WORD

FIRST READING: Psalm 104: 14-23

A reading from Psalms.

¹⁴You cause the grass to grow for the cattle, and plants for people to use, to bring forth food from the earth, ¹⁵and wine to gladden the human heart, oil to make the face shine, and bread to strengthen the human heart. ¹⁶The trees of the LORD are watered abundantly, the cedars of Lebanon that he planted. ¹⁷In them the birds build their nests; the stork has its home in the fir trees. ¹⁸The high mountains are for the wild goats; the rocks are a refuge for the coneys. ¹⁹You have made the moon to mark the seasons; the sun knows its time for setting. ²⁰You make darkness, and it is night, when all the animals of the forest come creeping out. ²¹The young lions roar for their prey, seeking their food from God. ²²When the sun rises, they withdraw and lie down in their dens. ²³People go out to their work and to their labor until the evening.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 1:10-23

A reading from Corinthians.

¹⁰Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. ¹¹For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. ¹²What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." ¹³Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? ¹⁴I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, ¹⁵so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. ¹⁶(I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) ¹⁷For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power.

¹⁸For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart."

²⁰Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. ²²For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire

wisdom, ²³but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles.



GOSPEL: Luke 12:22-31

The holy gospel according to Luke.

All: Glory to you, O Lord.

²²He said to his disciples, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. ²³For life is more than food, and the body more than clothing. ²⁴Consider the ravens: they neither sow nor reap, they have neither storehouse nor barn, and yet God feeds them.

Of how much more value are you than the birds! ²⁵And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? ²⁶If then you are not able to do so small a thing as that, why do you worry about the rest? ²⁷Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ²⁸But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, how much more will he clothe you — you of little faith! ²⁹And do not keep striving for what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not keep worrying. ³⁰For it is the nations of the world that strive after all these things, and your Father knows that you need them. ³¹Instead, strive for his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well.

We will commune one side of the church at a time. Please come forward to receive the bread first. Gluten free wafers are available.


You may choose a cup of red wine or white grape juice. Move to the side eat and drink.

Postlude **POSTLUDE** Composer Unknown



Pastor Peter Heide grew up just north of Evanston in Kenosha, Wisconsin. After developing eye problems in 1960, he has been sighted and blind four times. After graduation from high school, he had experimental surgery that resulted in his sight being mostly restored in one eye. This surgical procedure made Peter highly aware of the difficulties in modern understanding of miracles.

For 16 years he tuned pianos in the Madison, Wisconsin, area, taught catechism and was both assistant youth director and then director at Luther Memorial Church. Following graduation from Wart-Seminary in 1996, Peter's eyesight deteriorated requiring surgery. The eye collapsed, and he was burg blind again for the second time. Further surgery restored the eye's structure, and he regained the vision that he had had.

In 2006, (now) Pr. Peter's eyesight again deteriorated to the point of being blind for the third time. After successful surgery, he temporarily regained much of his eyesight. In 2010, he was blind again and temporarily took a leave-from-call. In 2011, the eye was removed, and, today, he is blind for the fourth and last time. Pr. Peter has served congregations in Kansas, Illinois, and Wisconsin. He has taught Systematic Theology, New Testament, and Biblical Images of the Life of the Church in the diakonia programs of Metro Chicago, central Florida, and South-Central Wisconsin. He serves on the ELCA Disability Ministries Advisory Team and the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin Racial Equity and Stewardship Teams. He is a prolific writer, having published with the ELCA, both hard-copy and digital. You can find him at Blind Faith, Dumb Cluck (blindfaithdumbcluck.blogspot.com). His current writing focus is on reading the Bible from a blind perspective.
