize \$2200 from our Lake Street Foundation grant to help with the material costs. We also have made Nueva Canaan our Meaningful Christmas recipient for 2023. The Mission team looks forward to developing this relationship.

Confirmation and Cooperation: Something New

We resume our youth / confirmation class on September 10 with a unit on ethics and morality: "Ten Commandments and Beyond." The class will meet in the Fireside Library beginning at 10:15 (or as soon as we can get through the Coffee Fellowship line after church).

But this year, we are adding a new wrinkle to our Confirmation process. Once a month, on third Saturdays, our confirmands will meet with the confirmands of Hope and Pleasant Valley UMCs for a morning of learning, activities, games, and food. These will begin at 9:30am and conclude with lunch around noon. Our first session will be Saturday, Sept. 16, and we will meet at Hope UMC. These sessions will be led by Pastor Jerry and Pastor Jen Barnet of Hope/Pleasant Valley.

In effect, we will have two different youth programs running simultaneously. The monthly sessions on Saturdays will be focused on covering the core subjects of Confirmation (background to scripture, understanding Christian worship, understanding Methodism, etc.) while the Saturday sessions will be broader and more flexible, designed not just for those in Confirmation but for all youth trying to figure out how to live Christian lives in today's world.

SHARING GOD'S BLESSINGS

Our table for sharing our excess garden produce is set up in the Fellowship Hall. As tomatoes and cucumbers begin to appear in greater profusion than you can use or preserve, bring them by the church. In our church's commitment to inclusion, this is a new ministry to those members who suffer under the crippling disadvantages of not being able to keep plants alive (you know who you are).



Moreover, when the zucchini plants start to produce and, once again, you ask yourself why you planted so many, this year you don't have to resort to dropping them in unlocked cars or on doorsteps in the middle of the night. Bring them here. All vegetables are welcome.

To Scrip or Not to Scrip

Most of you are probably familiar with our Scrip program, in which the church buys gift cards for local businesses at a discount, then sells the cards to members for the full amount of the card. The result of this is that the church gets to keep the amount of the discount. So, for instance, a member buys a Mega-Holiday gift card for \$100, but because the church bought that card at a 10% discount, the Scrip program gets to keep \$10. Most of the discounts are smaller than that, closer to 3%, but it all adds up. Over the past few years, the Scrip program has made about \$3,500 per year for the church. That money has been designated in various ways: the Bell Tower Capital Campaign, Building Projects, and recently for Feed My People.

This doesn't just happen, though. For the past six years, our own Scrip program has been ably run by Dave Doxsie. A few other volunteers have helped out with Sunday sales, but all the work done in the background has been done by Dave. At the end of this year, though, Dave is retiring from Scrip. That means that unless we can find someone - or, better, at least two people - who can take over those duties, we will need to discontinue offering Scrip.

The basic duties of the Scrip coordinator are:

- Sales. This has traditionally been done from a table in the Fellowship Hall, though there may be other methods that could be used to supplement that process.
- Ordering. Cards that have been sold must be restocked. Most of these are ordered from one source, which mails the order to the church, but some of our most popular cards must be ordered separately then picked up at the store.
- Accounting. Dave has an Excel spreadsheet for recording all sales and orders, which he can
 give to his replacement(s). Scrip also has its own checking account to balance. Regular reports go to the Finance Committee and our auditors.
- *Marketing*. Simply keeping the program before the congregation by means of the Circuit Rider, the Short Circuit, and our church's other media.

There may be ways to streamline some of these processes, but the first step is to find someone who would be willing to take it on. If you are interested let Dave or Pastor Jerry know.

Financial Report through July, 2023

We did not have a budget report in last month's newsletter, at least partly because we needed the whole page for the report on Memorial gifts, so this is a report on how things have changed in the last *two* months.

A lot.

You probably need more than that, don't you? All right, our Spring financials were a little concerning. April and May are traditionally two of the stronger church financial months, what with the extra Easter giving, and usually help to build up some leeway before the lean summer offerings. But this year we lost ground in both April and May, partly from lower than expected giving, partly from higher than expected maintenance expenses. We ended May \$35,000 in the red for the year. We had expected a deficit at that point, but not that much.

Anyway, in June and July, we climbed a good way out of the hole. Your giving each month exceeded expectations, and our expenses lightened as well. While we are still \$27,000 in the red, we are now operating well above budget, as you can see in the chart below.

In the early years of my ministry, if someone had told me that I would see a world in which July giving was higher than giving in April, I would not have believed it, but here we are. It appears that for whatever reason, regular giving is no longer a seasonal activity, and is no longer tied directly to inperson attendance. Thank you.

Audit Report: One more note, Jill Weisenbeck and Jan Voss completed their 2nd quarter audit of our finances and gave that report to the Finance Committee in August. They found no significant problems in either our accounting or our processes. Their minor suggestions are being implemented.

Interfaith Prayer Service

One of the enduring religious traditions of the Chippewa Valley religious community is an interfaith prayer service that is held three times a year—in the Fall, Winter, and Spring. This is a chance for worshipers from a wide variety of traditions to come together, not to argue or to try to convert each other, but simply to acknowledge and show respect to those who are seeking meaning through faith, but who are on different paths than we are. Among the attendees in the past have been people from the Jewish, Muslim, Buddhist, and Ba'hai communities, as well as various flavors of Christianity. The service is primarily prayer—something that all our faiths agree on. The next service is this month:

Wednesday September 13. 6:30 pm St. James Catholic Church 2502 11th St. Eau Claire, Wisconsin.

The organizers promise that they will have a zoom/livestream link for those not attending in person, too. If you are interested in tuning in remotely, contact Pastor Jerry for that link.

A Note on Designating Gifts:

People giving Memorial or special gifts sometimes ask if they should designate a gift or leave it undesignated. Obviously if you are giving for a purpose then you should designated it, but what if you just want to make sure your gift is used? Is it better to designate it or leave it open-ended?

It depends. Sometimes designating gifts too precisely can make the gift less useful. I knew of a church that received a \$250,000 bequest—designated for altar flowers. I imagine that church had a lot of other ways they would have liked to use that money. On the other hand, sometimes money given without designation can end up sitting in an undesignated fund and get forgotten.

So here are some suggestions:

- 1. If you are giving a large gift, then the fewer restrictions you put on the gift, the better. If you want to designate your gift, do so in broad categories (building, worship, education, outreach, etc.).
- 2. If you are giving a gift and don't need it to be used at once, then it is fine to leave it undesignated. It'll be used one day, and we'll be glad of it then.
- 3. But if you want to know your gift will be used soon, here are some suggested designations that will ensure that your gift does not fall between the cracks:
 - Radio Ministry. This crucial ministry costs \$165 / week.
 - Building Improvements. Trustees will always find something to fix.
 - Outdoor Garden. Our beautiful front garden is a labor of love for Bonnie and Linda and other volunteers, but it's not cheap.
