Psalm 133

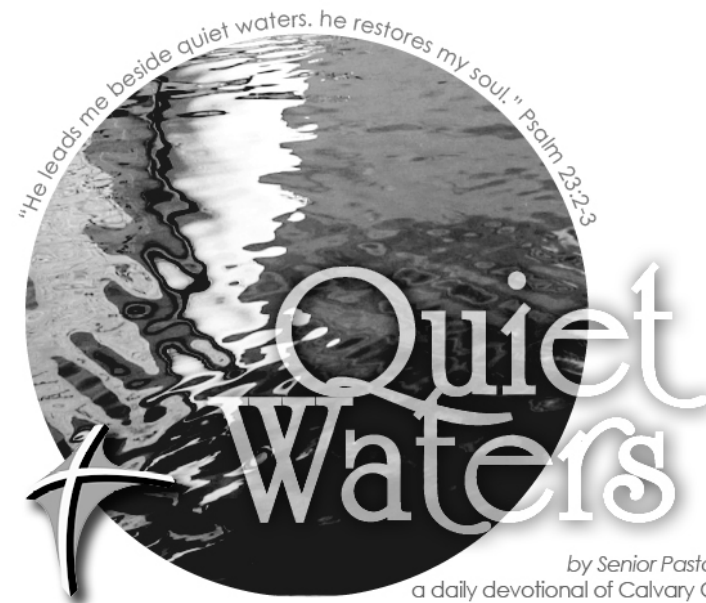
Reset

Psalms 135-136

Give thanks to the LORD for he is good; his love endures forever.
Psalm 136:1

I have noticed in my life that I have patterns of thinking that are not all that healthy. I respond to things according to the values that I have put in place in my life. These values have taught me what the right way is to think about a situation *and* what the right way is to handle a situation. These ways of thinking have been largely developed by my selfish, sinful nature in a sin-filled culture. In addition, the devil fills me with lies about how to think. As such, these patterns of processing are not healthy and certainly not God-honoring. Rather, they are selfish and self-serving. So, what is there to do about these patterns that are so deeply engrained? I must have a reset. I need to reprogram my thinking. In Romans 12:1-2, Paul calls this being transformed by renewing of my mind. I need a new thought process. My heart has the desire to serve God, but the needed behavior change requires a new thought process. This takes a lifetime of intentional re-thinking. The way that I change my way of thinking is to regularly repeat the things I know to be true—starting with what I know to be true about God. That is why I love this psalm. I get to repeat, over and over, what I need to be sure of. God—and His love—endures forever. Enough said. He is faithful. Nothing can change that. He has proven it. It is worthy of my hope. I must not gloss over these words. I must read and reread, memorize and meditate on this truth.

I give thanks to You my God and my King! Your love endures forever. Help this thought permeate all my thoughts so that I may declare Your glory. Please use the repetition of this truth, along with so many others; reset my thoughts and my actions. Amen.

Exalted

Psalms 125-126

When the LORD brought back the captives to Zion, we were like men who dreamed. Our mouths were filled with laughter, our tongues with songs of joy. Then it was said among the nations, "The LORD has done great things for them." The LORD has done great things for us, and we are filled with joy.
Psalm 126:1-3

Tuesday, January 22, 2019

Unless

Psalms 127-128

Unless the Lord builds the house, its builders labor in vain.
Psalm 127:1a

One small sentence in the middle of the Bible. As I ponder this verse, I can't help but wonder what life would be like if every person not only knew this verse, but lived as though it were true. Scripture reveals the difference in the lives of people. All throughout the Bible, the difference can be seen. There are those who seek to have the Lord build their house and others who labor in vain. David and Saul stand out as two examples. Saul had opportunity to allow God to build his house, but he chose to build it his own way. His house crumbled. David, on the other hand was amazed that the Lord would actually build a house for him (2 Samuel 7:11,18). The Lord built for David a house that would never end.

What is the house that I am building? How much of what I am trying to build is by my effort and my design? If I am honest, all too often, I am doing the planning. When this happens, I am building in vain. My house is built on the sand of my self-effort. It will not stand the test (1 Corinthians 3:10-15). I need to ask myself honestly whether I am allowing God to build my house. This means my relationships, my reputation, my testimony, my worth, my family, my job. Every aspect of my life is the house that will be built. Will it be in vain?

O LORD, teach me this truth in the depth of my heart. My self-effort keeps me from turning to You and trusting You to build the house. I look back and I can see the areas in my life where I allowed You to do the building—in me first. Those are the areas that bring the greatest joy and peace. Please Lord, let me help You build instead of building myself. Amen.

Wednesday, January 23, 2019

Wait

Psalms 129-130

If you, O LORD, kept a record of sins, O LORD, who could stand? But with you there is forgiveness; therefore you are feared. I wait for the LORD, my soul waits; and in his word I put my hope.
Psalm 130:3-5

Hope implies waiting. In Romans 8:24, Paul asks the question, "Who hopes for what he already has?" Good question. Obviously, if I am hoping, it is because something has not yet happened. But what will I do while I am waiting? That is the real question, isn't it? Truthfully, I am not all that good at waiting. Usually the things I am waiting for are temporary and trivial things (in light of eternity).

This psalm awakens my heart to hope for the sure forgiveness found in the redemption that comes from the LORD. I fear the LORD because he forgives my sins! I long to be free from the sins that hold me in bondage. In God's strength, I gain victories here and that encourages me, but I hold out and watch for His return. I am absolutely sure He will come again. My hope is sure. So I wait. Even more than I am sure the morning follows the night, I am sure my LORD will come. So I wait in restful hope—even if I find myself in the depths of despair.

O LORD. My heart cries out to You from the depths of my longing. You have placed such a longing in my heart to be with You and yet You have asked me to wait. In the waiting, You have promised You will return—so I wait, with sure hope, confident that You will come again at just the right time to fulfill the redemption of all things. Help me proclaim this truth in all that I do and say so that all may know this hope that You alone provide. Amen.

Thursday, January 24, 2019

Quieted

Psalms 131-132

My heart is not proud, O LORD, my eyes are not haughty; I do not concern myself with great matters or things to wonderful for me. But I have stilled and quieted my soul; like a weaned child with its mother, like a weaned child is my soul within me. O Israel, put your hope in the LORD both now and forevermore.
Psalm 131

This is a rich psalm. The depth of the peace that is found in this psalm is what I long for in my life. David says his soul is quieted because he lets God be God. At first look, it would appear that one of the most prideful things a person can say is that they are not proud. Yet that is exactly how David starts this psalm. It is a declaration of his heart. He has learned the secret of quieting his soul. He quiets his soul by not concerning himself with the things that are too wonderful for him. This reminds me of Job's declaration of repentance, "Surely I spoke of things I did not understand, things too wonderful for me to know." (Job 42:3). I am learning this in my life. God holds me in His grip. To be quieted is to be content with Who holds me. Whatever the situation is in my life at any given point, I can quiet myself by remembering that God has this. He is looking at the big picture at the same time that He is involved in every aspect of my life. I do not need to worry and I certainly can understand that pride will not help me rest in His arms. He is holding the whole world.

Father, quiet my soul before You. O LORD, please take my pride and my haughtiness from me. Keep me from fixating on things that are just too wonderful for me to know. Thank You for protecting me from those things. Amen.
