

But what about remembering?

Remembering is a prominent theme in Scripture—a call from God on each of our lives and on the whole of creation to keep our Creator constantly at the forefront.

As Christians, we have a multitude of practices that aid us in our remembering—we attend church, we partake in Communion, we read Scripture, and we sing worship songs, all continually bringing us back to the simple gospel.

We honor God as good and faithful—God as who He really is—when we remember Him. And so, while Advent marks many emotions and experiences, it is also an out—working of this holy command. As a Body of believers, we together have received a call to a great, collective remembering—and this

We must remember Christ Jesus. We must remember the power of the gospel. We must remember the peace that is ours only because of Him. We must remember both His humanity and His divinity. We must remember that He is coming soon.


We must take care, lest we forget our Jesus, who became Emmanuel-fully human and dwelling among us—to "reconcile to himself all things... by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross" (Col. 1:19–20).



How to Use This Guide



he Christian tradition of Advent is a season of remembrance, looking ahead, and joyful preparation. Advent spans the four weeks leading up to Christmas, and the passing of each week is represented by lighting a candle with a specific meaning each Sunday—candles of hope, peace, joy, and love.



A fifth and final candle—the Christ candle—is lit on Christmas Eve. The light of these candles is symbolic of the light of Christ, which pushes back the darkness.

Many churches then use the Christ candle to light smaller candles, which are passed throughout the congregation during a candle-light service on Christmas Eve. This practice symbolizes the light of Christ filling the earth as all nations find peace in Him.

Each devotional in this guide includes an invitation, Scripture readings, and a prayer prompt.

Every Sunday during Advent and on Christmas Eve, meditate on the passages listed, ponder the content provided, and discuss or pray through the prompt.

Whether you use this devotional guide over the dinner table, with a small group, or individually, we pray it will enrich your life in Christ this Advent season. May we lean in to experience all that the Lord has for us as we joyfully prepare to respond to His arrival.

ADVENT WEEK ONE

The Candle of Hope

READ

For as the soil makes the sprout come up and a garden causes seeds to grow, so the Sovereign Lord will make righteousness and praise spring up before all nations.

ISAIAH 61:11-12

here are countless times throughout life that we find ourselves anticipating something. Sometimes it takes the shape of dread—like how I feel before I get my blood drawn at the doctor (I hate blood) or before I have a hard conversation with a friend. But, more often, when I refer to anticipation, it is the kind that fills me up with hope for the future—like when I was a little girl

watching presents pile up under the Christmas tree, imagining what wonderful things could be inside, or when it's an extra stressful day at work and I'm looking forward to when I am free to leave. Sometimes, my anticipation blissfully meets my expectations—like a cozy post—work nap. Other times, Christmas morn ing would roll around, leaving little me with the sinking realization that all that pretty wrapping paper was hiding was a pair of socks (nothing against socks).

Right now, I am in a unique season of anticipation that some of you in our Alliance family know very well. I am uprooting my life here in the U.S. to move across the ocean to a creative access country. Everything is a goodbye right now. My husband and I have said goodbye to our jobs, our home, our belongings, and soon will say goodbye to our families and community. The cost of leaving is very high. It was difficult to explain to my coworkers when I told them I was leaving.

"You're going where?!"

"Why on earth would you do that?"

I struggled to answer them, but soon I realized this is because my hope informs my decisions. Or, more appropriately, the One I hope in informs my decisions. My coworkers, who were so baffled at why I would make a change like this, do not answer to the same hope as I do. The truth is that I wouldn't even dream about leaving everything I know if it wasn't for the hope that directs my steps.

When our hope is in Christ, it changes the way we interact with

the world. Money, comfort, and power to do not motivate our actions or our words. In fact, Jesus gives us freedom from those very things that bind our world. "I can do all things through me who gives me strength" doesn't have any power or meaning to it. However, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Phil. 4:13) completely transforms the way we live.

I have always loved Isaiah 61. It is my prayer for broken people and places in this world, and I encourage you to sit in the hope that it offers this Advent season.

PRAY

Reflect on how your hope in Jesus changes the way you live. Thank the Father for transforming your heart and making you into a new creation! Think about what you are anticipating this week and invite the Holy Spirit to examine your life. Are there any areas where you are living for money, comfort, or power that you need to surrender to Him?





ADVENT WEEK TWO

The Candle of Peace

READ

Stand firm then . . . with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace.

EPHESIANS 6:14, 15



The moment we accept the gift of Jesus we have access to complete peace. This undeserved and unexplainable peace deepens in us as we walk in faith, yet there are times when we do not feel at peace. Jesus understands our human default towards anxiousness, and He is gentle with us when we falter. What compassion! What love! We can fully trust, fully rest, and fully surrender because He is our peace.

God accepted us at our worst. He saw our most despicable moments—our wretched thoughts and wounding words—yet the invitation to go deeper with Him remains. He extends and expands this same welcome to all peoples and nations—a peace—bringing welcome that comes only from the Prince of Peace.

PRAY



READ

For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

HEBREWS 12:2

hen the world asks—almost demands—that we enjoy Christmas, the Advent of Christ invites us into a deeper joy.

In Scripture, joy is experienced when something good is received or something wonderful has happened. The nativity story overflows with it: Zechariah and Elizabeth receive their son, John; John leaps in Elizabeth's womb at the presence of Jesus; and Mary realizes that salvation is coming for God's people.

Songs of joy fill the air around us during the Christmas season. But isn't it true that often there is a minor key in the soundtrack? Life's disappointments and sorrows are the real context into which this joyful message comes. During one Christmas season, I had the joy of giving birth to our son. During another, we lost our oldest daughter to a ravishing disease.

The thing about joy, though, is that it can still be present, and growing, in the most difficult times of life. Unlike enjoyment, joy can't be fabricated. It is a fruit of the Spirit in us and our response to gifts from God. Perhaps joy occurs in

the presence of a trial, when we become more aware of the eternal reality that there is a greater symphony being written by the great Composer. Christ Himself went through the experience of the Cross with His eyes set on what was to come—the joyful victory that became our greatest gift.

PRAY

Read Romans 5:3–5 and take a moment to thank God for your trials. Practice gratitude and remind yourself that God works everything for good, even suffering.

What sorrowful strain may be present for you in this season? Where can Jesus enter, allowing you to experience all of Him? Take a moment of silence and stillness before God and invite Him to compose His song of joy in you.

"He will quiet you by his love."


He offers us a refuge in His love, and it is there we find rest, respite, and relief from the stress and anxiety of life. In His presence, we find peace.
