FAMILIES WITH CHILDREN

Over the past year in Faith Farm, the children have been on a Journey to Jesus through the Old Testament. We've learned so much about God's plan for us from the beginning. We've completed our journey through the Old, so now we begin the New Testament.

What do you think our lessons will be about now?

Yes, Jesus' birth and everything that happened after Jesus was born.

Read Luke 2:1-20

Who were Jesus' parents?

God uses ordinary people. Mary and Joseph were like me and you. God loved them and asked them to do a very important job for Him. Because Jesus is God's son, He deserved to be born in the nicest palace surrounded by riches, comfort, and luxury. But that's not how the life of Jesus began at all.

- Do you think Mary and Joseph were rich?
- Where was Jesus born?
- Why do you think God allowed that?
- Who did the angels tell about Jesus' birth?

People didn't think the shepherds were very important. But God loved them and wanted them and everyone to know about His son, Jesus. The wise men also came to meet Jesus. They gave gifts to Jesus because they knew He was the best gift God ever gave us.

God loves us. Jesus came to Earth for us. No matter what any of us has done, God still loves us. We didn't earn this love; He gave it freely. Jesus came from Heaven to show us all how we can go to Heaven too.

Close in prayer thanking God for the greatest gift of all!



ADULTS

Ever feel that you are familiar with the first verse of numerous Christmas carols but not the remaining verses? Yet, when we move past the first verse, we may find ourselves unpacking some meaningful truths of Scripture. "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" is one of them.

According to C. Michael Hawn, the song was composed as early as the 12th century. John Mason Neale, the famous architect of the Oxford movement, discovered the Latin hymn in the appendix of an early 18th-century manuscript and included it in his influential collection, Mediaeval Hymns and Sequences (1851).

Plus, this song addresses the challenging nature of holidays, like Christmas. For some, Christmas can be difficult while others find increased joy. This is the 'O' of longing. As John Piper stated, "You can hear it in the 'O' that begins each verse: 'O come, Emmanuel.' 'O come, Rod of Jesse.' 'O come, Dayspring.' 'O come, Key of David.' 'O come, Desire of nations.'"

He goes on to explain, "As Emmanuel (Isaiah 8:8) - 'God with us' - He will pay the ransom that only a God-man can pay. As Rod of Jesse (Isaiah 11:1), springing from a dead stump, He will free his people, by death and resurrection, from Satan's tyranny, and make them free forever. As the Day-spring (Luke 1:78) — the dawn of God's kingdom - He will be the light of the world, and banish the hopelessness of darkness. As the Key of David (Isaiah 22:22), He rescues us from hell, locks the door behind us, unlocks the door of heaven, and brings us home. And as the Desire of nations (Haggai 2:7), He will draw the ransomed from every people and make them a kingdom of peace. This is who Jesus is. This is what He already achieved and will complete. And so with every verse, the refrain reaches down musically into our weak hearts and pulls us up, in faith, to see the certainty of the end."

Jesus came and lived among us, and was called Emmanuel. Yet He is coming again and "O" how we long for that day! We are left confident, but still cry out, "O come, O come, Emmanuel!"

Close with a prayer praising God for sending His Son, and pray that more and more will come to accept His salvation before His return.

FAMILIES WITH TEENS

Read Luke 1:26-56 and Luke 2:1-21

Can you imagine being a teenage Mary in these historical accounts? Let's start with an angel appearing to her!

What was she thinking? Feeling? What did she think the angel was going to say to her?

She was a young girl from a small town that did not amount to much—"can anything good come out of Nazareth" John 1:46.

Mary likely wondered if she would accomplish anything good or of consequence.

What were those months at Elizabeth's like for Mary? What was her pregnancy like? The trip to Bethlehem? She gave birth in a barn? In some religious circles like Roman Catholicism, Mary is elevated to a holy status. We know that this is not theologically correct. Mary was never meant to be divine. In Luke 11:27-28 Jesus makes this point pretty clear.

"As he said these things, a woman in the crowd raised her voice and said to him, "Blessed is the womb that bore you, and the breasts at which you nursed!" But he said, "Blessed rather are those who hear the word of God and keep it!""

There is nothing special about Mary, except that a very special God chose to take a completely ordinary girl and use her for an extraordinary purpose. It can be difficult to put ourselves in Mary's situation or her life story. But her story is very similar to ours. Who are we that anything good or meaningful would come from us? But God being rich in mercy made us alive for his handiwork. God chooses you daily for his kingdom work.

Close in prayer asking God to give you the confidence to accomplish kingdom work in his name.
