My friends, today I want to remind you of two things and share something about Mother's Day.

Finally, I turn to Mother's Day. For most of my career as a pastor, I have always looked forward to the Sunday when we celebrate Mother's Day. We are told in scripture to honor our mothers, and it is good to have a day to celebrate motherhood. But for most of my life, I never thought Mother's Day had much to do with a lot of the themes you hear me preach on, namely the themes of peacemaking, equality, and changing the world to make it more like the reign of God. But then, after Mother's Day last year, one of you shared an article from me by Heather Cox Richardson about the origins of Mother's Day. According to Richardson, Mother's Day isn't just a day to honor our mothers and wives. It actually began in the 19<sup>th</sup> century as an anti-war movement, when so many mothers felt that decisions about war were all being made by men. So, Mother's Day started as a chance for the mothers of the world to make their voices heard

when the men of the world were the ones making the decisions to send their sons off to slaughter. As Richardson writes "Mother's Day was...part of women's effort to gain power to change modern society." Who knew? This Sunday as we celebrate mom, I hope you will remember that this is not just a day to thank mom for all she's done, it is also a day to celebrate the empowerment of women, the value of peacemaking, and the desire to make our world a less violent place.

For our worship services this Sunday, our scripture readings will be Ezekiel 34: 1-6 and John 14: 15-21. My sermon will be titled "But When Were We Ever Consulted?". I look forward to being with you either at 8:30am in the Upper Room or at 10:30am either in the sanctuary or over Zoom.
