I can't effectively be your pastor without knowing you!

So come January, I'll be hitting the road! I might call you, or maybe Kathy, our wonderful church secretary, will be calling on my behalf. But please answer!! Let me come for a visit. The house doesn't have to be neat. You don't need to give me anything to eat or drink. I just want to get to know you! And to help you when I reach out, my number is 610-301-2606. Save the number in your phone so that when I call you, you'll know I'm not a telemarketer. And if you really don't want to connect with me, when you see my number, you'll be better able to avoid me!! (Ha, ha!)

Again, I'm really happy to serve as your pastor. I hope the time I'm able to serve you is not measured in weeks or months but years. Years to grow together in Jesus Christ and his love,



Shoebox Update

It's hard to believe another round of shoeboxes is already making their way around the world to children in need and you were a big part of it!

This year, St. Thomas packed 152 shoeboxes:

- **100 boxes** were packed and shipped, with shipping costs covered by the mission team and fundraising efforts.
- 52 boxes were packed by St. Thomas families.



Our shoeboxes are headed to Ukraine and Jamaica, which was recently affected by Hurricane Melissa.

As these gifts travel to their destinations, we are already joyfully preparing for **2026 shoeboxes**, and there are many ways to get involved:

- Sewers to stitch simple straight seams for drawstring bags (all pieces are pre-cut)
- Helpers to cut fleece for stuffed bears, cats, and dogs
- Volunteers to help assemble craft kits so children can create their own keepsakes

Last year, members shared their talents through handmade dresses, stuffed animals, doll clothes and blankets, crocheted bags, washcloths, bead kits, friendship bracelets, paracord projects, knot-tying activities, and game bags with Farkle and Yahtzee. We also printed coloring pages and reusable "learn-to-write" boards.

Thanks to donated fabric, yarn, and craft supplies, we're able to provide thoughtful, high-quality items that show care and love, often at less cost than store-bought toys.














Ministries of God's Servants

The IHC and XP on the stone's sides are abbreviations for "Jesus" and "Christ" in Greek.




What you do:
