

"Praying Through"

It's been my experience that Father God answers prayers "at last" rather than "at first." And I believe He does that, because He wants to see whether we'll "chicken out" or "pray through." If we

"chicken out," we miss the "miracle." I've done both. There have been times when I've stopped praying about something, because God was "silent." And there have been occasions when I've persisted in prayer and experienced the "miracle" which came "at last."

When the *Israelites* fled from *Egypt* during what's now referred to as "The Exodus," they eventually arrived at the shore of the Red Sea. With the thunderous army of Egypt bearing down and the people complaining they should have stayed in Egypt, Moses prayed. That's when God instructed Moses to stretch-out his "rod" over the sea, promising He would divide the water so the people could cross over on dry land (Exodus 14:15-16).

Now fast-forward about forty years, when the journey of the *Israelites* through "the wilderness" was nearly at its end. The only thing between *God's* people and "The Land" He'd promised them was another body of water, the mighty Jordan River at flood stage. This time since the mantle of leadership had been transferred to Joshua, he prayed. God's instructions. The priests carrying "the ark of the

covenant of the LORD of all the earth" were to lead the people. The instant their feet touched the water (and not a nanosecond before they did) the Jordan River divided, and the people were able to cross over, walking on a dry riverbed (Joshua 3:7-17).

In each of these miraculous instances, the *leaders* prayed. Then God told them what they needed to do after which He performed the "miracle." Prayer was the "key," because there was nothing the people could do on their own to overcome what they encountered. Just as important, though, were the actions of the leaders of the people. "In faith" Moses stretched out his "rod" over the Red Sea. And "in faith" the priests carrying the "ark of the covenant" stepped into the dangerously fast flowing water of the Jordan River. 1) Pray. 2) Obey God's instructions. 3) Trust God to act.

Our beloved *St. Thomas Church* has been waiting a long time for the "miracle" of the arrival of the next full-time pastor. What, if anything, can we learn from our heavenly *Father* about how to resolve this matter for which *He absolutely has the answer* and wants to act on our behalf?

Keep praying, because if we "chicken out," we'll miss the "miracle" God has for us.

On November 11, 1918, the Germans and the Allied Nations, which included the United States,

signed a document to initiate an armistice (cessation of hostilities), thus ending World War I. A year later, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating November 11 as Armistice Day. On this national holiday, churches around the nation hold services of prayers and praise. Followers of the Prince of Peace pray for peace among the nations of Earth and for the day when "they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (Isaiah 2:4, NRSV).

Candles That Tell a Story



Lighting its candles each Sunday is a treasured tradition during the four weeks of Advent. Depending on denomination, churches use different color combinations for the candles. Some place four blue candles around the wreath with a white one in the center, while others use all white. Many light purple candles on the first two Sundays, pink on the third, purple again on the fourth, and then a large white candle on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

Each part of the wreath carries symbolic meaning:

- The wreath: Its circular shape represents the everlasting love of God, having no beginning or end. The green symbolizes eternal life.
- **The four candles**: Mark the four weeks of Advent. One tradition says that each candle also represents 1,000 years, totaling 4,000 years from Adam and Eve to Christ's birth.
- **Purple candles**: in ancient times, was expensive and was considered the color of royalty and kings. On Christmas, Christ is proclaimed King of Kings. Purple also symbolizes humility and penitence. The first purple candle represents Hope; the second, Peace; and the final purple candle, Love.
- Blue candles: Blue is another color often used as a symbol of royalty. Some churches use blue candles to symbolize the night sky and the anticipation of the announcement of Christ's birth. Blue also symbolizes the beginning of a new creation as in the waters of Genesis 1.
- The pink candle: Lit on the third Sunday, it represents Joy and marks the halfway point of Advent.
- **The white candle**: The large white candle in the center is the Christ candle. Its light symbolizes Christ the Savior "the light of the world."

The beauty and brightness from the glow of all five candles is a reminder that Christ's life was the light for all earth's people - "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:5, NRSV).

The Advent wreath is more than just greenery and candles-it's a symbol of watchfulness and growing joy as Christmas draws near.




Back of photograph

Look at the back of the photo. C. (Cyrus) G. Blatt was a well-known Bernville photographer and (Reading) *Eagle/Times* newspaper correspondent for Bernville news. The building that was his home and "photo gallery" still stands at 501 Main Street, although the diagonal entrance to the building is no longer there. See the picture of the building as it looked then on the next page.

Mr. Blatt identified himself on the back of his photos and with a sign on his house (see red arrow on house picture on next page) as "C. G. Blatt, Artist." He operated the photo gallery from 1878 to 1909. In the same building, he had a candy store for the school children (his house was directly across the street from a school), and his daughter had a millinery shop.

Note that the picture back identifies his location as "S. E. Cor. (corner) of Main & 4th Sts., Bernville, Pa." In 1875 Mr. Blatt paid the borough a fee of \$5.00 for the privilege of parking his photographic wagon on the street at that location. Mr. Blatt also notes on the picture back that "Duplicates can be had at any time."

The house picture and information is from *Bernville Pennsylvania 1851-1976*, Mrs. Pearl B. Kline and Mrs. Janice C. DeLong, Collaborators, published by the Bernville Bicentennial Committee, 1976, pages 47, 131.

Rev. Thomas Calvin Leinbach began his pastorate on Christmas of 1860 at North Heidelberg Church and on March 3, 1861 at the Northkill Church, Bernville. Rev. Leinbach served a period of 48 years – until 1909, and he catechized and confirmed 24 classes of new members in the Old Northkill Church/St. Thomas Church.

Rev. Leinbach delivered over 10,000 sermons, baptized 6,061, confirmed 4,076, married 1,835, and conducted 3,107 funeral services.

Rev. Leinbach was pastor for six Reformed congregations:

- North Heidelberg Church in North Heidelberg Township,
- Northkill/St. Thomas in Bernville,
- St. John's (Host) in Jefferson Township,
- Christ Little Tulpehocken in Jefferson Township,
- Zion's in Strausstown, and
- St. Daniel's (Eck/Corner) Church in Robesonia.

Rev. Leinbach was described as "kind, sympathetic, and charitable."

He was the son of Rev. Thomas Hartman Leinbach who organized the Northkill Congregation in 1826 and served as pastor until 1851.

Rev. Thomas C. Leinbach received his education in the public schools and at Myerstown Academy and Franklin and Marshall College. He completed his Theological Course at Mercersburg Seminary.

The information on Rev. Thomas C. Leinbach and Rev. Thomas H. Leinbach comes from History of St. Thomas United Church of Christ 1897-1997, page 42.

Confirmation Day, April 16, 1892, with Rev. Thomas C. Leinbach



1892 is before St. Thomas was built and this confirmation took place in Northkill Church. See red arrows above. Rev. Thomas C. Leinbach is the first person on the left in the second row. Sallie L. Hiester, the great-grandmother of current St. Thomas member Lynette Davis, is the second person from the right in the second row. Sallie married George Sheidy and Sallie's niece was Jennie (Kramer) Koenig whose memories of her 1905 Confirmation Class were published in *History of St. Thomas United Church of Christ 1897-1997*, page 81.

This confirmation day picture is also published in *History of St. Thomas United Church of Christ 1897-1997* on page 76 and more confirmand names are listed there, but each name is not identified with a particular person on the picture. With this information, we can now specifically identify one of the confirmands.



CIRCLE — The circle is a symbol for God, as well as for eternity, due to its lack of a beginning or an end. It also reminds us of how the church year (not unlike the secular calendar) flows from season to season and moves smoothly from Christ the King Sunday (the culmination of the liturgical calendar) to the First Sunday of Advent (a new beginning). Indeed, the One who rules all is the same One whose first and final comings we anticipate anew during Advent.




