The Senior Pastor's Letter

At the beginning of 2025, we looked at a few of God's promises, remembering their centrality to our faith. Prayerfully God's words encouraged you then, helping you on your faith journey. I hope these promises from Genesis 28:15 and Joshua 1:5 are a blessing for you in the month of August.

In Genesis 28:15, we encounter a moment of profound reassurance. God speaks directly to Jacob, saying: "I am with you and will watch over you wherever you go, and I will bring you back to this land. I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." These words are not confined to Jacob's journey alone but are a testament to all who walk paths marked by uncertainty, longing, or hope. This promise is more than a pledge of physical safety or a return to a homeland — it is, at its core, the assurance of God's abiding presence and unwavering faithfulness.

Jacob, at the time of receiving this promise, was a man on the run, leaving behind his family and all that was familiar, uncertain of what lay ahead. It is in this vulnerable state that God meets him — not with condemnation or indifference, but with a promise that transcends the circumstances: "I am with you." This phrase, simple yet profound, becomes the foundation for trust. It does not guarantee an absence of hardship or trial; rather, it assures us that even in the midst of difficulty, God's presence abides.

This promise is not isolated to Jacob's narrative. When we turn to Joshua 1:5, we hear God reiterate a similar assurance: "No one will be able to stand against you all the days of your life. As I was with Moses, so I will be with you; I will never leave you nor forsake you." Here, as Joshua stands on the threshold of a daunting new chapter — leading the people of Israel into the Promised Land — the promise of God's unwavering presence is repeated. Joshua, designated as Moses' successor, faces a monumental task. The weight of leadership, the uncertainty of uncharted territory, and the memory of Moses' greatness loom large. Yet, God's words are not focused on Joshua's abilities or the odds; instead, they root the future in God's steadfastness.

Both passages highlight an essential pattern in the biblical narrative: God's promises are anchored in God's character, not in the circumstances or worthiness of those who receive them. God's faithfulness is not contingent upon human strength, merit, or understanding. Rather, it is rooted in the very nature of who God is: faithful, steadfast, and loving.

Consider the implications of these promises for our own journeys. Life is full of transitions, challenges, and seasons of uncertainty. We may find ourselves in unfamiliar territory, facing daunting decisions or obstacles. The temptation to rely solely on our resources or to be paralyzed by fear and doubt is real.

Yet, the invitation of scripture is to remember — to hold fast to — the promises made by God to those who have gone before us.

"I am with you." "I will never leave you nor forsake you." These are not cliches or comforting words spoken in passing; they are declarations of a divine commitment that persists throughout our lives. God's presence does not remove adversity, but it transforms the way we engage with it. In times of loneliness, God's companionship grants us courage. In moments of fear, the steadfastness of God becomes our anchor. When confronted with failure or disappointment, the assurance that God's purposes will not be thwarted — "I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised" — breathes hope into weary hearts.

Both Genesis 28:15 and Joshua 1:5 remind us that God's promises are communal as well as personal. Jacob's promise is not solely about his own journey, but about the future of a people — Israel. Joshua's charge is not just for individual triumph, but for the fulfillment of a promise made to prior generations. Our faith is never a solitary endeavor; the promises of God ripple outward, shaping families, communities, and nations.

As August unfolds, these ancient words remain as relevant as ever. They call us to trust, to lean into the presence of God, and to walk forward with the quiet confidence that we are not alone. In times when the road is unclear or the burden feels too great, we can rest in the assurance that God's faithfulness endures. Just as God watched over Jacob and empowered Joshua, so too does God accompany us on our journey, guiding, sustaining, and fulfilling every promise spoken.

May these truths from Genesis and Joshua be a comfort and a call to deeper trust. God is the same yesterday, today, and forever — worthy of our faith and hope as we step into each new day.

Letters from Leadership

Thoughts from Pastor Joey

Last month, I had the joy of spending several days in Madison, Wisconsin for Reconciling Ministries Network's 2025 Convocation, with a theme that couldn't be more fitting: "Uncharted: Becoming the Church We Need Right Now."

It is a unique moment in the life of the United Methodist Church. For years, so many of us have been working, praying, and showing up for the day when our denomination would finally remove harmful language and take real steps toward full inclusion. That moment came at General Conference last year — and it opened a whole new chapter. But as we've talked about before, the work didn't end there. If anything, it began again.

Each day in Madison was packed with worship, preaching, singing, and storytelling.



But more than that, it was a space to breathe. To be in rooms where queer people didn't have to explain or defend their place in the church. To sit beside pastors, students, parents, and lay leaders who are done waiting for permission to love fully and lead boldly.

One of the moments that stuck with me came during Bishop Kristin Stoneking's message on Sunday morning. About halfway through, she reminded us that even when the path ahead feels uncertain — even when we're not sure where the road is going — God is still leading. Not always with a spotlight, not with a neatly drawn map, but with a steady presence. And then she said:

"It's not our job to be certain. It's our calling to be faithful."

What I heard her saying was that becoming the church we need right now means trusting that love is enough of a compass. That justice is enough of a reason. That if we just keep taking one faithful step at a time, God will meet us on the road — no matter how far into uncharted territory we have come.

And that's what Convocation was about. Who we are becoming — as people, as communities, as the church. What it means to lead with courage and not just consensus. How we hold each other accountable to the gospel's radical welcome, not just in theory but in practice.

I left Madison feeling both renewed and challenged. The Spirit is clearly on the move — not just out there in the wider church, but here, in us. In our relationships. In our questions. In our growing edges.

So I'll leave you with the same question we were asked again and again throughout Convocation: What kind of church are we becoming? And how might we keep choosing love, again and again, even when the way feels uncharted?





Summer Movie Series






