Let the Wise Listen

Proverbs 1:5 ESV declares, "Let the wise hear and increase in learning, and the one who understands obtain guidance."

This verse, in the opening chapter of the book of Proverbs, captures a timeless call to humility, growth, and discernment. This call resonates deeply — not only as a spiritual imperative but as a cultural and theological anchor. Its emphasis on listening, learning, and seeking guidance aligns with our legacy of resilience, liberation, and communal wisdom.

Our Wesleyan roots emphasize a theology of grace — prevenient, justifying, and sanctifying. We encourage one another to grow in holiness through a lifelong process of discipleship. Proverbs 1:5 mirrors this journey: the wise are not static in their knowledge but are called to "increase in learning." Wisdom is not merely intellectual but spiritual — formed through Scripture, tradition, reason, and experience. This verse becomes a mandate for us to remain teachable, open to God's ongoing revelation, and committed to spiritual maturity.

Our denomination's emphasis on connectionalism — our belief in the interdependence of congregations — also finds resonance in Proverbs 1:5. The pursuit of wisdom and guidance is not a solitary endeavor but a communal one. When we love one another, when we grow in wisdom together, we're stronger together. In small groups and Bible studies, we are encouraged to listen to one another, share insights, and hold each other accountable. This communal pursuit of understanding reflects the Proverbs 1:5 dual emphasis on hearing and growing.

This verse takes on additional layers of meaning. Historically, the church has been a sanctuary of wisdom — a place where enslaved and oppressed people gathered not only to worship but to strategize, educate, and survive. The act of listening — whether to elders, preachers, or the Spirit — was often a matter of life and death. In this context, "let the wise hear" becomes a call to attentiveness in the face of injustice, a reminder that wisdom is forged in struggle. In the brokenness of our world, the struggle is real.

Proverbs 1:5 also aligns with the themes of liberation theology, which have shaped much of our shared theological reflection. The verse's call to seek guidance is not passive; it is an active pursuit of justice, truth, and transformation.

In the face of systemic racism, economic inequality, and social marginalization, we turn to Scripture for direction. Proverbs 1:5 becomes a rallying cry: to listen to the cries of the oppressed, to learn from history, and to seek divine guidance for the work of liberation.

This theological orientation is evident in the ministries of many of our congregations today. Whether through social justice initiatives, educational programs, or prophetic preaching, our churches embody the wisdom of Proverbs 1:5. They teach that understanding is not merely cognitive but ethical — that to "obtain guidance" is to discern how to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with God.

Proverbs 1:5 is more than a proverb — it is a way of life. It calls us to humility, to the discipline of listening, and to the courage of seeking guidance. It affirms that wisdom is not the possession of the elite but the inheritance of those who are willing to learn, even in the midst of suffering. This verse affirms a legacy of faith that listens, learns, and leads with holy wisdom.

Notes from St. Paul's Leaders

Thoughts from Pastor Joey

As we move through the month of November, Pastor Sheridan and I are inviting the congregation into a season of focused prayer as we mark the end of the Christian year, which concludes on November 23, 2025 with Christ the King Sunday.

This past year has brought with it many burdens, injustices, and sorrows. These are realities that call us into prayer and into deeper hope for the coming reign of Christ. It feels both timely and faithful to end the year praying for the breaking of all forms of oppression.

Scripture gives voice to this hope. The prophet Isaiah declares, "Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?" (Isaiah 58:6). This reminds us that we are more than passive observers. We are called to join with God in the work of justice and liberation. The chains we build throughout this month represent the very injustices and burdens that God longs to break.



This vision of faithful action invites us to bring the injustices of our world before God—not just in thought, but in tangible, prayerful ways.

Each Sunday in November, slips of paper will be available in the Narthex or the Octagon for you to write down an example of oppression that weighs on your heart. These slips will be linked together to form paper chains that will grow throughout the month, symbolizing the weight and reality of the brokenness in our world.

Then, on Christ the King Sunday, as we proclaim the good news that Christ reigns over all powers and principalities, we will break the chains together, offering our prayers to God and embodying our hope that Christ will ultimately triumph over every form of evil and oppression.

We hope you'll join us in this prayerful practice as we journey toward the hope of Christ's reign.

Looking for some calm and stillness in your life, a deeper connection to God and community? Come check out Still Wednesday at 7:00 PM in the Sanctuary or Octagon each week. Light a candle and listen to a variety of prayer forms and themes. Each week is a bit different but there is usually 20 minutes of silent prayer. Bring a journal if you have one (or we can provide it). That's all you need, plus an open heart to listen and be receptive to the Holy Spirit. All are welcome!



A Note from Tom Pedersen

Advent is a time of preparation and hope, celebrating the extraordinary gift of Jesus Christ, the Son of God and Son of Man. On Sunday, December 7, at 10:30 AM, the Music Department will come together with soloists, orchestra, choir, and congregation to worship as a community, preparing the way of the Lord.

During this service, Christina Griffin, the director of our children's choir, will be the featured soprano soloist for Marvin Mills's beautiful arrangement of *Rise, Shepherds, and Follow*, which is scored for strings, woodwinds, horn, and organ. Marvin's setting serves as a powerful call for us to rise and follow the star to Bethlehem. The lyrics repeatedly urge the shepherds to leave their herds and follow the star — a wonderful sentiment for this season.

We will also hear an exceptional setting of *The Magnificat* by composer Taylor Scott Davis. His setting, which includes a verse in English in a modern voice, will be sung by Soprano Anna Phillips Brown. Anna will be joined by the Sanctuary Choir, strings, winds, harp, and percussion. The text of the Magnificat highlights God's mercy, strength, and justice — lifting the lowly, filling the hungry with good things, and sending the rich away empty. It also emphasizes God's faithfulness to the promises made to Abraham and his descendants forever — powerful words for this Advent Season.

In the composer's own words: "The Magnificat text is rich and historic, and although it seems to be an unwritten rule, each composer gets one opportunity to express what the text means to them. Is it possible to capture the transformation of Mary from a typical teenage girl to God's chosen one? Can five movements effectively convey the range of emotions this story evokes? What elements help in narrating the story, and which may come off as overly dramatic?"

I encourage you to join us for Advent Music Sunday! Bring friends, share the hope of the Shepherds, the voice of Mary, and the good news that Jesus will be among us once again this Christmas morning.




Notes from St. Paul's Leaders

Lay Leader Reflections

From Anne Dean, Lay Leader

In October, a few of us joined "Reaching and Welcoming New People," a BWC Training Tuesday with Ken Willard, Director of Faith Communities ReNEWal for the West Virginia Conference of the UMC and author of "Beacon of Hope: Your Guide to Reaching, Witnessing, and Welcoming New People." Ken talked about how we can embody the love of Christ in ways that are authentic, intentional, and transformative. There were four points that stuck with me:



- 1. A Guest vs. A Visitor. This really blew up the chat! A guest you are prepared to receive, a visitor is random. What if instead of readying for visitors, we readied for guests? There's always a seat for a guest!
- 2. Helping people know what to do in all aspects (think building signage, bulletins, website, the works). Ken recommended looking at our website and physical plant once a year with "first timers eyes" to make sure people know how to find us. He also talked about looking at ways to make space ADA accessible wherever possible.
- 3. Introducing ourselves this one is harder for me but also one SAM (St. Paul's administrative leadership council) recently talked about. When I see new-to-me faces, I assume others have been going to St. Paul's longer than I have been, and I do not proactively introduce myself as a result. Let's all push past worries and say hi to all the new faces!
- 4. Engaging with the community Ken told a story about one church who did a prayer walk through their rural community, which led to a dinner with neighbors, who were all farmers and brought a literal farm-to-table meal to share. What would it look like for us at St. Paul's to do a neighborhood prayer walk?

Stronger Together

As our 40 Days of Prayer in Stewardship Season continues, we are hearing powerful stories of how God has worked through our St. Paul's community over the years. Each one reminds us that we are, indeed, Stronger Together. One member shared a memory from more than 30 years ago:

"In 1991, my husband lost his job unexpectedly. We had three young sons, and he was out of work for more than two years. We will never forget it."






