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<p><u>Examination</u></p>	<p>Kittens are examined and vaccinated 3 times starting at 6 weeks of age. As adults, cats should receive one or two detailed examinations per year to ensure good health. On average pets age 7 times faster than people. Examinations provide an opportunity to detect and prevent potential health problems as early as possible.</p>	<p>Monthly Heartworm Preventive</p>	<p>Cats can be infected with the dog-heartworm. If a cat is infected with heartworms, it usually stops eating and has a cough or difficulty breathing. The disease is fatal in most cases. We recommend a monthly dose of Revolution® to prevent heartworms in your cat. In addition Revolution® will also protect your cat against ticks, roundworms and earmites.</p>
<p>Rabies Vaccination</p>	<p>State law requires rabies vaccination by 16 weeks old. Kittens can be vaccinated as early as 12 weeks, followed by vaccination ever year. Rabies is a fatal viral disease that can be transmitted to humans.</p>	<p>Feline Leukemia Vaccination</p>	<p>Yearly Vaccination that is effective against Feline Leukemia Virus infection. The virus is transmitted by bites.</p>
<p>Spay / Neuter</p>	<p>It is very important to spay and neuter your cat. Not only is it the responsible thing to do, but it also has many health advantages. Spaying your female, or neutering your male pet can prevent many cancers and diseases associated with the reproductive system in later years.</p>	<p>Monthly Flea Control</p>	<p>The monthly prescription flea products, Frontline® and Revolution®, offer safe, easy and highly effective flea control. Revolution® will also protect your cat against Ticks, roundworms, earmites, mange mites, and heartworms</p>
<p>Intestinal Parasite Test</p>	<p>Fecal Flotation Test can detect the presence of intestinal parasites (intestinal worms and protozoa). Cats should be tested yearly.</p>	<p>Feline Leukemia Test</p>	<p>New kittens and cats should be tested for this life-threatening disease before you introduce them into your household. At-Risk animals should be tested regularly throughout their life.</p>
<p>Deworming Treatment</p>	<p>Deworming for Roundworms and Hookworms that can be transmitted to humans. Kittens are dewormed at each visit, starting at 6 weeks old.</p>	<p>FIV Feline Aids Test</p>	<p>Feline Immunodeficiency Virus: Adult cats should be tested before introducing them into your household. At-Risk animals should be tested regularly throughout their life.</p>
<p>“Distemper” Vaccination (FRCP)</p>	<p>Yearly Vaccination that protects against 3 important diseases: Feline Viral Rinotracheitis, Calicivirus, and Panleukopenia, which are highly contagious.
