Some Thanksgiving Thoughts

From a young age I was innately drawn to the pipe organ. Interestingly, the church of my youth didn't have a pipe organ, but I recall watching and listening to the great organ of the Mormon Tabernacle on TV. I was fascinated by this marvel of engineering which seemed capable, if only for a moment, of capturing people's souls, and transporting them to a higher place.

My family wasn't particularly musical, but when I expressed an interest in learning the piano my parents found an old piano, restored it, and provided me with piano lessons.

Through a series of encounters, which I believe were directed and intentional, I began taking organ lessons. I remember the first time I sat at the

console of the organ at Trinity Episcopal Church. To me it was like sitting in the cockpit of a 747. The myriad of knobs and buttons and keyboards and pedalboard captivated me and I was hooked. I still am.

I never felt the desire to make music my primary career. My degrees are business related and my jobs have mostly centered on finance, computers and databases. But miraculously I've been given the opportunity to maintain and use my love of music and my love of the pipe organ.

Of the many things in my life for which I am grateful, being organist/music director of First Christian Church ranks near the top of that list.

FCC has two beautiful pipe organs. Very few churches can claim this, and very few organists have access to, and play a pipe organ as large and comprehensive as the one in our sanctuary. Wow.

Through the years I've come to see the pipe organ as a metaphor for harmony in humanity. Each pipe has a mission and purpose. Some pipes are loud, some are soft and subtle, with most somewhere in between. Some pipes are visible, but the vast majority of them operate behind the scenes. Both are equally important. Pipes need air to do their job, just like we do. When the pipes all work together they become greater than the sum of their parts. I think this is analogous to the gifts of the Spirit blowing and breathing through us.

It's my hope and prayer that we all have a blessed and happy holiday season, and that the New Year brings to us blessings which we never imagined or anticipated.

Budget Report Meeting a World of Needs

October's General Fund Income was \$19,235 and \$6,846 from Royalty, Interest Incomes and Estate Gifts and Designated Funds Used for Budget. The Endowment and Wheeling Trust transfers were \$56,202. The October Contingency Fund Transfer was \$1,266 which totaled \$83,549 General Fund Income received. October's General Fund Expenditures were \$43,615 which leaves a Net Profit of \$39,934 for the month. October's Non-Operational Income was \$5,042 from Covid-19 Payroll Tax Credits. October's Non-Operational Expenditures were \$43,002 which included storm damage repairs and legal fees from the storm damage which leaves a Net Loss for Non-Operating Income and Expenses of (\$37,960). The Combined Net Profit from the General Fund Income & Expenses and Non-Operating Income & Expenses was \$1,974.

The YTD General Fund Income was \$165,811 and \$12,457 was from Royalty, Interest Incomes and Estate Gifts and Designated Funds Used for Budget. The Endowment and Wheeling Trust transfers were \$168,607. The YTD Contingency Fund Transfer was \$34,335. The YTD General Fund Expenditures were \$478,2898 which leaves a General Fund Net Loss of (\$97,077) for the Year to Date. The YTD Non-Operational Income was \$230,723 which included \$42,974 from Covid-19 Payroll Tax Credits and \$187,749 from Storm Insurance Claim reimbursements. The YTD Non-Operational Expenditures were \$229,425 which included storm damage repairs and legal fees from the storm damage which leaves a YTD Net Profit for Non-Operating Expenses of \$1,298. The Combined Net Profit YTD Net Loss from the General Fund Income & Expenses and Non-Operating Income & Expenses was (\$95,780).
