#### Senior Pastor's Letter

"Glass half empty or glass half full."

This is not just a matter of perspective. This is the theology of scarcity and abundance. These are the lenses through which we tend to measure our worth and our success.

Numbers are our preferred means of measurement. How much money we have, how many people are in the pews? And if the numbers don't add up the way we think they should, then we peer longingly through the lens of lack, remembering what used to be, or counting what is not.

The theology of scarcity focuses on what we believe God is not doing and what God is not providing. The theology of scarcity is based solely on what we can or cannot see.

But the theology of abundance offers a much different perspective. It is not the pollyannaish mentality of looking at the world through rose colored glasses. The theology of abundance is not ignoring the realities or pretending everything is great.

The theology of abundance is the lens that looks beyond what is, to what could be. It is looking for what God may be doing that numbers cannot measure. It is looking for ways in which God is opening doors of opportunities that the numbers might mask. I believe that may be why scripture speaks of growth in terms of fruit rather than numbers.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law."

It seems that the worth of a crop is measured not just by how much is produced but the quality of the yield. You can have a large harvest of bitter fruit, or a smaller harvest with the best-tasting fruit ever. And if I can go out on an agricultural limb, it seems that a good harvest produces the seeds for the next crop.

The numbers do not always tell the whole story.

The success of a church has often been measured by the number of people in the pews and the amount of money pouring in. And while no one wants to worship in an empty sanctuary, or have to continually beg to keep the lights on, spiritual growth and maturity are not measured by how many people show up and how much they give.

We are not merely entering a season where we will receive a new pastor and follow new leadership. We have entered a season where we must begin to look beyond numbers for evidence of fruit. Where do we see joy, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, peace, and love? Where is the evidence of gentleness and patience? Where do you see fruit?

Indeed it would be irresponsible stewardship to ignore the numbers. But the numbers are not the whole story. We must decide if we will be statisticians of scarcity, or ambassadors of abundance. It makes a tremendous difference in the potential for harvest.

## Wednesday Zoom Study






"At His Name" by Joel Raney Thursday, March 28, 2024 7:30 PM In-person in the Sanctuary

## Good Friday

Good Friday, also sometimes called Holy Friday or Black Friday, commemorates the crucifixion and death of Christ. The service will feature music selected by organist Marvin Mills and time for contemplation. Join this solemn service in-person in the the Sanctuary. ### Holy Week Stations of the Cross

Monday-Friday, March 25-29, 2024 11:00 AM-1:00 PM & 5:00-7:00 PM In-person in the Octagon

The Stations of the Cross are a series of Scriptures which tell the story of the crucifixion. Even though we know that death does not have the final word and resurrection is coming, this is a practice that gives us an opportunity to reflect and repent. This self-guided experience consists of six stations (abbreviated from the traditional fourteen). St. Paul's Stations of the Cross event this year invites us to walk "the way of sorrows" to the cross through the eyes of one of Jesus' closest disciples. The visitor experience highlights Peter's role in the crucifixion narrative as told in the Gospel of John, helping us to follow Jesus to his death with Peter as our companion. Each of the six stations provides multisensory ways to imagine, engage, confess, and lament. By focusing on Peter, we can consider how we might have acted and behaved as one of Jesus' followers and friends.

- Station 1: Peter resists then receives the foot washing -JOHN 13:1-20
- Station 2: Jesus foretells Peter's denials - JOHN 13:31-38
- Station 3: Peter draws his sword JOHN 18:1-11
- Station 4: Jesus is arrested and Peter denies Christ -JOHN 18:12-18
- Station 5: Peter denies Christ again and again -JOHN 18:19-27
- Station 6: Jesus is Crucified
   JOHN 19:1-30

Why? St. Paul's has a several decades-long commitment to the Interfaith Works Taft Court shelter off Gude Drive (formerly the Wilkins Avenue facility). During COVID (2020-2022), a group at St. Paul's formed to purchase, prepare, and deliver breakfast supplies and hot meals, rotating between Taft Court, a short-term shelter in Silver Spring, and a new shelter at Crabb's Branch Way. The church is seeking funds to help support this ongoing effort. In the past, St. Paul's undertook to provide meals for one week each spring, with various church groups preparing and serving 35-40 dinner meals each day and providing sandwiches for the week. Historically, groups included the Methodist Men, women's circles, confirmation class, adult classes, choir, and Justice & Compassion, with each group covering their own expenses.

Who are the 2x4s? The 2x4s tend to be church attendees in their 20s to 40s, though we don't card folks - your age doesn't prohibit you from being a part of this group! Typically, we have functioned as a social group but this will be our first fundraising effort toward specific St. Paul's ministries.

## Feeding Hungry Neighbors: Our Signature Ministry

Responses in our "This Is Us" survey confirm members and friends agree: the Hunger Ministry is an important way St. Paul's works to make life better in the 20895 ZIP code. On the second Monday of each month, families receive pantry staples, a dinner meal in "to go" boxes, and donated baked goods. We also provide a grocery store card. ## "This Is Us" Meeting Recap

On Sunday, February 11, members of St. Paul's lay leadership (also known as SAM) gathered in the Sanctuary for a church-wide meeting to discuss the "This Is Us" document and the related survey. The meeting was also live-streamed and can be viewed by going to the *stpaulsk.org/worship/worship-at-home* recording for Feb. 11.

Rachel Stalcup, Chairperson of the SAM, explained the origins of SAM (formerly known as Church Council). SAM stands for Simplified Accountability Model and the idea is to streamline the business functions and decisions of the church in order to better align with the church's ministry goals - and to ensure St. Paul's can be the hands and feet of Christ in the community, as was expressed during the visioning retreat in early 2023. SAM works alongside the pastors in servant leadership. The SAM meets several times a year and the meetings are open and announced in Weekly News and the Epistle. (The next SAM meeting will take place on Zoom on March 18, 6:30-8:00 PM). The individuals who have volunteered to serve on SAM give their time, talent, and treasure - and they are always available to hear your questions and comments. All the SAM members are listed at the bottom of this message.

Grace Graham described her role as the Ministry Table Chair. As a subset of SAM, the Ministry Table concentrates on ministries of the church and advocates to SAM for support and resources to better serve the community. Last year, the Ministry Table focused on identifying efforts within the church and needs of the community. In 2024, the group is making connections across our internal groups and programs sponsored by outside organizations and other faith groups. All ideas, suggestions, operational support, and resources from the congregation are welcome!

Rich Higgins, who oversees the church finances in his role on SAM, announced that while 2023 was a challenging year for church finances (operating at a deficit for most of the year), we were blessed to end the year with a surplus. 2024 is a year of opportunity, and SAM hopes to stabilize our finances and continue the important work of re-building and growing our ministries through a greater commitment to Stewardship and serving our local and worldwide community.

Finally, our new Lay Leader Anne Dean, talked about the survey connected to the "This Is Us" document. The survey is a great example of how the leadership asks and listens to congregational input. There were 52 respondents to the "This Is Us" survey, which had three components - internal logistics, internal spiritual formation and ministry, and external ministry and mission. The SAM learned that congregants place a high value on St. Paul's electronic and print communications, and that the Hunger Ministry remains a central part of our church's ministries. Congregants also emphasized the importance of Sunday School as a way to engage youth and families. The information gathered in the survey will be used to guide the leadership's decision-making over the next year.



## "This Is Us" Follow-Up Questions: Membership

During our church wide meeting on Sunday February 11, 2024 a question regarding our membership was posed which I tentatively addressed. I promised to research the question and provide a response. The question was "Since COVID, how many members have we lost and how many have we gained?"

Each January, we prepare a required statistical report for the Baltimore-Washington Conference which captures information about our membership, as well as other church data. That report is the source from which the following response is prepared.

Since 2020, a total of 155 persons have been removed from the membership rolls of St. Paul's UMC Kensington, for one of the following reasons:

- withdrew from the denomination
- transferred to another UMC church
- transferred to a non-UMC church
- removed by church conference action
- passed away

Of these 155 persons, the largest group (53) were removed by church conference action. These are persons who have not in any way participated in the life of the church, joined in worship, or contributed to the ministries of the church over a three-year period AND have not responded to any attempts of the church to contact them by mail, phone, or email.

The Book of Discipline lays out rules for an annual "care of members review," resulting in the removal of such inactive members from the membership roll every year at church conference. So, there will most likely be more persons removed by church conference action in the fall of this year, for the same reasons.

Since 2020, 45 persons have been received into membership at St. Paul's UMC Kensington through confirmation, transfer from another UMC church, or reaffirmation of faith (received from another denomination).


Our current membership is 687. At the beginning of 2020, our membership roll carried 803 names.

However, since our vitality and vibrancy are measured by our ministry and living out our mission, I would offer that St. Paul's is succeeding in feeding the hearts, minds, and souls of the people God sends our way, in ways that are not solely defined by membership numbers.

#### Holy Week and Eastertide

### Make It! Easter Eggs in a Nest

- 1/3 cup butter
- 4 cups mini marshmallows
- 6 cups cornflakes cereal
- Cadbury mini eggs, or Whoppers mini robin eggs, or large jelly beans (between 12 and 36 candies)



- 1 muffin pan
- 1. Grease the cups of the muffin pan or line with paper liners.
- 2. Put the cornflakes in a large mixing bowl.
- 3. With a grown-up's help, melt the butter in a pot over low heat on the stove. Add the marshmallows and keep stirring until they melt completely.
- 4. Pour the marshmallow-butter mix over the cornflakes. Stir gently until cornflakes are coated.
- 5. Using a spoon (because the mix may still be hot!), press the cornflakes into the muffin cups, making a "nest" shape.
- 6. Place one, two, or three candy eggs in the center of each nest.
- 7. Let cool! You can put them in the refrigerator for about 1 hour.
- 8. Note: You can also make the nests using your favorite Rice Krispie Treats recipe.

Easter is a whole season in the church! It starts on Easter Sunday and lasts 50 days, until we reach Pentecost in May.

#### Did You Ever Wonder About... Easter Symbols?

**Lilies** - Lilies and other flowers that come from bulbs (like daffodils and tulips) lay in the ground during the cold months and seem to be dead. Each spring, they grow and show they are alive! And the beautiful flowers remind us to have hope.

**Eggs & Chicks** - Jesus's death and resurrection brought new life to all people. The chick that hatches from the egg is a new life. In breaking free of the egg, we are reminded Jesus broke free from the tomb. If you go to an "Easter Egg Roll," you may be reminded of the stone that was rolled away from the tomb!

**Butterflies** - The caterpillar transforms into a colorful butterfly. In one sense, the caterpillar "dies" and the butterfly is "born," like Jesus dying on the cross and rising in glory, or us being transformed by the love of Jesus.

Easter Bunny - This one is tricky! Baby bunnies born in the spring are another sign of new life and hope. But a bunny who brings colorful eggs? According to the Center for Children's Literature and Culture at the University of Florida, it started with a very old German folktale about a little girl who prayed over an injured bird. According to legend, the bird was magically transformed into a rabbit. It hopped away but returned each year, and laid rainbow-colored eggs! About 300 years ago, German settlers in America shared the legend of this egg-laying rabbit, symbolizing transformation and new life like that offered by Jesus. The night before Easter, children would put out hand-made nests. In the morning they'd find brightly colored eggs inside. Nowadays we put out baskets lined with paper or plastic grass instead, and many of our surprises on Easter morning are made of chocolate! That's sweet. The resurrection of Jesus is also one sweet story!
