### The Senior Pastor's Letter

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" **Isaiah 43:19 (NRSV)** 

Happy New Year, St. Paul's!!

The New Year invites us to stand at the threshold of possibility. It is a moment when God whispers the same promise spoken through Isaiah: I am doing a new thing. Not someday. Not eventually. Now. The Holy Spirit is already stirring, already moving, already preparing the ground beneath our feet.

This sense of holy anticipation resonates deeply with the renewed vision of The United Methodist Church: "The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections."

Isaiah 43:19 remind us that God is not confined to the past. God is creative, dynamic, and always at work bringing life out of dry places. As we enter a new year, this vision becomes both a compass and a calling.

Love Boldly: "We passionately love God and, like Jesus, embrace and include people of every age, nation, race, gender, and walk of life."

Bold love is the kind of love that sees God's "new thing" in people before they see it in themselves. It is the love that Jesus modeled — boundary breaking, justice seeking, grace giving. In a world often marked by division and fear, bold love becomes a prophetic act. This year, where might God be inviting us to love with greater courage, compassion, and conviction?

**Serve Joyfully:** "With the heart of Christ, we journey alongside the most vulnerable among us, offering care and compassion with joy."

Joyful service is not about adding more tasks to our calendars. It is about aligning our hearts with God's renewing work. When we serve with joy, we become signs of God's new creation — small but powerful reminders that hope is alive. Whether it's feeding neighbors, mentoring youth, or simply showing up with kindness, joyful service transforms both the giver and the receiver.

**Lead Courageously:** "Following Jesus' example, we resist and dismantle all systems of evil, injustice, and oppression, striving for peace, justice, and reconciliation."

Courageous leadership is not about titles or positions. It is about willingness — the willingness to step forward when others hesitate, to speak truth when silence feels safer, to imagine possibilities when others see obstacles. Isaiah's promise invites us to trust that God is already preparing the way. Courageous leadership begins with that trust.

God asks, "Do you not perceive it?" Not because the new thing is hidden, but because we often rush past it. This year, may we slow down enough to notice the Spirit's movement — in our congregation, our communities, and our own hearts. Our shared vision calls us to be attentive disciples, ready to join God's unfolding work.

Let us pray: Holy God, as we enter 2026, open our eyes to the new thing you are doing. Empower us by your Spirit to love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously. Make us instruments of your renewing work throughout the world. Amen.

# Notes from St. Paul's Leaders

# Thoughts from Pastor Joey

The phrase "clean slate" is one of those phrases that used to mean one thing but now means another. Before paper was cheap and widely available, people—especially in schools and for bookkeeping—often wrote on slates: flat pieces of slate stone framed in wood. They wrote with chalk, and when the work was finished (or wrong), the slate could be wiped clean with a cloth or sponge and used again.

So a clean slate was exactly that: a slate with no writing on it, ready to be reused. Over time, we began using the phrase more figuratively, especially around the new year. In the life of faith, we sometimes imagine this is how God works, giving us a clean slate, erasing what came before.

The idea is comforting. However, the reality is that we don't start January with a blank page. We start it carrying things with us from the last year, grief or gratitude, unanswered prayers or quiet hope still waiting to take shape, things that don't magically disappear just because the calendar flipped.

As Methodists, though, we take an interesting approach to the new year using the Wesley Covenant Prayer, which has been traditionally prayed at the start of the year. One of the things I really appreciate about it is that it doesn't pretend we're starting over from scratch or ask us to make promises we're not sure we can keep. Instead, it invites us to trust. "I am no longer my own, but thine..."

I've come to appreciate the Wesley Covenant Prayer because it makes space for honesty. It assumes we're showing up with real lives, unfinished, complicated, and still unfolding. The trust it asks for isn't just for moments when things are going well. It's also for days when life feels heavy, when energy is low, or when the next step isn't clear at all.

Rather than erasing the past, the prayer invites us to place our whole lives—exactly as they are—into God's hands. Not later. Not once we've figured everything out. So perhaps the question for January isn't How do I start over? but Where is God already meeting me?

As we begin this new year together, my prayer is that we would remember this: we are not on our own. We never have been. We step into the year ahead held by grace, guided by love, and accompanied by a faithful God who walks with us—every step of the way.


## Thank You, Thank You

# Notes from St. Paul's Leaders

## **Bequest Recognition**

From Mike Barnes, Trustees

Through God's grace and good stewardship, St. Paul's has stood strong as a shining light in Kensington for almost 140 years. It is through the generosity and faith of our members and friends that we are able to provide a safe and welcoming place for worship, ministries, and community use.

In the past few years, St. Paul's has received bequests from the estates of seven members. These bequests total over \$383,000. One of the bequests was designated specifically to continue efforts to upgrade accessibility into the church building, while the others were unrestricted. From these funds, \$56,000 has been directed to the ministries of St. Paul's to provide material support to the Hunger Ministry, Stephen Ministry, education, and other ministries. This includes youth-focused ministry, where St. Paul's has set aside money to encourage participation in youth mission trips and to support the Jim Smith Educational Award that provides financial awards to our graduating high school seniors. Together, the remaining funds have been directed to bring ramps and entryways into compliance with modern accessibility standards, repair and replace sections of the roof, repair the bell tower, establish an emergency fund, and contribute to the general operations of the church.

Plaques bearing the names of the bequest donors will be installed on the northwest brick wall of the Sanctuary in January, alongside the names of other members who previously left bequests to St. Paul's. We are grateful to be adding plaques with the names of Margaret Wood, Cliff Thompson, Margaret & Jeff Thurlow, Sarah & Jack Jenkins, Jan Heins, Becky Little, and Ida DeVierno to the wall. During worship on Sunday, January 25, 2026, the 10:30 AM service will include a moment of recognition where our leaders acknowledge the contributions of these friends of the church.


How else can we make sure our God sees us shining like God dreams for us to be?



## Feeding the Hungry

St. Paul's signature ministry feeds over 150 households in the 20895 ZIP code every month. We provide each household with a bag of pantry staples and a \$25 grocery store card to enable recipients to purchase meat, dairy, fresh and frozen foods, and hygiene products. We also offer a takeaway meal, bread and cookies from partners at Campus Kitchens and LeVain bakery, and an opportunity for light refreshments in the Fellowship Hall.
