- **2.** Define the biblical term, "man's free will." (in two sentences or more)
- **3.** How did David's "free will" impact his sinful acts with Bathsheba (v. 1-5)
- **4.** Why didn't Bathsheba, "Just say no?"
- **5.** Briefly describe: 1) moral character, 2) ethical values
- **6.** Compare the moral character of David v. Uriah; Compare the ethical values of David v. Uriah
- **7.** Read **Leviticus 20:10**. How might this verse have influenced David's moral character or ethical values?
- **8.** David was the King of Isreal. Why would he be so determined to cover up his adultery with Bathsheba? (v. 6-13)
- **9.** What is conspiracy? Who were the two main conspirators? (v. 14 -15)
- **10.** What benefit did David's order to murder Uriah accomplish? (v. 16-21)
- **11.** David committed multiple sins in this chapter. Name three and give an example of each.
- **12.** Did David's final act of marrying Bathsheba repair his prior acts of sin? How do you know?
- **13.** Can you offer a Bible-based solution that might help a friend or loved one today to avoid this spiral into temptation: adultery, deceit, and murder?
- **14.** What temptation are you wrestling with today? (Note to self & God!)
