How Much:

The entry fee for individual events (art, solos, etc.) is \$7 per student, per entry. The entry fee for group events (large vocal ensemble, reader's theater, etc.) is \$14 for duets and \$35 for any group with three or more students. There is a cap of 3 entries per category per school except in academic testing. Because of scheduling difficulties, please do not enter the same students in Bible Quiz, Bible Memory and Spelling Bee.

What to Bring:

2 copies of the judging sheets for each performance with the pieces (originals required for music) or copies (for speech, etc) included.

Girls' and ladies' skirts will be to the middle of the knee or longer, and necklines will not be exceedingly low or open in the front or back.

Boys and men will wear neat shirts with a collar, tucked in, and nice slacks. Please no jeans.

6th Grade Clarification:

Since academic testing and creative writing are grade specific, 6th graders can only enter as 6th graders in those categories. Awards for these competitions will be given at the elementary competition on April 24, 2026.

For all other categories, if your school chooses to enter 6th graders in any of the JH competitions offered March 5-6, 2026, then they cannot enter those competitions for the elementary competition.

AACS 43rd Annual AACS Creative Writing Contest 2025–2026 Topics



Elementary

- Poetry—Write a poem on this topic: This makes me happy.
- Short Story—Write a story that involves something negative or bad that turns out to be positive or good.

Junior High

- Poetry—Write a poem about a celebration (for example: holiday, birthday, family tradition, winning a sporting event); consider including sights, sounds, taste, smells, and emotions, and/or a specific participant's perspective.
- Short Story—Write a story in which the main character tries something new that is exciting, frightening, or enlightening. What does your character learn or how does he change from his experience?

Rules

1. Entries shall meet the specific length requirements listed below:

ELEMENTARY LEVEL (GRADES 4-6)JUNIOR HIGH LEVEL (GRADES 7-8)Poetry:maximum 200 wordsShort Story:maximum 750 wordsShort Story:maximum 1000 words

2. A student may enter only one category—either short story or poetry.

Teachers

- a. Our goal with this contest is to award excellence. Writing may begin with free writing. But excellent writing on any level requires writing and re-writing. Use this as a teaching opportunity. Tell your students the topic at least one week in advance. Brainstorm with your class. Follow your curriculum's procedure for pre-writing, writing, peer editing, teacher review, and re-writing.
- b. Review the judging forms for judging criteria.
- c. Student entries are not required to be spiritual in nature or application. Content should be wholesome and within the boundaries of appropriate Christian thought and behavior (Phil. 4:8). Vulgarity, sexual innuendoes, crass humor, dark subject matter, distasteful, and biblically objectionable content are not appropriate.
- d. Absolutely no plagiarism or Al-generated work is acceptable.
- e. Within the guidelines above in 3.a., the entry must be the student's own work.

4. Preparing the Entry

- a. Typed entries are preferred, but handwritten entries will be accepted. The student should type or write a clean copy to submit for judging. If the hand-written entry has been scanned for digital submission, ensure that the scanned copy is clear enough for judges to read easily.
- b. Entries to state and national competition must be free of written comments and corrections.
- c. The following information <u>must</u> be listed at the top of the first page of the student's entry: Student's name and grade; school name, city, and state; category entered; title; **word count**; and **statement of originality.**STATEMENT OF ORIGINALITY: I certify that this project is my own original and authentic work and that I received no help in completing this project other than general instruction and supervision. (Type or sign name after statement.) **Failure to include statement of originality will result in disqualification.**
- d. A "fancy" cover page or title page is not allowed.
- e. Entries and judging forms must be submitted as digital files. Label files in the following format:

- 5. Review the judging forms for judging criteria. The schools should have received copies of each judging form. If not, please contact your state office, or download the digital judging forms from the Competition tab on the AACS website. Before submitting the entry, on the judging form fill in the level, name, school, city, state, grade, **title**, and **number of words**. The student will be penalized if the judging form is incomplete.
- 6. **Submitting the Entry:** Original student entries **and judging forms** must be submitted **as email attachments** to the state association by **December 8, 2025.** (This date may vary by state. Please contact your state office for exact deadline for your state.) Each association will select one winner in each category on each level. These four winners will be emailed to AACS for the national judging; these entries should be received by the National Office by **January 22, 2026.** National winners will be announced in April 2026.

Awards

AACS provides the awards—medals for state winners and plaques for national winners.

ACADEMIC TESTING

Registration and Payment:

Tests Offered:

3rd Grade: Math, English, History and Science 4th Grade: Math, English, History and Science 5th Grade: Math, English, History and Science 6th Grade: Math, English, History and Science

Remember 6th graders will take the 6th grade test, even if competing in different competitions at the JH/HS Competition.

POETRY

The poetry competition will be conducted with the following guidelines:

- 1. Poem recitation must be between 1-5 minutes long.
- 2. Poems must be memorized.
- 3. Entries are not restricted to sacred themes. However, entries which reflect anti-biblical themes, content and/or word usage may be disqualified.
- 4. No props should be used.
- 5. Poem must be a published work.
- 6. Two copies must be provided for the judges on the day of competition.
- 7. Please be sure all speeches have been approved by your school.

INTERPRETIVE SPEECHES

The interpretive speech competition will be conducted with the following guidelines:

- 1. Speech recitation must be between 1-5 minutes long.
- 2. Speech must be memorized.
- 3. Entries are not restricted to sacred themes. However, entries which reflect anti-biblical themes, content and/or word usage may be disqualified.
- 4. No props should be used.
- 5. Speech must be a published work.
- 6. Two copies must be provided for the judges on the day of competition.
- 7. Please be sure all speeches have been approved by your school.

GROUP SPEECH CATEGORIES

SMALL GROUP ACTING

Time limit: 3 – 7 minutes

Number of characters: 2 - 6 individuals

Small group acting is a stage performance in which two to six individuals each portray one character without the use of script, costumes, staging, lights, sound effects, or make-up. Cutting must be taken from published dramatic literature or from prose that has been scripted for stage. A copy of the script must be provided for the judges.

Characters may speak to silent or off-stage characters. Actors may make use of small hand props and costume accessories (such as an umbrella, shawl, gloves, hat, glasses, etc.). No makeup, lighting, full costumes, or furniture other than a table and chairs may be used.

READERS THEATER

Time limit: 3 – 7 minutes

Number of characters: 2 - 6 individuals

Reader's theater is a presentation in which two to six individuals portray characters without the use of script, costumes, staging, lights, sound effects, or make-up. Cutting must be taken from published dramatic literature or from prose that has been scripted for stage. A copy of the script must be provided for the judges.

Characters are not to interact with each other, but rather should be focused on the audience. Characters may make use of small hand props and costume accessories (such as an umbrella, shawl, gloves, hat, glasses, etc.). No makeup, lighting, full costumes, or furniture other than a table and chairs may be used.

BIBLE MEMORY

Bible memory will be conducted in the traditional spelling bee fashion. The King James Version will be the only authorized translation used. The 2025-2026 Bible memory competition will cover the information found from points I - III on the "God's Promises" outline provided in this handbook. A student will be permitted one error before elimination. Upon commission of his second error, the student will be eliminated. Questions may be repeated, but each student will be given a question different from that given the preceding student. The student will not begin speaking until the Master's questioning is completed. Forty-five seconds will be allowed to complete recitation. If needed due to time, the competition will go to a written format.

On the elementary level, the Master will use the following style of question: Master refers to the application of verse and gives the reference. The student will then quote the verse.

Because of scheduling difficulties please do not enter the same students in Bible Memory, Bible Quiz or Spelling Bee.

BIBLE QUIZ

Book of the Bible: Romans 5-9 and James

Number of students on a team: 5 with 1 alternate/substitute

Bible quiz will roughly follow the nationals handbook with adjustments made for the elementary level. If your school is interested in Bible Quiz or has additional questions regarding Bible Quiz, please email statecomp@mytocs.org.

There will be a pre-sign up for Bible Quiz so that we can be prepared. Quizzing will start at 8:00 am on April 24th.

Because of scheduling difficulties please do not enter the same students in Bible Memory, Bible Quiz or Spelling Bee.

BIBLE SWORD DRILL

This is a Bible-based competition where students race to find specific verses in the Bible as quickly and accurately as possible without the aid of tabs or any other place marking items. Depending on the number of students that sign up, there may be run-off rounds and then a final round on the day of competition.

The Drill will be run following the given procedures:

• Starting Position

- Students stand straight with closed Bibles held at arm's length, spine down, in one hand.
- The other hand is by their side—no fingers inside the Bible.

• Command Sequence

- o The caller says clearly: **"Swords up!" -** All Bibles should be raised, spines down
- Then the caller will say: "Attention!"
- Then the caller will give the reference twice
- The caller will then say: "Charge!"
- Once the word charge is said, students can begin looking for the verse. Once a student has found the verse and put their finger on the verse the student will step forward

2025-2026: God's Promises

- I. God has expressed His promises in clear, simple language.
 - A. God's promises are recorded in the Scriptures (Romans 1:2).
 (Which he had promised afore by his prophets in the holy scriptures,)
 - B. God's promises are backed by His faithfulness (Deuteronomy 7:9).

 Know therefore that the LORD thy God, he is God, the faithful God, which keepeth covenant and mercy with them that love him and keep his commandments to a thousand generations;
 - C. God has confirmed His faithfulness by an oath (Hebrews 6:17–18).
 Wherein God, willing more abundantly to shew unto the heirs of promise the immutability of his counsel, confirmed it by an oath: That by two immutable things, in which it was impossible for God to lie, we might have a strong consolation, who have fled for refuge to lay hold upon the hope set before us:
 - D. God's promises are to motivate His children to duty and holiness (2 Corinthians 6:17–18; 7:1). Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you, And will be a Father unto you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty. Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God.
 - E. Although not all promises are made to the Christian, all are for our edification (Romans 15:4). For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope.
 - F. God's promises have been confirmed and fulfilled in Christ (2 Corinthians 1:19–20). For the Son of God, Jesus Christ, who was preached among you by us, even by me and Silvanus and Timotheus, was not yea and nay, but in him was yea. For all the promises of God in him are yea, and in him Amen, unto the glory of God by us.
 - G. Man does not know God's timetable for the fulfillment of His promises (2 Peter 3:9). The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance.
 - H. God's promises are obtained or possessed through faith (Romans 4:16; Hebrews 6:12). Therefore it is of faith, that it might be by grace; to the end the promise might be sure to all the seed; not to that only which is of the law, but to that also which is of the faith of Abraham; who is the father of us all,
 - That ye be not slothful, but followers of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises.
- II. Scripture describes God's promises in several terms.
 - A. God's promise is called good (1 Kings 8:56).

 Blessed be the LORD, that hath given rest unto his people Israel, according to all that he promised: there hath not failed one word of all his good promise, which he promised by the hand of Moses his servant.
 - B. God's promise is called holy (Psalm 105:42). For he remembered his holy promise, and Abraham his servant.
 - C. God's promises are called great and precious (2 Peter 1:4).

 Whereby are given unto us exceeding great and precious promises: that by these ye might be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption that is in the world through lust.

- III. God has given promises concerning the physical welfare of His children.
 - A. God has promised longer life for obedience to Him (Proverbs 3:1–2).

 My son, forget not my law; but let thine heart keep my commandments: For length of days, and long life, and peace, shall they add to thee.
 - B. God has promised longer life for honoring parents (Ephesians 6:2–3). Honour thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise; That it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth.
 - C. God has promised peace and comfort in fear (John 14:27; Philippians 4:7).
 Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid.
 And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.
 - D. God has promised help in illness (Psalm 41:3).The LORD will strengthen him upon the bed of languishing: thou wilt make all his bed in his sickness.
 - E. God has promised the rest of sweet sleep (Proverbs 3:24).

 When thou liest down, thou shalt not be afraid: yea, thou shalt lie down, and thy sleep shall be sweet.
 - F. God has promised both afflictions and delivery in those afflictions (1 Thessalonians 3:3; Psalm 50:15). That no man should be moved by these afflictions: for yourselves know that we are appointed thereunto.
 - And call upon me in the day of trouble: I will deliver thee, and thou shalt glorify me.
 - G. God has promised to dry our tears (Revelation 7:17).

 For the Lamb which is in the midst of the throne shall feed them, and shall lead them unto living fountains of waters: and God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes.
 - H. God has promised renewal of strength (Isaiah 40:31).

 But they that wait upon the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk, and not faint.
 - I. God has promised that nothing shall happen by chance (Proverbs 16:33). The lot is cast into the lap; but the whole disposing thereof is of the LORD.
 - J. God has promised children as His heritage (Psalm 127:3).Lo, children are an heritage of the LORD: and the fruit of the womb is his reward.
 - K. God has promised a blessed home life (Proverbs 3:33).The curse of the LORD is in the house of the wicked: but he blesseth the habitation of the just.
 - L. God has promised preservation of orphans and widows (Jeremiah 49:11). Leave thy fatherless children, I will preserve them alive; and let thy widows trust in me.
 - M. God has promised blessings upon the children of godly parents (Psalm 112:1–2; Proverbs 20:7). Praise ye the LORD. Blessed is the man that feareth the LORD, that delighteth greatly in his commandments. His seed shall be mighty upon earth: the generation of the upright shall be blessed. The just man walketh in his integrity: his children are blessed after him.
 - N. God has promised our basic needs of food, drink, and clothing (Matthew 6:31–32). Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things.

Romans Chapter 1

16 For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.

- 17 For therein is the righteousness of God revealed from faith to faith: as it is written, The just shall live by faith.
- **18** For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men, who hold the truth in unrighteousness;
- **20** For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse:
- **21** Because that, when they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened.

- 1 Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things.
- 11 For there is no respect of persons with God.
- 12 For as many as have sinned without law shall also perish without law: and as many as have sinned in the law shall be judged by the law;
- **28** For he is not a Jew, which is one outwardly; neither is that circumcision, which is outward in the flesh:
- 29 But he is a Jew, which is one inwardly; and circumcision is that of the heart, in the spirit, and not in the letter; whose praise is not of men, but of God.

- 10 As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one:
- 11 There is none that understandeth, there is none that seeketh after God.
- 12 They are all gone out of the way, they are together become unprofitable; there is none that doeth good, no, not one.
- **20** Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in his sight: for by the law is the knowledge of sin.
- 23 For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;
- **24** Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus:

Romans Chapter 4

- **3** For what saith the scripture? Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness.
- 4 Now to him that worketh is the reward not reckoned of grace, but of debt.
- **5** But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness.
- **24** But for us also, to whom it shall be imputed, if we believe on him that raised up Jesus our Lord from the dead;
- 25 Who was delivered for our offences, and was raised again for our justification.

- **2** By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God.
- **6** For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly.
- 7 For scarcely for a righteous man will one die: yet peradventure for a good man some would even dare to die.8 But God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.
- 19 For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous.

- **6** Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin.
- 11 Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord.
- 13 Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God.
- **16** Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness?
- 23 For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Romans Chapter 7

- 13 Was then that which is good made death unto me? God forbid. But sin, that it might appear sin, working death in me by that which is good; that sin by the commandment might become exceeding sinful.
- **18** For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing: for to will is present with me; but how to perform that which is good I find not.
- 19 For the good that I would I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do.
- 24 O wretched man that I am! who shall deliver me from the body of this death?
- **25** I thank God through Jesus Christ our Lord. So then with the mind I myself serve the law of God; but with the flesh the law of sin.

- 1 There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit.
- **6** For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace.
- 7 Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.
- 15 For ye have not received the spirit of bondage again to fear; but ye have received the Spirit of adoption, whereby we cry, Abba, Father.

- 22 For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now.
- **38** For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come,
- **39** Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

- **3** For I could wish that myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh:
- **20** Nay but, O man, who art thou that repliest against God? Shall the thing formed say to him that formed it, Why hast thou made me thus?
- **21** Hath not the potter power over the clay, of the same lump to make one vessel unto honour, and another unto dishonour?
- **30** What shall we say then? That the Gentiles, which followed not after righteousness, have attained to righteousness, even the righteousness which is of faith.

SPELLING BEE

Spelling will be conducted in the traditional spelling bee fashion according to the rules listed below. Words will randomly be chosen from the lists provided in this handbook beginning with the 2025-2026 Elementary Spelling List. Once the 2025-2026 Elementary Spelling List has been exhausted, the words from the Contest A List will be used. If both provided lists are exhausted, additional words will be randomly chosen from the AACS Contest B, Champion A, or Champion B lists found on the AACS website. Because the words are coming from lists, definitions, parts of speech, and uses in a sentence will not be provided.

- 1. The Spelling Master will say the word. The student may request a word be re-pronounced.
- 2. The student should proceed in a say, spell, say manner.
- 3. Having begun to spell a word, a student may stop and begin again one time; however, they cannot change what they have already spelled.
- 4. 30 seconds will be given to complete the word. Timing begins when the student says the word.
- 5. When a word is misspelled, the spelling master will give the correct spelling. A new word will be given to the next speller.
- 6. Rounds will continue in this format until only 2 spellers remain.
- 7. When only 2 students remain, procedures change. When one student misspells a word, the other will be given the opportunity to spell it and must spell that word and an additional word correctly in order to win the round. In the event that both spellers misspell the same word the spelling master will give the correct spelling and provide a new word for the student who first misspelled.

Special situations:

- 1. If all spellers misspell their words within a round, then the round starts over with all spellers.
- 2. If only one speller spells their word correctly within a round, then that speller has to spell the last mistaken word correctly and spell a new word correctly to win that round.
- 3. If within a round, too many spellers are eliminated to determine 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places then winners of the round (if any) will advance to earn a place and remaining spellers from the round will return to compete for next spots. For example, within round 5, all spellers are eliminated except one, so following all previous rules, that speller has earned 1st place. All the other spellers from round 5 return to begin a new round to compete for 2nd and 3rd place. Another example is if within a round all spellers are eliminated except for two spellers, then those two will compete for 1st and 2nd place using two speller rules while the students which were eliminated from the round wait for an additional round to compete for 3rd place.
- 4. Spellers do not need to leave after misspelling a word until an entire round is finished in case another round is needed.
- 5. If all 5 provided lists are exhausted, random words will be taken from the dictionary and students may ask for definitions and parts of speech for unfamiliar words.

Because of scheduling difficulties, please do not enter the same student in Bible Memory, Bible Quiz or Spelling Bee.

Elementary spelling bees are governed by the various AACS state affiliates. Check with your state office for elementary competition rules. In an effort to assist states, AACS has provided this study list. Students should study the words on the study list. They should be familiar with words used in their history, science, and spelling textbooks. Words used in the competition have been selected from the study list, from student textbooks, and from the dictionary.

Art Categories:

Monochromatic Drawing Polychromatic Drawing Sculpture Painting Crafts

General Rules:

- 1. Entries are not limited to religious themes, but must be appropriate
- 2. All work must be done by the student but advice may be given by an advisor
- 3. Students may not enter a piece from a previous year's competition.
- 4. There can be no copying or tracing
- 5. All drawing entries need to be framed by a matte no frames
- 6. Each participant needs to fill out an artist idea statement for each entry. This statement is included in this manual.

Monochromatic Drawing - done with ink or pencil or in any one hue of the chosen color

Polychromatic Drawing - done with more than one color

Sculpture - entries made carving, modeling or shaping to produce a three-dimensional piece that can be displayed (wood, plaster, clay, wire, etc.)

Painting – done with paint on appropriate art paper or canvas

Crafts

- **Includes two-dimensional or three-dimensional artwork that combines two or more mediums including the use of paint, ink, pencil, chalk, oil paints, tempera paints, sand, collage, and printmaking. Can include jewelry making and mosaics.
- **A collage must be made of two-dimensional materials that were created by the student.

 Adhesives and glazes such as glues, fixatives, etc. are allowed in the assembling and finishing processes. Photographs not taken by the student may be used as long as the portion used cannot be recognized as part of the original picture.
- **No kits or commercially produced parts are acceptable, such as plastic leaves and any other prefabricated media; all parts are to be handmade, painted, inked, etc.
