LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT WREATH: ADVENT 6

- L: Each week through Advent, we have sung an ancient O' Antiphon. The verse for this week contains a multiplicity of images: longed-for ruler, uniting cornerstone, creating potter. This is no ordinary king: he is unifier, fashioner, hearts' desire. This antiphon calls on a ruler who is not simply capable, but who is the place where our panting souls can finally rest.
- L: As we light the Advent candles, we call upon Christ, the King of the Nations. Christ, arbitrate for our divided nations.
- All: Let swords be beaten into plowshares.
- L: Let no one learn war anymore.
- All: Come quickly to us, Christ Jesus.

O come, O King of nations, come, O Cornerstone that binds in one: refresh the hearts that long for you; restore the broken, make us new. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you O Israel.


L: Let us pray.

He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense.


He will come and save you."


All: We lift them to the Lord.

THE LORD'S PRAYER


- P: Together as one body, we pray the prayer Jesus taught us.



WELCOME BACK PASTOR JULIE BOLEYN

We are delighted to welcome back to St. Paul's Pr. Julie Boleyn, who will lead us in worship throughout November, Advent, and on Christmas Eve. Pr. Julie is well known and loved by our congregation. For those who know her less well, here is a bit more background:

A long-time member and now alum of St. Paul's, Rev. Julie Boleyn was both married and ordained at our church. She is the Executive Director of the Kaleidoscope Institute, a non-profit that works with churches across the country as they seek to welcome diversity and creatively imagine new ways of being the church. From 2011 to 2021, she served as pastor at Unity Lutheran of Berwyn. During that time, Pr. Julie led the founding of Awake, activating community members across cultures to work for leadership, justice, and relationship. She also led the founding of Project 88 Music Academy, offering children in the community a way to engage classical music at a high level. Additionally, she accompanied the development of Unidad, a Spanish Language mission development that serves the LGBTQ community. Pr. Julie lives in Berwyn with two other St. Paul's alums: (1) her spouse, Rev. Jeannie Reardon, who serves as interim pastor at United in Faith Lutheran Church; and (2) their 16-year-old child, Maddie (they/them pronouns), who delights in writing children's storybooks, sewing, and cooking.
