

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

1. What's your favorite scent? What does it remind you of?

2. Do you have a favorite plant or flower? What is it, and why?

DIGGING DEEPER

1. <u>READ 2 Samuel 7:2-6</u>. When you've asked the Lord for something, His replies usually take shape in either a "*Yes*!""*No*," or "*Not yet*." What is something that you have asked God for, where you've heard Him answer one of these ways? What was that like?

2. <u>READ 2 Samuel 7:7</u>. If God didn't ask for a house to be built for Himself, why did David think it was a good idea to build Him one?

• <u>READ Deuteronomy 6:4-6</u>. What might we do, that we think honours God, but really doesn't?

3. <u>READ 2 Samuel 7:8-10</u>. Consider the direction of God's words to David: *"I took...," "I have been...," I will make ...,"* & *"I will plant..."* What was God wanting David to understand?

• <u>READ Matthew 6:31-33</u>. What does it mean to you that God has always been your Shepherd and Provider?

4. <u>READ 2 Samuel 7:12-16</u>. We're told here that a temple will be built, but by someone else; while also, there is an underlying tone that something so much more is happening, than just the building of a physical temple. What is that?

• <u>READ Luke 1:30-33</u>. What assurances are we able to see in the words of the Angel speaking to Mary, that the original audience of <u>2 Samuel 7</u> might have missed?

TAKING IT HOME

<u>READ 2 Samuel 7:18-22</u>. Here we see David's response to God's answer of "*no*." What can you learn from David's response to God for the next time that you hear the same answer? Will that be easy or hard to implement? Why is that?
