The Senior Pastor's Letter

One Decision Away From A Totally Different Life

The human journey is marked by grace, freedom, and the ever-present possibility of transformation. God's grace is not only prevenient—going before us—but also empowering, enabling us to respond freely to the divine invitation. Within this framework, the idea that we are one decision away from a totally different life is not merely motivational rhetoric; it is a theological truth grounded in the dynamic relationship between divine grace and human agency.

Every person is endowed with free will, restored by prevenient grace, so that we might choose to follow Christ. This means that at any moment, we stand at a crossroads where a single decision—whether to turn toward God, to forgive, to surrender, to serve—can alter the trajectory of our lives. The ongoing process of being made holy, underscores that transformation is not a one-time event but a continual unfolding. Yet it often begins with a single, decisive moment.

Consider the story of the prodigal son. Though he had squandered his inheritance and found himself in despair, he made one decision: "I will arise and go to my father." That choice, simple yet profound, led to reconciliation, restoration, and celebration. This moment reflects the interplay of grace and response. The father's love was constant, prevenient, waiting—but it was the son's decision to return that opened the door to a new life.

In our own lives, we often underestimate the power of a single choice. We imagine that change requires monumental effort or perfect conditions. But our UMC tradition would remind us that God is already at work, stirring our hearts, preparing the way. The question is not whether transformation is possible—it is whether we will respond. One decision to pray, to seek community, to confess, to forgive, to say "yes" to God can set in motion a cascade of grace that reshapes everything.

This truth is not limited to spiritual conversion; faith is deeply practical. John Wesley's concern for social holiness—living out faith in love and justice—means that our decisions in daily life matter profoundly. Choosing to speak truth, to advocate for the marginalized, to live with integrity, to extend compassion—these are decisions that ripple outward, changing not only our lives but the lives of others. We are one decision away from becoming agents of healing in a broken world.

We also acknowledge the struggle inherent in decision-making. Wesley spoke of the divided heart, the tension between grace and sin, the need for ongoing renewal.

We may hesitate at the threshold of change, fearing what we might lose or how we might fail. But Wesley's doctrine of assurance reminds us that we can know the love of God in our hearts, that we are not alone in our striving. The Holy Spirit empowers us to choose rightly, to walk in the light, to grow in grace.

In moments of uncertainty, it helps to remember that God's grace is not contingent on our perfection but on our willingness. The decision that leads to a totally different life is not always dramatic—it may be quiet, hidden, even painful. But it is real. It is the decision to trust, to obey, to hope. These decisions are never made in isolation. We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses, by the communion of saints, by the church that nurtures and guides us.

So if you find yourself at a crossroads, wondering whether one decision could truly change your life, the easy answer is yes, it can. Because God is already there, inviting, empowering, loving. It begins with a step. The journey of grace begins with a "yes." And the life we long for—the life of peace, purpose, and joy—is not far off. It is one decision away.

Thoughts from Pastor Joey

From Forgotten to Fruitful

A funny thing happened this year. After Halloween last fall, we had a carved pumpkin sitting out by the porch. As it began to soften and sag, the kids weren't quite ready to part with it, so we moved it over near the trash bins — and, honestly, forgot about it.

Winter came and went. The pumpkin gradually broke down, becoming one with the soil. By early spring, it had disappeared entirely, with its remains mixed into the dirt like compost. We didn't think anything of it.

Then summer arrived. Out of that forgotten patch of ground, a vine sprouted. We decided to leave it alone and see what happened. And slowly, that vine began to stretch and climb—and eventually, two bright orange pumpkins appeared. Out of what we thought was trash grew something beautiful and new.

This little moment in our backyard reminded me of a verse that follows the well-known passage in Ecclesiastes 3, which begins, "For everything there is a season..." Just a few verses later, we hear this profound truth: "God has made everything beautiful in its time." – Ecclesiastes 3:11

There is something deeply hopeful in that verse. It reminds us that God is always at work—sometimes slowly, quietly, and invisibly—turning even the messiest, most broken, forgotten things into something new. Even what we discard, overlook, or count as lost may become, in time, a source of unexpected life and blessing.

That's good news in a world that often feels overwhelmed by tragedy and division. In days of violence, political unrest, and heartbreak, it's easy to feel like everything is falling apart. But this pumpkin vine reminds me of something deeper: that even now, God is redeeming. God is renewing. God is still in the business of bringing life out of death.

From the garbage, God is growing something beautiful. Maybe not on our timeline. But in God's time.

So if you're in a season where things feel like they're breaking down—take heart. The story isn't over. God makes everything beautiful in its time..








All Saints Sunday

Each month, year-round, we feed about 150 households, including senior citizens on fixed income, people with disabilities, and families from diverse backgrounds. We provide a bag of shelf-stable pantry items, a takeaway meal, and donated bread or produce. We also provide a grocery store gift card. This allows recipients to buy fresh or frozen food, dairy or meat, and hygiene products with dignity. Contemplative prayer is a form of prayer that involves quieting the mind and body to create space for God's presence to be felt.




