READING FROM THE HEBREW SCRIPTURES

2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15

English liturgist:

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from a skin disease. Now, the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young

girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his skin disease."

When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his skin disease? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha, the man of God, heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God and would wave his hand over the spot and cure the skin disease! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel; please accept a present from your servant."

While we are free to choose to use our words and actions to encourage or discourage, to love or to hate, to recognize the divine image in our neighbor or to demonize them, to welcome the stranger or to fear them, Jesus calls us to use our freedom to reflect gospel values.

In our increasingly polarized world, may we use our freedom to build bridges of love and understanding and to cultivate communities that reflect God's justice and peace. While there are plenty of physical, cultural, economic, religious and political walls that seek to divide us, we give thanks to God that God has torn down the dividing walls of hostility and is forming us into community that seeks to be Friends Across Borders.

Thank you for being a part of the FDC community and for all the ways you use your freedom to cultivate friendship across borders here on the US/Mexico border, in your own communities and in different parts of the world.

As Café Justo looks forward to 2026, they recognize that the year ahead will be shaped by the challenges and lessons of 2025. The past year has been marked by significant hurdles—chief among them are supply shortages, cash flow difficulties spurred by rising costs, and a landscape of uncertainty around import/export requirements and tariffs.

A Special Invitation from Tom Ulrich

On Wednesday evening, November 12, at 6:00 p.m., the Presbytery of Santa Fe is invited to an alternative worship service at Second Presbyterian Church. This service will utilize the Scriptures to address the socio-political climate that is affecting our country, and it will seek to shine the beacon of God's light, truth, and peace for those who strive for justice, resist tyranny, and fight for the oppressed.

Because the Bible does indeed speak to the issues of politics, economics, and community relationships, we as the body of Christ have a specific responsibility to stand up to violent authoritarianism and to address how Scripture is being misused in many contexts, for, in doing so, we can engage in the ministry of connecting faith and politics for the common good, and to confront the issues that are present in the public square.

In this service, the prayers, liturgy, and message will center upon how our sacred texts connect to our contemporary political realities in a hopefully credible and faithful way. After all, faith does not linger in fear; instead, faith is confident that the future of our church, the future of our country, and the future of our world can indeed embrace "a more excellent way" (1 Cor. 12:31).

If this vision perhaps resonates with you, I would encourage you to join us for this initial service (which we hope will be held monthly at different churches around the presbytery). And in a context of worship, let us inspire and equip our communities of faith to harmonize our different voices in singing the Lord's song in order to work for that day when God's kingdom will come on earth as it already is in heaven.

Spanish Heritage! In honor of our congregation's Spanish heritage, and out of respect for the ongoing cultural diversity of New Mexico, we include Spanish elements in the Sunday Service. The worship service is recorded each week and edited onto a CD. There are free copies of recent services on the table in Fellowship Hall. Hearing Assistance. Las Placitas Presbyterian Church offers a loop system for hearing aid wearers with a "T" (telecoil) setting. The worship service is broadcast directly through the hearing aid. Others desiring hearing assistance may check out a portable receiver and headset. Our public address system operates on a radio frequency which is transmitted to special assisted hearing devices that are available from the greeters or sound technician.

MISSION STATEMENT

OUR CHURCH HISTORY

Las Placitas Presbyterian Church is an inclusive community of all ages gathering for worship, prayer, learning, fellowship and spiritual growth. As members of the body of Christ, we celebrate God's grace in our lives and seek to extend God's love and promise through service, outreach, education, music, arts and witness. We are committed to peace and justice in the world, and to care for the earth as God's gift to humankind.

We cherish our origin as an early Spanish village mission church and honor this heritage in all of our activities.

We are Presbyterian in theology and governance, but welcome and support all people as they explore their personal life paths, emphasizing Christ's word, "Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them"

~Matthew 18:20

In 1882, José L. A. Gurulé, a descendant of settlers of Spain's 1768 San Antonio de las Huertas Land Grant, invited Rev. José Ynés Perea, a native of Bernalillo and the first ordained Hispanic Presbyterian minister in the United States, to come to a meeting in Placitas. This led to holding monthly Presbyterian services.

On February 25, 1894, all 95 adults present at Sunday service led by Rev. James Menaul and Rev. Perea voted to organize the Presbyterian Church at Las Placitas. Presbyterian Churches began to be established in the New Mexico Territory starting with Santa Fe in 1867, and Placitas followed as the 35th church organized, 17th among those extant.

Early church services were held in the same one-room adobe house used from 1893 until 1900 as the Presbyterian Mission School. In 1913, the adobe house was renovated and a tower added for the bell purchased in 1894 from the San Felipe Pueblo. In 1930, a new church building was built in the same location, after razing the adobe house and reusing its bricks. In the early 1980s, an addition gave us the current sanctuary, the Fellowship Hall and a kitchen. Construction from August 2004 to May 2005 expanded the kitchen and added the administrative and educational wing.
